

Minister's Message

Confession time. I've greatly enjoyed "civilian" life; a month of not having to work on Sundays. As I take up the preaching role again, I'll be at church on Sundays. Oh how I'll miss brunches, movies, sleeping in, household repairs, and relaxing weekends. However, over the past month, I have missed you.

I came to serve in shared ministry with you in 1997. Five years – wow! I came as an extension minister, and we had to decide if we wanted to continue to work together. We decided yes, so now I'm your settled minister, and we keep trying to improve our covenant. At least I hope that's what we're doing. I think it would be too easy to settle into a routine, to stay the same, to just get by, to clutch our familiar issues. That's true for me in my vocation, and it's true for each one of us, as individuals and as family members.

Let's consider the length-of-stay statistics for the ministers you've

covenanted with for a period of time. If we don't include your two interim ministers (between settled ministers), these three averaged 5 years: Rev. Violet Kochendofer, 1966-1970; Rev. Dr. Angie Theisen, 1981-1987; Rev. Dr. Jayson Hayes, 1989-1994. I have pondered these numbers and the number seven, a magic number some of us hold as the perfect length of call (when a minister and a congregation covenant together for settled ministry). Here's what I want to do. I want to serve as your minister as long as you have things to teach me, and I have ministry to offer you.

In this sixth year, I'll attend a seminar on long term ministries. There must be more to it than not getting complacent while walking the line between mental education and spiritual edification! In year seven, the Board, Committee on Ministry and I will plan the sabbatical that's in my working agreement. I seek to learn how we will take the next step together.

Thank you to those who have offered unconditional support, those who have offered biting criticism, those who have been faithful churchgoers and steady workers, and those who have given constructive suggestions. I have more to learn from you. We'll determine together what ministry I have to offer you.

Green Corner

Compost is our theme for August. Here's a lovely poem I found buried in my "compost" file. Recipes to follow:

It Takes a Heap of Compost to Make
a House a Mess

By Felicia Lampert

"Come live with me and be my love,"
wrote Marlowe, but he meant,
"Compost with me and rise above
the rather gamy scent;
Exuded while bacterial
activities convert
Old carrot tops and cereal
to rich, nutritious dirt.
Thus proving that the offal piles
we've lived so long among,
Can be subdued by nature's wiles,
Until God's swill is dung."

Following is a recipe for "gourmet"
compost from my former planning
colleague in Syracuse, New York, Paul
Cacchione:

- 1) Clear space for three piles, each at least 6 ft square
- 2) Enclose to a height of 4 to 5 ft with chicken wire and wood or metal posts (metal is probably better in FL)-- the piles can also be contained by other means such as posts and boards, cement blocks, or other building materials; don't use creosoted railroad ties if you plan to use the compost on your vegetable garden!
- 3) Strip the sod and dig a shallow pit (about 6 in.) for the first layer
- 4) Layer as follows to create the first "lift":
 - (a) 6 in. of green wilted vegetable matter from the garden and/or kitchen -- egg shells are a good addition, but they should be dried in the oven until crumbly; similar treatment is necessary for citrus skins; do not place any meat, fat, or
- 5) Water the lift until the moisture content is like that of a wet sponge; do not tamp down
- 6) Repeat to create additional "lifts" until the pile is the desired height
- 7) Taper the sides, hollow out the top to make a basin to hold rainwater, and "shingle" the exterior sides and top with straw or dried grass clippings
- 8) Poke 3 or 4 holes down to the ground with a crowbar
- 9) Turn the pile, by shoveling it into one of the adjacent 6x6 enclosures on the following schedule (it may be possible to shorten this for the warmer Florida summers); in the process, try to turn the pile "inside-out" as well:
 - (a) 3 weeks after the pile is completed
 - (b) 5 weeks after the first turn
 - (c) 4 weeks after the second turn
 - (d) Your first compost is ready to use! (Try serving with a garnish of fresh greens)
- 10) Meanwhile, start the second pile in the third enclosure after

bones in the compost unless you want "help" from raccoons, possums, skunks, etc.

- (b) 2 in. of manure -- fresh cow or horse manure is best; chicken manure is too strong (too much nitrogen); composted manure (e.g. from a garden store) is an alternative, but it doesn't have as much nitrogen in it
- (c) sprinkling of wood ashes or powdered lime
- (d) 1 in. of seasoned compost (from the second pile or use some rich soil for the first pile)

completing step 8 for the first pile

I've never followed this recipe religiously, but I have used it with some fudging, e.g. no straw "shingling" or crowbar pokes, and produced very yummy compost.

Here's a second, slightly less ambitious recipe from a 1991 calendar published by the Virginia Cooperative Extension Service, thanks to Barbara Hogan:

- 1) Prepare the site as in steps #1-3 above
- 2) Layer as follows:
 - (a) Start with 3 in. of coarse garden waste such as small twigs or chopped corn stalks
 - (b) Add 3 in. of finer garden plant material (leaves, grass, weeds) and kitchen vegetable matter; no animal products
 - (c) Add 3 in. of nitrogen-rich material: fresh manure, fresh grass clippings, or succulent green weeds
 - (d) If the plant material does not contain soil, add a sprinkling of soil to each layer
- 3) Repeat to create additional "lifts" until the pile is the desired height
- 4) Hollow out the top to make a basin to hold rainwater
- 5) Water the whole pile as often as necessary to keep the contents moist but not soaking wet
- 6) Turn the pile about once a month for 3 - 5 months

Yum! Your vegetables and ornamentals will be beseeching you for second helpings.



Important FL District News

At General Assembly in Quebec City an overwhelming majority voted to pass the by-law amendment providing for separate Trustee positions on the UUA Board for the Florida and Mid-South Districts. This means that both districts will need to amend by-laws regarding Trustee elections. Florida will hold elections within the next year for a Trustee to begin a two year term at GA 2003 in Boston. Trustees are elected in two groups to ensure continuity; both the Florida and Mid

South Trustees are in group A, and regular elections for a four year term will take place in both Districts in 2005.

The proposed Florida District by-law changes will be sent to congregations with the call to meeting next spring, to be voted on at the District Annual Assembly. Amendments to the by-laws require a positive vote of 3/4 of the delegates present.

In lieu of an Election Committee serving both districts (Lyn Conley will

continue to serve the Mid-South District), the Nominating Committee of the Florida District will be asked to entertain nominations for the Florida Trustee position vacancy. According to current by-laws each member society may nominate one candidate for the Trustee position, with the candidate's permission.

Nominations for the Trustee position will be sent to congregations in the call to meeting prior to Annual Assembly, with the election taking place at the Annual Assembly.

FL District List

All Florida UUs are encouraged to join the Florida District list. "The purpose of the list (fd-l@uaa.org) is for the exchange of information relevant to district events, projects and activities and to facilitate support for the work of the congregations within the UUA Florida District." Congregations can

use the fd-l e-mail list as a bulletin board for inviting other Florida UUs to special events they sponsor. The list can also be a terrific way to share successful ideas congregations have implemented or to ask for ideas on implementing a program, addressing a particular issue, etc. It's a good

opportunity to help strengthen Florida UU congregations.

What's In a Structure?

The District Board transitioned into the Policy Governance model of doing their work in 2000-01. As we moved into working in this model, the District Board developed six Ends of the District. My functioning as the District Executive changed to assume the responsibility for the development of the programs that would fulfill the Ends. The ends are found at the end of this article.

We began to see difficulties in achieving these Ends when there were so many groups fulfilling their particular piece of each one and no one responsible or accountable for the whole. Thus, the concept of the Ends Council was born. The original District committees were eliminated and in their place six councils were established. Those councils are the *Leadership, Growth and Extension,*

Social and Racial Justice, Living Tradition, Communication / Connection, and Stewardship. The chairs of the Ends Councils are **Rev. Jack Donovan** (Gainesville), *Leadership*; **Brenda Verbeck** (St. Augustine), *Living Tradition*; **Nancy Bass** (Tallahassee), *Social and Racial Justice*; and **Jim Moir** (Spirit of Life), *Growth and Extension*. At this time four of the six are up and running well.

We invite you to join your voice with theirs for the good of us all. The members of these councils are from all over the District and represent small, lay-led congregations, mid-size congregations, new churches; and are staffed with lay volunteers, ministers and religious educators. The energy and vision that is infecting these groups bodes well for our future.

The six ends of the District are that congregations will:

Be connected to the District and one another and the communities in which we live;

Have well trained, knowledgeable and competent leaders;

Grow in total membership and in number of congregations;

Champion social and racial justice and oppose oppression;

Be grounded in our living tradition;

View the District as a responsive, creative and prudent steward of financial and human resources.
