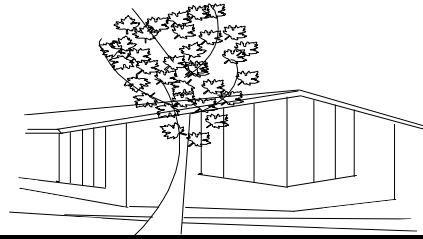

Minister's Message

Stewardship has long been associated with humanity's relationship with the natural environment, and the UUA applies stewardship to the resources we each possess. Religious environmentalists now critique the concept of stewardship because it tends to separate human beings from our organic links with our planet and the whole of life: we might think of ourselves as outside and above the rest of the Universe. Stewardship could suggest that the most powerful dole out resources to the least powerful, or that everything is ours to use. That's if we're possessive and greedy. I think our Green Sanctuary movement shows that UUs respect, honor, and value our planet's resources, and we seek wisdom about our role as conscious, ethical animals who are firmly woven into the interdependent web. Regarding the richness of resources around us, we're not into the motto: *use it or lose it*.

In Unitarian Universalist circles, "stewardship" has become a guiding concept as we exercise our responsibility to invest ourselves and our resources. The motto may be LOSE it to USE it, or maybe LOOSE it to use it. This application of stewardship acknowledges that like the planet earth, humanity is endowed with resources: at UUCT they include our individual gifts, our shared principles, our congregational life. Rather than hoard this bounty, we share it. Rather than let these resources lie dormant and stagnate, we invest them. Our goal is not to use up the most resources as consumers, but to free up resources through generous actions. Stewardship is not irresponsible consumption, or at the other extreme selfish doling out of resources. Stewardship means releasing resources with joy.

On Sunday, April 4 we'll consider stewardship and on Sunday, April 18 we'll celebrate Earth Day. That's also the span of time for our annual canvass potlucks when we each pledge our resources for the work of the church. We possess time, talent and treasure. This congregation calls on each of us to share our resources--with our families, our civic community, and with our congregation. Investing in UUCT won't get you into heaven or keep you out of hell, but it just may preserve and expand a little heaven on earth.

Campus Ministry Corner

I have recently been reminded of the importance of our campus ministry by one of our group members, Katie Chamberlain. Katie has been representing the South-East on the National Campus Ministry Advisory Committee. She went to Chicago in late February to meet with them and discuss the mission and vision of Campus Ministry nationwide. The reports that came out of that meeting were both exciting and inspiring. They remind us of the reasons for campus ministry:

"The unique insights of college students enrich both our individual lives and our congregations. The support of campus ministry can enrich the congregations by adding the experiences of campus young adults to the existing congregation, making our intergenerational communities more authentic. For those who are raised UU, providing a religious home during college and YA years makes sense from a denominational and congregational membership growth perspective (Larry Ladd said during his recent campaign for UUA Financial Advisor that most businesses know that it's easier to keep a customer than it is to find a new customer). If we have more of our youth staying as young adults, then the UUA and its member congregations would be an even greater force for positive change. Adult UU members who joined as

converts would learn about another way of being UU from adults who were raised in UU children's RE and youth programs.

For those college students who were not raised as UUs, we need to remember the literally "lifesaving" message that our UU tradition can offer. For those who were raised in religious traditions that didn't allow for both spirit and intellect, we offer salvation. For those who were "spiritually abused" as children or youth by their religious upbringing that didn't respect the worth and dignity of the individual, we offer salvation. And for those who are even ostracized and condemned by both secular and religious groups (e.g. Bisexual, Gay, Lesbian, and Transgender college students), we offer salvation. We may or may not agree on whether religion can save souls in the hereafter, but we can save lives and heal suffering right here and right now.

Lifespan Religious Education (Continued)

While liberal voices can be found on college campuses, liberal *religious* voices are scarce. UU campus ministry provides this liberal religious voice."

We must remember the main reason for UU Campus Ministry. "**The primary reason for campus ministry is to meet the present spiritual needs of these young adults where they are today.** The early young adult years are a time where both those raised UU and

those not raised UU continue the questioning of the spiritual and ethical ideas that they were raised with. During these critical years in individual faith development, there's a need for a UU faith community that can provide wisdom, guidance, and loving support for this journey."

We can be proud that we provide this faith community by reaching out to Florida State students and other young

adults as well. Keep up the good work, UUCT! And thanks for supporting this mission.

Facilities Update

The UUCT ground-breaking ceremony was led by Rev. Amy on Sunday, March 17. Site work will begin soon. We're working out the final details of the drainage easement we are getting from our neighbor to the north and then should be clear for receiving the environmental permit we need to start site work.

Stakes are marking the boundaries of the areas that will be disturbed during the site work and building construction. Large trees that need special protection while work is going on have pink tape tied around them. The small number of trees that will have to be taken down are marked with orange spray paint.

We have had a favorable response from Tallahassee State Bank regarding a long-term mortgage and a construction loan for the remainder of the three-year Capital Campaign pledge period. We'll be working out details with the bank. Stay tuned and keep an eye out on Sundays for signs of work having started!

What is SUUSI? (Southeast Unitarian Universalist Summer Institute)

SUUSI is an intentional community celebrating its 52nd year in 2002. We are UUs and others who gather for a week in July to explore our interconnectedness, learn new ways of seeing our world and each other, delight in the joys of meeting old friends and making new ones, share outdoor adventures, dance, and sing.

Green Corner

"With the summer sun streaming through the windows, you may have noticed that your home could use a little freshening up. Yet a thorough cleaning might do more harm than good."

Here are some tips on [cleaning house](#) taken from the July 2001 issue of the Union of Concerned Scientists *Greentips* newsletter (ucsusa.org/guides/greentips.html). [DISCLAIMER: Any mention of brand names is only for your convenience and does not constitute endorsement by the Union of Concerned Scientists.]

Though commercial cleansers are effective at cleaning dirt and stains, many are downright dangerous. You know this already if you've ever read the labels:

"Harmful or fatal if swallowed."
"Use only in a well-ventilated areas."
"Causes severe burns on contact."

Warnings like these are so ubiquitous, you may not take them seriously. But you should. The threat is real -- both to your health and to the environment -- when the cleansers are produced, used, flushed down the drain, and disposed of.

The interesting thing is how unnecessary they seem to be. It is remarkably easy to do light cleaning

jobs with old-fashioned, natural cleansers -- and awfully hard to do tough cleaning jobs with even the strongest commercial brands.

If you recognize the truth of this from personal experience, and are sick (perhaps literally) of the fumes, it may be time to explore the alternatives. Following are some homemade mixes, based mostly on baking soda and white distilled vinegar. Don't be afraid to play with the proportions.

ALL-PURPOSE CLEANER - All you need for most cleaning jobs is a few tablespoons of baking soda in a quart of warm water. Or mix some vinegar and salt with warm water.

SCOURING CLEANER - Many brands are made with chlorine bleach, which releases hazardous gases when mixed with ammonia (found in glass cleaners). Try plain salt or baking soda instead. For a disinfectant version, mix equal amounts of baking soda and borax with a little hot water. You can also try a non-chlorine scourer such as Bon Ami.

DRAIN CLEANER - Instead of chemical drain cleaners, which can damage your skin and eyes, pour 1/2 cup of baking soda down the drain, followed by 1/2 cup of vinegar. Wait 15-20 minutes. Then, pour in 1/2

gallon of boiling water. For clogged drains, use a plunger or snake.

TOILET BOWL CLEANER - Like drain cleaners, these can burn your skin and eyes. As an alternative, pour 1/2 cup vinegar and baking soda in the toilet bowl and scrub with a brush. Or scrub with 2/3 cup borax and 1/3 cup lemon juice.

GLASS CLEANER - While commercial glass cleaners are less toxic than many other cleansers, they can still irritate eyes and lungs and cause headaches. You'll find that club soda works just as well, or warm water with a little vinegar.

FURNITURE POLISH - Most commercial brands are made with petroleum distillates, which are flammable. Try olive oil mixed with a little lemon juice. (Experiment on a hidden section of the furniture first.)

FLOOR CLEANER - A mix of equal parts vinegar and warm water is enough for light jobs. Try a vegetable-based liquid soap, like Murphy's Oil Soap, for tougher jobs.

AIR FRESHENER - Get rid of cooking odors by putting out bowls with a little vinegar in them. Scent the air by boiling cinnamon and cloves. Open your windows.

Congregational Actions, March 10, 2002

As Reported by Allen Turnage, Board Secretary

1. Capital Improvement Financing: To authorize the Board to make financial arrangements, using a combination of endowment funds and mortgage indebtedness, to ensure construction of the building option approved by the congregation in September of 2001. The Board may not authorize more than a total of \$450,000 in addition to the capital campaign funds. Arrangements may include taking up to \$350,000 from endowment funds (if and when these funds are available) and /or obligating the church to up to \$200,000 in mortgage indebtedness. [62 in favor, 9 opposed, 5 abstaining]

2. Asking Budget: To approve the Asking Budget for FY 2002-2003 as recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Board and as amended to add \$750 to restore full funding for UUA General Assembly attendance by the minister. [61 in favor, 0 opposed, 5 abstaining]

3. Resolution for a Moratorium on the Death Penalty: To refer the resolution back to committee for editing so that it can be supported by the greatest number of church members, both those who support and those who are opposed to the death penalty itself, and to reconsider the resolution at the

Annual Meeting in May. [43 in favor, 18 opposed, 7 abstaining]

4. Bylaw Changes for Board Reorganization: To adopt changes in the bylaws to formalize reorganization of the UUCT Executive Board and update fiscal terminology, as recommended.

[44 in favor, 0 opposed, 3 abstaining]

In addition, the minutes of the previous congregational meeting in September 2001 were approved.
