Sabbatical Snippet

Next week (the last in July), I'll meet one of my sabbatical goals: to defend democracy while keeping the faith. The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (www.uusc.org) is a social justice group with workcamps for youth and adult UUs (and others). It's grassroots summer camp for 38-yearolds like me.

Location: Boston (during the Democratic National Convention; another workcamp is in New York city during the Republican one).

Purpose: Learn about voter registration and apply those skills in Boston, and back home.

A Guy I Hope I Don't Meet There: The Old Testament God. I don't worry about an early demise, but that character has been tossed around by both the right and the left. And I don't like it. The image of divinity in the Hebrew Scriptures is multifaceted, complex, and even self-contradictory. On any given day, I'll take THAT god over a caricature: that's what I think the so-called Old Testament God has become.

The Old Testament God resembles Yahweh, as much as a gag cartoon portrait resembles the subject. Those drawings magnify one or two characteristics: big ears, fancy or casual clothes, a shiny watch. Like a gag cartoon portrait, The Old Testament God accentuates only a few aspects of Yahweh (vengeance, strict or silly laws about behavior and outlandish punishments). Many aspects of the god portrayed in the Hebrew Scriptures are skipped over (creativity, caring, justice).

I would have done well to remember the creativity/caring/justice bits when one of my nephews took the other nephew's cheesy goldfish snack treat. The nanny cam would have shown an unpleasant sight: Aunt Amy fishing the loot out of the young offender's mouth. (Not my finest moment!) I hope it won't be long before I learn this particular lesson: even if "the offender" (c'mon, he's 3!) gloats (that selfsatisfied, whatcha gonna do about it grin), creativity/caring/justice guides us to put energy into healing the rift between the wronged and the wrong.

Otherwise, as I did, the one who intervenes is wrong too and the one who wronged the wronged is, likewise, wronged. That's exponentially more wrong than we need. Rather, focus on the injured party, find out what would make it right, take steps to restore friendly relations. And if they're 3, maybe schedule a Time Out.

Go, justice, go!

Covenanting for Excellence in Religious Education

The word *covenant* has broad meaning. It is traditional religious language that refers to a "solemn agreement" or "promise from the heart." The roots come from the covenants of the Hebrew scriptures, and later in the Christian scriptures, as a means of describing the relationship between God and God's people. Covenantal relationships were established by early Protestant congregations and their clergy, including Unitarian congregations.

Today, our association of Unitarian Universalist congregations covenant together to affirm and promote a set of principles and purposes that represent the core values we share. Many of our congregations enter into covenantal relationships with their ministers.

Developed by the Unitarian Universalist Association in the early 1990's, *Covenanting for Excellence in Religious Education* is a facilitated process between a religious educator and a congregation for purposes of identifying a set of mutually agreedupon commitments. This covenantal process considers present expectations of the congregation and outlines mutual hopes for the future of its lifespan religious education program. It may be used as a tool for growth and deeper understandings for the congregation and religious educator, with identified resources, mutual commitments, and support systems. It can specify results expected and how these results will be achieved.

The covenant should be a living document that represents more than a list of objectives and aspirations; it reflects a commitment to ongoing congregational transformation. A covenant reflects the quality of the relationships involved, rather than the contractual dimensions of employment.

As part of our strategic plan to strengthen our lifespan RE program, the church Board and staff have arranged for the specialized *Covenanting for Excellence in Religious Education* workshop to be conducted by a trained RE covenant facilitator. A weekend of events surrounding this process is planned.

On Friday, September 24, 6 :30 PM, in the sanctuary, we will be hosting a **Covenanting Kick-off Party**. Come enjoy the camaraderie of our wonderful congregation and get to meet our covenanting facilitator. All are welcome to join in this fun evening! Childcare will be provided.

You are invited to participate in the **Covenant for Excellence in Religious Education Process** scheduled for **Saturday, September 25, from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM** in the sanctuary. A primary focus of this workshop will be the sharing of ideas and suggestions that will help us to clarify our expectations for lifespan religious education in our congregation and our relationship with our religious education professional. All concerned parents, teachers, adult enrichment facilitators and participants, and congregational leaders are encouraged to participate in this facilitated, day-long process. Lunch, snacks, and childcare will be provided.

The covenant that we create through this process will be shared and celebrated during the **Sunday morning worship service on September 26,** followed by a reception in the sanctuary for all ages. We hope to have many guests from the Florida District and other Florida UU churches.

The Covenanting for Excellence in Religious Education promises to be an important part of our congregation's growth and maturation as we shape our lifespan religious education program and vision for the future. We look forward to your participation in this important event in the life of our church! say to another. It means, "And how are the children?" It is still the traditional greeting among the Masai, acknowledging the high value that the Masai always place on their children's well being.

Even warriors with no children of their own would always give the traditional answer, "All the children are well" meaning, of course, that peace and safety prevail; that the priorities of protecting the young, the powerless, are in place; and that Masai society has not forgotten its reason for being, its functions and responsibilities. "All the children are well" means that life is good. It means that the daily struggles for existence do not preclude proper caring for the young.

How might it affect our consciousness of our own children's welfare if in our culture we took to greeting each other

with this daily question: "And how are the children?" If we heard that question and passed it along to each other a dozen times a day, would it begin to make a difference in the reality of how children are thought of or cared about in our own country, our community, and our church? If every adult among us, parent and non-parent alike, felt an equal weight for the daily care and protection of all the children in our community and our church . . . could we truly say without any hesitation, "The children are well, yes, all the children are well."

What would it be like . . . if the minister began every worship service by answering the question, "And how are the children?" If every town leader had to answer the question at the beginning of every meeting: "And how are the children? Are they all well?" Wouldn't it be interesting to hear their answers? What would it be like?

According to Hilary Clinton, children exist in the world as well as in the family. From the moment they are born, they depend on a host of other 'grown-ups' — grandparents, neighbors, teachers, ministers, employers, political leaders, and untold others who touch their lives directly and indirectly. Each of us plays a part in every child's life: It takes a village to raise a child, AND it takes a whole church community to provide quality Religious Education programming.

There are many fun ways to contribute. We need teachers for all age groups! Is this your year to help us out? Offer your time, skills, and interests. We make teaching fun and hopefully...not stressful! Teaching teams of three for each age group allow time for other things like family, church and fun. Curriculum and materials are provided.
