Last month a couple of you helped me edit my Sunday homily (post-delivery) to clarify my position on depression, medication, and faith. I'm grateful for the ongoing conversation with you about ideas, beliefs, and putting our best thoughts into action.

The teaching and learning goes both ways – neither congregation nor clergy person is clueless, or has it all figured out. I came to you with a seminary education, though; and I want to share it. Granted, my Sunday homilies and my leadership are informed by what I learned, but I think UUCT will benefit from an intentional rendering of knowledge. I suppose I could prepare a bunch of Adult RE offerings, but I think what I want to tell you works best from the pulpit.

I've decided to offer a Seminary Sermon Series to answer questions like: What use is suffering? If "God" didn't write the Bible, does it matter? Is it better to be an insider or an outsider? I'll have something to tell you about Native American religious traditions.

The Program Committee and I will work out a topic list and schedule.

Thank you for the stimulating conversation, and your curiosity.

#### **GREEN CORNER**

WAYS TO REDUCE YOUR FOOTPRINT

So, you'd like to salve your conscience and reduce your ecological footprint? Some of the biggest impacts our lifestyles have

on the Earth's resources are those that result from our consumption of energy. Here are a few tips from the www.energyhawk.com website on water heaters which can be responsible for 16 to 25% of home energy use.

New Hot Water Heaters: If you are buying a new hot water heater consider a gas, oil, or propane-fired water heater since they currently cost less to operate than electric heaters. As a general rule of thumb, the smaller the water heater tank, the more efficient it is. So get a tank that holds just enough hot water for the times of the day when you use the most hot water. Heat pump water heaters use less than half as much electricity as conventional electric resistance water heaters. See the friendlyplumber.com website for more details on assessing the energy efficiency of new water heaters: http://www.friendlyplumber.com/ plumbing101/washer\_heater\_ energy.html.

**Insulating Jackets:** Bundle your water heater up in a nice cozy insulating jacket, particularly if the heater was made before 1992. It will reduce the heat lost through the walls of the tank by 25-40 percent. These jackets work well on brand new water heaters as well as old ones, although they lead to more dramatic energy savings on the older models. But don't put a jacket on a model where the manufacturer says not to. And make sure you don't cover the thermostat. Don't restrict the air inlets on gas- or oil-fired water heaters either.

Temperature Settings: Set your water heater at 120 degrees
Fahrenheit [other sources suggest 115 or 125]. That should be plenty comfortable. Each 10 degree reduction in the water temperature setting cuts the heater's energy consumption by 3-5 percent. (You should be washing clothes in the

"warm" or "cold" wash and rinse settings anyway.) Your dishwasher will still get dishes clean if it has an internal heater to finish heating the water to 140 degrees. If it doesn't have an internal heater, keep the water heater at 140 degrees.

Vacations: When you go on vacation, turn the thermostat on the water heater off, or at least turn it down to its lowest possible setting. If your heater has a pilot light, make sure you know how to re-light it when you get back.

Insulating Pipes: Insulate your hot water pipes to reduce heat loss on the way to the tap. Put in heat traps or one-way valves in the pipes to cut loss, too. And insulate the first 3 feet of cold-water pipe connected to water heaters.


