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MINISTER'S MESSAGE

I still have a tape of Michael W. Smith's song with the line: "...friends are friends forever, if the Lord's the Lord of them, and a friend will not say, "Never" 'cause the welcome will not end...." I typed that from memory, because I was a Teen-Aged Evangelical. Michael W. Smith is a Christian Singer/Songwriter and he's coming to town this month. With Franklin Graham. And they are here in Tallahassee to "save lost souls." To be contrary, and correct, I'm sure I found and redeemed my soul when I committed to Unitarian Universalism in my 20s. And I became easier to live with too. (Check out your dictionary for the definition of "redeem" – I think it applies to this saving, liberal faith!) But in my teens, after youth conference with the Campus Crusade for Christ, I would torment my friends to accept Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior.

I'm afraid that after this festival, when people have gotten the message to go out and "save lost souls", the youth in this congregation will be confronted by a friend who went, but in some metaphorical way, they'll actually face "me" in the guise I took on way before I was "Rev. Amy, UU Minister." I don't think it was a very attractive façade, or soul, that was "saved" for Jesus.

After Festival 2001 packs up, we may find out how sincere is the "welcome" of Christian Friends. I know it's different than the one I say each Sunday: Come, Come whoever you are (okay, maybe THAT part would fly at Festival 2001, but would: "Holding various beliefs?!" Would: "Whomever you love?!") Would it be success or failure for the organizers if

you went to the Festival and returned home in all your integrity as a religious liberal, who was open to ongoing revelation of sacred truth, from many sources? A religious liberal who values: diversity, reason, love in many forms, asking questions, searching for answers, and social justice?! If the Lord's not the lord of you, will you be a valued friend to whom someone can commit their love and affection "forever" without pestering you to give in to their creed and their religious metaphors?!

The Festival organizers have been clear that teens and young adults are their target audience. Concerts by Christian musicians like Michael W. Smith are their method for hooking a captive audience; then Franklin Graham will deliver his message.

I'm here to say that Unitarian Universalist youth and young adults are "just fine, thank you!" The campus group, University Unitarian Universalists, is known for offering innovative, fun, and inspirational Sunday services in the sanctuary. With good music.

Speaking of music, I'm sure that the following rap song, written by UUCT middle-schoolers Trey and Melissa, will not be on the Festival 2001 song list. That's too bad; I think this rap has something to offer the MTV generation, too!

FROM THE ADULT RE CHAIRPERSON

ADULT RELIGIOUS

EDUCATION - it doesn't exactly roll off the tongue! There will be many new and exciting changes and opportunities with Adult RE, including the opportunity to give it a new name. I have recently become Adult RE Committee Chair and am in the process of learning about the UU curriculum and getting many creative ideas from people in the congregation. Let me tell you what is happening now and what we are planning for the future.

EVENSONG is an eight-week series of gatherings or "Covenant Groups" using a curriculum developed by Barbara Hamilton-Holway. It provides a simple structure to engage the participants in deepening selfunderstanding and strengthening interpersonal bonds. Each evening gathering follows an order of service that includes singing, listening to readings drawn from a bowl, personal sharing by each participant, and a closing circle. Topics include spiritual experiences, the divine, human nature, spiritual teachers, religious community, loss and death, and personal ministry. Listening is at the core of Evensong. Listening strengthens relationships and community. The first Evensong group began meeting on March 22 with seven participants and will continue through the end of May. It is our hope that when the program is completed each participant will begin and lead an Evensong group or other Adult RE gathering so that we will have seven Covenant Groups and continue to build from there. Ultimately we want to provide an opportunity for everyone to participate.

RCDC IDEAS - The Racial and Cultural Diversity Committee has two ideas for new programs. The first is called, "Weaving the Fabric of Diversity". This is an eight session highly participatory anti-bias program designed for groups of eight to twenty. Our goal is to begin these sessions in September. The second series of gatherings will be based upon a book by Thandeka, a Unitarian minister and associate professor of theology and culture at Meadville Theological School. Her most recent book is Learning to Be White: Money, Race and God in America. Thandeka's ideas are very provocative and can provide a forum for discussion in which people can begin to overcome the "toxicity and

racism that have broken us." **SURVEY IN APRIL -** We want to be as inclusive as possible and provide a variety of interesting opportunities for adults. We are putting together a survey which will be distributed and collected on the second Sunday in April. The survey will give you a chance to let the Adult RE Committee know what kinds of programs you would like to have presented for your intellectual and spiritual growth. The survey will also give you the opportunity to come up with a new name for Adult RE. Use your vivid imagination! Sheila Meehan (smeehan@hklaw.com).

OUR UU HERITAGE: JOHN AND JUDITH MURRAY

Excerpts from: A Faith People Make by Stephen Kenrick

Born in England in 1941, John Murray was a Methodist minister who came under the influence of the early Universalist James Relly. Declaring that "God is a loving God," Relly had decided that the doctrines about hell and damnation were untrue. After being voted out of Methodism, losing his wife and son to illness, and being sent to debtors prison, John Murray emigrated to America in 1770.

When Murray's ship landed on the New Jersey Coast near Good Luck Point, he met Thomas Potter, who convinced him to preach in his little meeting house on the message of Universalism. This began Murray's ministry in America, and slowly he earned a reputation as a talented and controversial speaker.

Murray was appointed Chaplain of the Rhode Island regiment in the Revolutionary army. After the war, he began a 20-year ministry in Gloucester, Massachusetts and also married Judith Sargeant Stevens. In 1793, he become minister of Boston's First Universalist Society. Murray was eventually recognized as the father of American Universalism. Though there were other great pioneers of Universalism, Murray organized them into a cohesive denomination and clarified their thought.

Judith Murray published many essays, collected them into a book, and also had two plays produced in Boston. Such a career was unheard of at the time, and she remains an important figure in the history of women's rights. She is rightly called America's first real feminist for her essay "The Equality of the Sexes" and is an important literary figure whose work is just now being rediscovered. She also had a great influence on Murray and the development of Universalism.

To increase the Campus Ministry Program's efforts to recruit Friends of Campus Ministry from outside UUCT and to approve the request to have a table on Campus Ministry Sunday, March 25, for selling social action T-Shirts and bumper stickers and for distributing information on the Friends program.

To accept the Treasurer's report for February 2001.

To authorize the VP for RE to form a search committee to find a new DRE, due to Michelle Buhite's resignation as of April 30, 2001. (The Search Committee is to be composed of at least: The VP for RE, the Youth and Adult RE chairpersons, the Minister, and a member of the Personnel Committee.)

Per the recommendation of the Capital Improvement Committee, to name Mad Dog Design and Construction Company as the Construction Manager for building Phase 1 of our Master Site Plan, with the scope of Phase 1 to be determined by the congregation following the Capital Campaign.

To authorize the CIC to negotiate a contract with Mad Dog for signature by the Board President, and once the contract is signed, to proceed with those pre-construction tasks which can be done without knowing the exact scope of Phase 1. (These tasks are: filing for a land use compliance certificate, an environmental review,

and soil borings.)

FACILITIES PLANNING UPDATE

CONSTRUCTION MANAGER SELECTION. As reported last month, the Capital Improvement Committee spent February and early March selecting a Phase 1 Construction Manager (CM) to recommend to the Board. The CM will coordinate the permitting process, work with the committee and our architects during the development of detailed building plans (advising us on materials, costs and methods), and then serve as our contractor during construction (soliciting bids from subcontractors and supervising and coordinating their work). With twelve committee members present at our March 8, 2001 meeting, the CIC unanimously agreed to recommend that Mad Dog Design and Construction Company be our CM; and with eight Board members present on March 15, the Board unanimously approved the CIC recommendation. The reasons for recommending Mad Dog and some information about them follow.

REASONS FOR SELECTION.

Following the one-hour session to introduce interested contractors to our project and the contractor interviews with the CIC, members of the committee gathered further information on the two contractors interested in our project. This included speaking with subcontractor and client references, making office visits, and visiting construction projects completed or in progress.

The information all pointed to the

same conclusion: While both companies would be good, solid firms with which to work, one of them, Mad Dog Design and Construction, would be superior to work with. "Mad Dog really works with you", "They emphasize quality and trust", and "They have a reputation for stepping outside the box and seeing things differently" were heard over and over. Mad Dog has a history of being innovative, responsive, honest, sensitive to the environment and socially conscious. In outlook, they are a match with UUCT. They also have experience working with a number of private, non-profit organizations including two churches.

ABOUT MAD DOG. The following excerpts are taken from Mad Dog's story about themselves. To learn more, stop by the CIC table on Sundays, pick up a copy of *The Mad Dog Story: We're Building More Than Buildings*, and look through the other material about them.

"As founding members of the Miccosukee Land Co-op our first design/build projects were our own homes. Early collective works included heavy timber residential construction, custom millwork packages, architectural stairs, prefabricated hot tub kits and a geodesic dome. So different were the designs, materials and methods that in 1974 the Leon County Chief Building Official changed the original name of MD Construction on a building permit to Mad Dog. In 1977 we incorporated the name Mad Dog Design and Construction Company and the rest is history..."

"Before long the name Mad Dog became synonymous with energy efficient design. By 1980 Mad Dog had begun creating energy efficient communities. We designed and built over two hundred and fifty homes within our award winning residential neighborhoods, Blairstone Forest, Sunrise Community and Twin Lakes....Interspersed among the hundreds of homes in our residential communities were scores of custom homes we designed and then constructed on our clients' land...."

"Our house raising work parties at the Co-op were the forerunners for much of our community work. The Chaires Elementary School playground, a house for WFSU Public Television's auction, the Miccosukee Land Co-op's community center and swimming pool, a gazebo at Tallahassee's Lake Ella, a house for troubled youth at Disc Village, the dining hall at the YMCA's Camp Indian Springs, a maintenance facility at the Tallahassee Museum, many Housing Foundation volunteer projects and Habitat builds have all involved our coordination - most often with many eager volunteers, tools in hand, awaiting instructions!"

"Beginning in 1984 with converting the old Joe's Spaghetti House/Seafox Lounge into an office building, commercial construction projects gained more and more of Mad Dog's attention....It soon became evident that our clients were looking for a single ally to coordinate their entire projects. Soon after we began providing commercial clients with complete Design/Build services, we joined in the development of two commercial office parks, Governor's Park followed by Commonwealth Park....Today, whether as General Contractor or the Design/Builder, our name is associated with projects as far away as Charlotte, North Carolina and as diverse as The Moon Musical Hall and the Tallahassee General Aviation Terminal...."

"Although the foundation of Mad Dog's reputation is directly related to our responsive service to our clients, Mad Dog and its associates are recognized as community leaders and contributors. Mad Dog's selection as the first Tallahassee business to be recognized as a 'Volunteer of the Year' by the Tallahassee Chamber of Commerce is indicative of our belief in the integration of business success with civic responsibility."

PRE-CONSTRUCTION TASKS. In addition to the selection of Mad Dog as our CM, the CIC recommended and the Board approved using money already in the Future Fund to proceed with pre-construction tasks which can be accomplished prior to knowing the exact scope of Phase 1. These tasks include:

- Filing for a Land Use Compliance certificate,
- Having a pre-application conference with the City regarding permitting,
- Completing a Phase 1 environmental review for the City, and
- Having soil borings done. We will begin these tasks as soon as we have a signed contract with Mad Dog. Accomplishing them will put us in a position to move ahead quickly once the Capital Campaign is over and the congregation decides on the exact scope of Phase 1.

DENOMINATIONAL AFFAIRS

On Feb. 17th, Norene Chase and I traveled to Lakeland to attend the Florida District Annual Social Justice Conference. The ambitious conference addressed reasons for finding alternative solutions on two significant issues, the Death Penalty, and the War on Drugs. The Unitarian Universalist Association has a long tradition of

opposition to the Death Penalty/ Capital Punishment and has approved 5 different General Resolutions expressing such opposition since 1961. Abraham Bonowitz, Director of Floridians for Alternatives to the Death Penalty, was one of the speakers and capably discussed his organization's advocacy for a moratorium on application of the death penalty in Florida for many reasons, including the increased frequency of DNA evidence proving the innocence of persons on Death Rows nationwide. John Chase (no relation to Norene) spoke on Alternatives to the American Drug War. This topic, the UUA Study Issue for this year, has been discussed for several months here at UUCT under the leadership of Allen Turnage and Toni Latino.

In other District news, on March 24th, Rev. Amy conducted the Worship Workshop for the Super Saturday Seminar in Jacksonville. As many UUCT members can attest, Super Saturdays are great leadership training events.

In upcoming events, the Florida District Annual Assembly will be held April 6-8 at the Canterbury Retreat and Conference Center in Oviedo, near Orlando. The theme is "Growth SpUUrts: Flowing Toward Wholeness". June 21-25 are the dates for the UUA General Assembly which will be held in Cleveland, Ohio this year. Information on both Assemblies is posted on the Denominational Affairs bulletin board at the rear of the church. Don't miss the Sunday service which will be presented April 29th by the many UUCT members who were impressed greatly by last year's GA in Nashville, TN and who threw a great party for Rev. Amy who was granted her Final Fellowship.

GREEN SANCTUARY PROGRAM

WORKSHOP & POTLUCK DINNER, SATURDAY, APRIL 14

"Homo sapiens are poised to become the greatest catastrophic agent since a giant asteroid collided with the Earth sixty-five million years ago, wiping out half the world's species in a geologic instant." (Richard Leakey and Roger Lewin, The Sixth Extinction).

On Saturday, April 14, 2001 from 3-8 PM, UUCTers interested in the

UUA Green Sanctuary Program will hold a workshop/potluck dinner to explore having the church become a Green Sanctuary. Everyone in the congregation is invited including children, and child-care will be provided.

While the U.S. can claim only 5% of the world's population, it is currently responsible for 20% of the greenhouse gas emissions from human sources (Brower and Leon, 1999). The average American in the 1990's used 50-100 times the energy of the average Bangladeshi (McNeill, 2000). As the "developing nations attempt to mirror the increased standard of living that the industrialized nations have achieved, the overall consumption of energy will grow, and the problem will worsen greatly."

The Seventh Principle Project -Green Sanctuary Program is a collection of effective strategies for maximizing the impact of a congregation on the environmental challenges facing our cities, counties, states, nation and world.

Plans are still being drawn up for a specific agenda but arrangements have been made with "Heart of the Earth", a local organization committed to minimizing the impact of humans on earth, to provide a thought provoking presentation on the role humankind has played in altering planet earth.

UUCTers interested in the Green Sanctuary Program will present material contained in the Green Sanctuary Handbook, describe concepts and processes involved with our church becoming a Green Sanctuary and discuss its relationship to our Seventh Principle.

As an aid to congregations that wish to follow these guidelines, and to provide some standardization for the use of the term "Green Sanctuary", the Seventh Principle

Project manages an accreditation program for recognizing Unitarian-Universalist Green Sanctuary churches and fellowships that have undertaken the simple process outlined in the handbook.

The first step for congregations interested in the process, is to discuss and understand the five key goals of the program: 1) Building an awareness of societal environmental issues among UUs, 2) Generating commitment for personal lifestyle changes, 3) Motivating UUs to community action on environmental issues, 4) Building connections between spiritual practice and environmental consciousness, and 5) Building awareness of and rectifying environmental injustice. Developing a Green Sanctuary is accomplished by evaluating performance as a result of specific actions taken in the six key areas: 1) Energy conservation, 2) Reduce/ Reuse/Recycle, 3) Church communication, 4) Religious education, 5) Worship, and 6) Environmental Justice.

It is toward this end of developing a strong community ethic of responsible consumption in a spiritual framework that this workshop is being held, and it is hoped that this workshop will provide an informative first step for the challenges ahead. An attempt will be made to involve children for at least some of the program, and we are hopeful that gathering around a bountiful potluck meal after the presentations will provide all participants an opportunity to interact and share relevant ideas toward lightening our footprint on the face of our planet.
