## Canvass Campaign Report

The good news is that pledges received at the March 12 Pledging Party and over the past two weeks from approximately 70% of the congregation amount to \$169,600, or 76% of the Asking Budget pledge goal for FY2006-2007.

The bad news is that we have not heard from the other 30% of the

congregation, and we still need additional pledges of \$53,650 to meet the Asking Budget, and to fund a strengthened ministry and religious education program. Unfortunately, by the time you receive this report there will be less than ten days remaining before we must "put the budget to bed" and start cutting programs.

# What is a Child Dedication or Naming?

A Child or Youth Dedication Ceremony is a traditional Unitarian Universalist ritual of accepting the parents' and congregation's responsibilities in the religious development of the child or youth and welcoming her or him into participation in the beloved community. Verbal commitments are made to nurture and support. The participants are then dedicated to a life of love and service to the world and to one of creative possibility and meaning.

Any age child or youth may participate, both those new to our church community and those who have been here awhile. Our church has a group ceremony once a year, but it is also possible for members to arrange individual ceremonies. For the group ceremony during a Sunday service, we will learn why children were given their names and the hopes that parents have for their children.

A Child Naming Ceremony is a similar UU ritual usually done for infants. These are two of the special ceremonies our church has to recognize our youths' transitions in life.

## Green Corner



After opening your utility statements lately you may be asking "How do I pay these surging energy bills?" Our Building and Grounds Committee can show you how! Below find examples of their solutions for UUCT. This text is taken directly from our Green Sanctuary Certification Report to the UU Ministry for the Earth. Check out the full report at the Green Sanctuary Committee Sunday table; we'll be voting to approve the report at the Annual Meeting in May.

#### **Energy Efficiencies**

- Conducted two energy audits, one of the old building in 2001 and a second energy audit in 2005 to include both facilities.
- Installed high efficiency dishwasher in kitchen, resulting in decreased water consumption, more efficient energy use, and a reduction of landfill space (by eliminating throw-aways).

- Turned off hot water in restrooms.
- Performed maintenance on air conditioners for top efficiency operation. Newest unit has a 13 SEER rating.
- Placed air conditioning/heating systems on programmable timers.
- Placed all outdoor spotlights on sensors or timers. Gradually converting courtyard lights to compact fluorescents.
- Replaced, where possible, incandescent and older fluorescent bulbs with more efficient compact fluorescent bulbs in both buildings, most recently replacing old tube lights in the kitchen.
- Installed weather stripping on doors leading to sanctuary.

#### **Grounds**

 Implemented woodland tree planting, based on a habitat model, using native trees and shrubs.

- Adopted TAPP (Think About Personal Pollution) best management, water-friendly landscape practices.
- Held monthly "work days" to increase awareness of the ecosystem and encourage commitment to enhancing and preserving buildings and grounds.

Our hats are off to the outstanding stewardship of our Building and Grounds Committee! In addition to chair Dave Harvey, they are: Don Berger, Tom Chase, Q. Michele Davidson, Trudy Deyle, Chris Ellrich, George Knight, Steve Urse and Francis Ventre. Joan Patterson (patterson090@comcast.net or 1714 Ferndale Place, Tallahassee, 32301). Deadline for submission is June 18, 2006.

- The proposed items will then be taken to the Board for approval at the July Board meeting. If additional discussion or clarification by the Board is needed, or if the Board recommends substantial changes, the items will go back to the originating committee and placed on the agenda for the next Board meeting.
- Once the new or revised policies or committee descriptions are approved by the Board, the changes will be incorporated in the

- new 2006-2007 Manual of Policies and Procedures that will be printed and distributed in early September. The Bylaws require that the new manual be printed and distributed within the first three months of each new fiscal year so our deadline is September 30.
- 5. Copies of the manual are available in the church office if you wish to see any current versions.
- Proposed new and revised items that are received after June 18 will be considered for incorporation in next year's manual.

### February and March Board Actions

#### **February Board Actions:**

- Approved December minutes and January minutes with revisions.
- Approved the current Treasurer's Report.
- Appointed Dave Harvey to fill the vacancy on the Endowment Committee created by the resignation of Neil Mooney.
- Approved the request of Maria Mena (Yard Sale chairperson) to hold the annual yard sale on Saturday, March 25.
- Approved the revised Accountable Reimbursement Policy Statement for staff professional expenses.
- Approved the Finance Committee recommendation to use \$8000.00 from the Reserve Fund to replace the heating and air conditioning system in the sanctuary.
- Approved the proposed asking budget for FY 2006-2007.
- Approved putting the response to the Draft Statement of Conscience on Global Warming on the 2/26/06 congregational meeting agenda.
- Appointed Eliza Coyne to the Nominating Committee.
- Approved the request for authorization from the Board to spend up to \$450.00 in the current fiscal year for the Settled Minister Search Committee (SMSC) with the provision that the money come from the Reserve Fund.
- Approved that (a) the Board task
  the Committee on Ministry to work
  with the District Compensation
  Consultant (Joan Patterson) to
  develop a settled minister
  compensation package for review
  and approval by the board at its
  special meeting in late April and
  (b) the approved financial package
  be placed on the agenda of the
  annual meeting (May 21) for a vote
  by the congregation.
- Approved the recommendation that the COM (Committee on Ministry) be tasked to address the transitional question of COM

membership with the expectation that, at a minimum, one member of the Negotiating Team with the final settled ministry candidate be tagged to be a member of the COM for at least the first year of settled ministry, per UUA recommendations. The COM will provide a recommendation to the Board for action at its early June 2006 meeting.

Notes from the COM for the Board Meeting:

The Settlement Handbook recommends that the Negotiating Team consist of no more than three people and, at a minimum, that it includes (a) one member of the Board and (b) one member of the SMSC. The SMSC recommends that the third member be a current member of the Committee on Ministry (COM) because of the COM's responsibility for overseeing implementation of the ministry agreement after it is adopted.

Guidance provided by our former UUA Ministerial Settlement Representative, Rhonda Thomason, recommended that the members of the Negotiating Team subsequently comprise the COM for at least the first year of settled ministry, to provide continuity for the minister with the persons with whom he or she negotiated the ministry agreement. However, doing so would contravene our By-Law provisions governing the composition and process for appointing members to our COM. Doing so also runs counter to the COM's efforts to expand the role of the COM from a conventional ministerial relations committee to the church body responsible for facilitating and nurturing all aspects of the congregation's shared ministry.

#### **March Board Actions:**

- The revised January and the February Board Minutes were approved.
- Did not approve recommendations for this year's COM appointee from the Committee on Ministry, with input from the minister.
- Approved accepting precedents with settled ministers and accepted the recommendations made by the interim minister for the next COM appointee.
- Tabled the Personnel Committee recommendation that church policy be amended to require that paid staff not be members of the congregation. (Note: Staff could be or could switch to being supporting friends.)
- Approved, following this year's canvass, sending a letter to members who have not pledged or contributed financially notifying them that their status will be changed to friend unless a minimum contribution sufficient to cover a fixed cost of membership is made or a yearly waiver is granted. (Note: At a minimum, this fixed cost would include what UUCT pays per member in national and district UUA fair share "dues," \$70 for FY 2005-2006 and \$73 for FY 2006-2007.)
- Approved a motion that the minister in addition to the president would have the authority to grant waivers of the recorded contribution membership requirement. (Note: Requires a UUCT by-laws change. Board is looking into further.)

"In addition to the exhilarating beginning banner parade and opening ceremony, the four subsequent days will be filled with thought-provoking, excellent business meetings, workshops, lectures, sermons, services, and much more.... This year's 'Ware Lecture' will be delivered by poet Mary Oliver, winner of the Pulitzer Prize and National Book Award. The sermon at the 'Service of the Living Tradition' will be delivered by Rev. Judith Meyer, minister of the UU Community Church in Santa Monica. The Sunday morning worship will be led by Rev. Gail R. Geisenhainer, the minister in Vero Beach."

"Certified congregations determine which business items are admitted to the final agenda of GA each year. Study/Action Issues (SAIs) and the Statement of Conscience are important pieces of the GA experience....It is hoped every congregation in our association is a part of the social witness

process that gives voice to our faith as we act on our social justice values."

"All certified congregations have a delegate for every 50 members (or fraction there-of), with a minimum of two delegates. There may be additional delegates from each congregation: ministers in full or associate fellowship with the UUA and employed by certified congregations, and emeritus and community ministers who are active in a congregation and have received its endorsement."
