How do we ground our work together in our religious values and communities? It is important that leaders take their own individual spiritual lives seriously. "Check-ins" need not dominate a meeting; be creative with ideas to vary the "check-in" experience. Begin meetings and retreats with spiritual grounding. Honor the different ways that people experience spirituality. Care needs to be given that one "type" does not dominate.

Boards were encouraged to: create a board covenant and revisit it from time to time, perhaps as an opening reading; see conflict as a community-building experience not to be avoided but to be embraced as a growth opportunity; and make a commitment to attend a common worship and community celebration together.

What It Takes to Prepare an Order of Service

It may LOOK like magic, but actually our order of service is the work of many hands. (Alas, we have no Rumpelstiltskin on our staff!) When people wait until the last minute to send me information for the order of service and announcements, it holds up the entire production process. If the information I receive is incorrect or incomplete, I may have to contact others and then wait for answers. Often this means a rushed job and extra work for everyone. When Kristin King and I discussed this matter, she asked me to write an article letting people know the steps involved in creating the order of service and announcements. I hope this information is helpful.

 The lay leader has to send me an outline of the order of service. The Wednesday before the service is the deadline, but the sooner the better. Kristin has to proofread the order of service, and we often need time to resolve any omissions or discrepancies.

- I also have to include other information such as greeters, board member on duty, and music. These all come from different sources.
- If your order of service includes an insert such as a song sheet, I need extra time to prepare it.
- The same goes for the announcements. If you have an announcement for the order of service that was not in *The Meridian*, you should get it to us by Wednesday.
- If the announcement has to do with an outside group, make sure it has been approved by the appropriate committee. That saves a lot of time. If in doubt, consult the Manual of Policies and Procedures in the office.
- Also check with me if the announcement involves a rental issue. I'll tell you whether the requested date and time are available. (Don't assume the

- church will be free for your group, or that the date and time you requested are open, until you have checked it out thoroughly.)
- It takes time to proofread both publications, and this has to fit into my proofreaders' schedules. You need to send everything to us in a timely fashion.
- I print on Friday morning, and I don't like to wait past noon to start. That's when the volunteers arrive to fold the orders of service and stuff the announcements for me.
- As you all know, I also devote a lot of time each month to preparing and mailing *The Meridian* and other church publications. So my workdays are usually pretty busy.
- Please remember that my office hours are 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Thanks, everyone, for helping me to prepare complete and timely publications. I appreciate it!

A Call for Change

Local passions have been aroused by many Tallahassee residents over the re-emergence of "coal-fired electricity" as a possibility for helping meet local electricity demand as Tallahassee grows in coming years. As UUs who stand on the seventh principle, "respect for the interdependent web of life of which we are a part," it's time to focus on our core values and work for change. We need to reduce demand, for starters.

First, we need to educate ourselves thoroughly about the problems and the consequences of our accelerated use of energy. In the documentary "Kilowatt Ours" produced by Jeff Barrie and presented by Steve Urse at the Adult Forum on July 17, the filmmaker asked of random people on the streets: "Do you know where your electricity comes from?" To a person, they did not.

Most of us know ours comes from natural gas, because the issue was thoroughly debated here in the early 1990s. However, costs have risen, as have demands. Certainly our lifestyles are, in part, driving this new debate. It's a complex debate centering on massive problems of global warming, destruction of natural resources, health issues, and costs associated with our current patterns of consumption.

Electricity usage is only one part of this household uses an average of 1,100 consumption.

How can we educate ourselves at UUCT? The Global Climate Change Action Group is studying these issues and will present their findings to the church this fall. There will be other opportunities to learn in future Adult Forums. The Green Sanctuary Committee will continue to make available information at a table on Sunday. There are many church members already spending a great deal of time to become informed on the And visit: www.kilowattours.org issues surrounding the coal-fired electrical plant initiative which will be brought to Tallahassee voters in a referendum this fall. We all need to become educated on energy usage.

Second, we need to make personal changes. Because it's easy to become overwhelmed as you examine the complexities and interdependencies of our energy problems and the deterioration of the environment, let's focus right now on electricity usage. How to begin? I urge each UUCT household to immediately start tracking your personal electricity bills if you haven't already done so. Only then can you set realistic and measurable goals and begin to creatively make changes.

The "Kilowatt Ours" documentary said that in the southeastern states, each

KW hours per month. How is your household cutting consumption of electricity? Let's share ideas with one another. The Green Sanctuary Committee will provide a place for your suggestions at their Sunday table. If each of us participates in this process, I predict a groundswell of creativity, commitment, and change emerging at UUCT, Tallahassee, Florida, U.S.A., the world. If not us, who? If not now, when?
