

The Program Committee and I have planned Sunday services through November. On Sundays and every day our common charge is the same. Welcome the Newcomer. Seek Truth. Establish Justice. Green the Earth. Use Power with Care. Depend on Your Neighbor. Practice Forgiveness. Give Thanks for Life.

was once rather homophobic, too.) I spoke to Don about his having avoided "the word", and he admitted it was deliberate. That's fine: it was his pulpit and no one could have used it better.

This is the site for the Covenant of Unitarian Universalist Pagans, from which I quote: "Contemporary Pagans, including UU Pagans, use the term Pagan or Neopagan because it places them squarely in solidarity with all of those men and women of the past and the present who have suffered persecution, torture and even death for their beliefs and the right of religious freedom. This is the same reason some forms of Paganism will also use the word Witch - to stand in solidarity

In 1995, after years of debate and consideration, a sixth "source of our living traditions" was formally added to the U.U. principals. It is what Don spoke on this week at length: "Number 6. Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature."

So Don, I applaud you for having given us such a terrific presentation. And I remind the reader that as to paganism, Unitarian Universalists have come out of the closet. We are more than just tolerant: we are supportive.

#### **Our Whole Lives (OWL)**

If you're considering enrolling your middle schooler in Our Whole Lives age-appropriate, ethics and sexuality curriculum this year, you might be interested to know a little about its facilitators (Chelsea Fox and Scott Geraci). We know how important your children and their education are to you!

#### From Chelsea Fox:

I decided to become an OWL facilitator because I know the immense value of this program. When I was in the 7<sup>th</sup> grade, I took OWL's previous incarnation, AYS (About Your Sexuality). AYS was invaluable to me, although at the time I thought I didn't need it – I already knew everything! I had taken sex-ed classes in school; what else was there to know? My parents knew there was more to sex than biology. They also knew I was more likely to listen to someone other than them when it came to talking about sexuality. In my limited experience, I had no idea about the subtle complexities of interpersonal relationships. AYS gave me the knowledge, strength and skills necessary for me to find my way through the haze of hormonally driven teenage chaos.

Today we offer OWL, a revised and expanded version of the course I took when I was 13. The comprehensiveness of the OWL curriculum is what sets it apart from the other sex-ed curricula most kids are exposed to. The values that are emphasized throughout the course are what makes OWL so unique and visionary. Whether we're talking about dating, gender roles, or messages in the music we listen to, the values of respect, responsibility and diversity are clearly applied. That is why I believe in OWL and why I am participating in its facilitation. I believe I will not only help these kids learn some important life skills, I will also take something valuable from this experience myself.

#### From Scott Geraci:

Our world has vastly changed from when I was a teenager. Growing up, the information I could get was very limited. Today, technology has made the gathering of information easier. With a click of the mouse, my teenager can access information much faster than I could have ever imagined. The chance for misinformation also has grown. The fact that teenagers love to chat, email, and gossip makes the likelihood of incorrect information being passed on almost a given. For this reason I believe my teenager needs O.W.L.

I feel lucky that we offer such a sensitive, thoughtful, and valuable service to our teenagers. Many of the principles we hold dear, as Unitarian Universalists, are also integral parts of the curriculum for Our Whole Lives.

That OWL is being offered through our – church only reinforces the importance \_ of this class.

This class is a gift we can give to our kids. I remember well the awkwardness and uneasiness I felt as a teenager. The changes we go through during this brief time can wreak havoc on our minds and bodies. A lack of proper information can only compound that feeling of uncertainty. That is why I am I enrolling my teenager in this class. It is also why I volunteered to be one of the instructors.

Chelsea and I both share the same passion for this course and feel we will make a great team. We will have a parent orientation where you can learn, in more detail, about the curriculum. Feel free to contact either one of us with any questions.

Our Whole Lives for 6<sup>th</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grade is a year long program. Classes will take place on Sundays, at UUCT, during regularly scheduled RE time. Due to the nature and intensity of the program, class time will run from 10:30 AM to 12:30 PM. OWL Registration will be during regular RE registration. OWL Orientation is in September. ## Green Corner

#### Energy Star Washer/Dryer

I love my stack washer/dryer. Needing more space and needing to purchase a new washer and dryer, I chose the Sears Kenmore stackables. These are two independent units that can be placed side by side for lots of folding space on top, or on top of each other to save floor space.

The front-loading style washer saves 67% of water and about 77% of the electricity of the traditional top-loading style, resulting in about \$101 savings per year. Therefore, the extra cost (about \$150) is well worth the savings for me and definitely worth the savings for the earth. In addition, I use about half the amount of detergent, and generally use cold water. During a City energy audit I was told that warm water is not necessary if using a detergent with enzymes. So, read the labels. Tide has enzymes.

There's additional savings in the drying process because the final spin of the washer is very fast and extracts a lot more water than the spin in top-loading washers. Before the dryer was installed on top of the washer, I was hanging my clothes on a line to dry and the first sheet was dry by the time I hung the last item. A "solar dryer" would be even more economical, but my new dryer uses about 22% less energy to dry clothes washed in the energy efficient washer because of the fast final spin.

The front opening appears small, but the wash tub can handle a queen size federal dollars, and tack-ons to bills that would erode the gains for women's www.uua.org/ga/ga03/ plus you may rights made in recent decades.

comforter. I now wash at home the heavy winter jackets and other items that previously went to the laundromat. This front-loading style costs more, but remember that you'll save about 50% in energy costs. "A DOE-sponsored demonstration of an energy-efficient washer in a Boston suburb has produced such striking results that the Massachusetts legislature is using the research results to support a bill that would make ENERGY STAR appliances tax-exempt in that state." (From Buildings Technology Center.)

My washer has the Energy Star certification. You can go to www.energystar.gov to get information on 38 product categories. I invite you to come to Oyster Bay and see my new stackable washer and dryer.

#### **Farewell To Charlie Terrell**

For almost two decades, at Winter Solstice, a great Christmas tree would rise up at the front of our church sanctuary -- a gift from South Georgia tree-farmer Charlie Terrell, a long-time Friend of UUCT.

Charlie died on Saturday, July 19th in the hospital in Cairo, after a lengthy illness following abdominal surgery. He turned 86 on May 30th.

We remember our "Santa Claus," Charlie, in other ways too. Charlie loved to travel and take fellow UUs with him, often visiting Grand Opera Houses in New York and elsewhere -his longtime magnificent obsession. Look at Charlie's face and you would see Giuseppe Verdi's (Charlie's favorite operatic composer). In the mid-80s, I got to attend two weeklong summer roadshows of the New York Metropolitan Opera in Atlanta with Charlie. Mine was the cheapest seat,

in the high balcony; Charlie sat in the most expensive, a front-row seat. Between acts, I'd run down to share Charlie's enthusiastic impressions of the opera that night. Charlie's plantation tree-farm, where he shared his great love of Nature, is being donated to the State of Georgia.
