Committee on Ministry Report Newest Member - Proposed Bylaws Changes

We honor Sara Reece for her dedicated service on the Committee on the Ministry for the past three years. Sara completed her term at the end of June, and Tony Lloyd has been appointed by the Board to fill the vacant position. Maria Mena has begun her second year on the committee, and Bob Deyle has assumed the duties of chair as the senior member of the committee.

A little about our new member, Tony Lloyd – Tony is a budget analyst with the FL Department of Revenue and also a 21-year veteran army officer. He has been an active member of the Finance Committee since joining the church in August 2005 with his wife Hollie, who currently serves on the Settled Minister Search Committee. Tony attended church (mostly Baptist) every Sunday growing up in West Virginia, Kentucky, and Georgia, but became disenchanted with the Christian church in college and has been agnostic for the past 20 years.

Tony and Hollie began attending UUCT shortly before we experienced the upheaval of Rev. Amy's departure. Tony reports that, "As an interested but dispassionate party, I witnessed the congregation face its challenges with openness, frankness, and inclusiveness. The honesty and resolve of the congregation I observed over the ensuing four months convinced me that this is a community worthy of my commitment." He and Hollie hoped to find a "church home" for their family in UUCT. Tony says: "I wanted to find a community where I could grow spiritually without having to accept dogma I no longer believe. I wanted a place where my daughters, Sierra and Drew, could have our teachings of right and wrong, fairness and social equality reinforced. I wanted to find a church that truly accepts and welcomes all human beings." We are very fortunate to have Tony joining the COTM at this time.

One of the principal tasks to which the COTM devoted its time and energies during the past year was to examine its role in the UUCT congregation in the light of contemporary concepts of how committees on the ministry can function most effectively in mid-sized churches. This newer model is described as follows by the Rev. Anne Heller, District Executive of the UUA Pacific Northwest District, in her book, Churchworks: A Well-Body Book for Congregations (Skinner House, 1999): "Committees on Ministry are designed to track the heartbeat of ministry within a congregation; how the members . . . take care of themselves and each other, how the lay ministerial leadership serves a congregation; and how the called minister serves the congregation. It seeks to understand,

assess, support, and advocate for robust ministry throughout the context of congregational life."

The COTM's self-study was punctuated by the experience of Rev. Amy's resignation, and the congregation's efforts to come to terms with her resignation and to move on in ministering to each other and to the greater Tallahassee community. As a result of its self-study and those experiences, and with input from Rev. Bill Murchison and UUA FL District Executive Rev. Mary Higgins, the COTM has proposed some revisions to the UUCT Bylaws. Some of the proposed changes refine the role of the COTM. Others concern the congregation's relationship with the minister.

The UUCT Board reviewed and discussed the proposed revisions with the COTM in early July. Following approval by the Board for a congregational vote, the proposed revisions will be made available in pdf format on the UUCT website and in hard copy at the church. A congregational discussion meeting will be held on Sunday, August 27 to address any questions or concerns that members of the congregation may have. A formal voting meeting on the proposed Bylaws revisions is scheduled for Sunday, September 10.

President's Message Sailors on the Sea of Fate -- Church Navigation

Imagine a waterfall at the edge of the universe. Below in the abyss is Chaos -- utter disorder and dissolution, but also heat and light. Away from the waterfall is perfect order -- frozen and unchanging, but also cold and dark. And we, my friends, are a ship on the sea somewhere between the two. What's more, it's a sailing ship, just because I'm writing this and I think sailing ships are cool. But I digress.

Get too far from the waterfall, and we freeze and stagnate. Perhaps you can imagine this as a church closed to newcomers, cliquish and unwilling to accept new ideas or new energy. But, if we get too close to the waterfall, over we go, sucked down into the chaos. This might happen if a church outpaced its finances, or if the vision of the leadership was not aligned with the congregation. The curious notion they teach in leadership school is that we should hover somewhere near the waterfall, but not too close. We need the change, the uncertainty, and the unknown outcomes near the edge, so we can grow spiritually as a community. But we need surety of our common vision and love for each other to remain a community of faith. This means we have to be willing to take some risks, but we must always be aware of how close we are to the edge, and how much we have to lose.

If you are a church leader (and with the number of committees we have, who isn't?) keep this in mind. What is the vision of your committee or vice presidency or board? What are you going to do this year to bring our church closer to the beloved community that we seek? What are you going to do to challenge us, and yourself, to make a difference in the wider world? And how do your plans fit in with UUCT's mission and vision? Are you sailing into the safety of "what we've always done?" Surely you are not charging recklessly over the edge! What will you and your part of the ship do to keep us in our holy, precarious condition at the edge of chaos?

With all this in mind, we are blessed to have a new interim minister joining us this month. Reverend Evelyn Plumb is with us for the coming year. I hope she will teach us how to get a little closer to that edge while still keeping control of our ship. So put on your life jacket, if you feel so compelled, and be open to trying something different, but also help us all remember why we come to UUCT and what it is we love about our church and each other.

Settled Minister Search Committee (SMSC)

Draft Ministerial Search Congregational Record to be Available for Review

The SMSC plans to have the first draft of our UUA application ready for review and comment by the congregation by mid-August. Once finalized, the so-called "Congregational Record" will be "unveiled" (posted online at the UUA's website for settled minister candidates) after it is reviewed and approved by our ministerial settlement representative, Rev. Katy Korb. Prospective candidates who find our congregation attractive will then submit their "Ministerial Records" to the SMSC through the UUA website.

The Congregational Record (CR) provides the first impression that prospective candidates will have of us.

It is important, therefore, that we describe ourselves positively and accurately. Feedback from the congregation on the SMSC's draft, will, therefore, be valuable.

We plan to post a copy on the UUCT website and provide copies for review at church. We will have SMSC members available to answer your questions and hear your comments after church on August 20 and 27 (and possibly August 13 if the CR is ready by then). Written comments can be sent to the committee by mail or email.

One critical piece of the information that is included in the CR is the salary and housing compensation being offered to prospective candidates. A Negotiating Team recently appointed by the Board set to work in July to prepare a proposed compensation package for review and approval by the Board and the congregation. The Team includes SMSC member, Mimi Jones (chair), Committee on the Ministry member, Tony Lloyd, and President-elect, Steve Urse.

The Board is scheduled to consider the proposed compensation package at its meeting July 30. The proposal will then be made available to the congregation for a discussion meeting on Sunday, August 27, coincident with the discussion on the proposed Bylaws revisions described in a separate article from the Committee on the Ministry. A congregational voting meeting will be held on Sunday, September 10, on both the proposed compensation package and the Bylaws revisions.

TEAM brings diverse people together (faith, racial, ethnic, social/economic) to redress community concerns that affect poor and lowincome people.

In July, Adrianne Davis, lead organizer for TEAM, spoke at UUCT about TEAM's latest efforts. This session was the first of several sessions throughout the year at UUCT that will offer opportunities for UUCT members, friends, and others to find out more about TEAM, learn more about social action issues in Leon County, and contribute ideas to the ongoing mission.

2) CCF ("Congregations Come First") is an initiative of our UUA moderator, Gini Courter. The purpose is to find ways to remove organizational obstacles to congregational health and vitality, with a goal of recommending actions to ensure equitable allocation of resources for service and support of our congregations and their missions. A team of elected and appointed lay leaders, religious professionals, our moderator, and several UUA staff will consult with congregational, district, and national leaders, both lay and professional, taking a comprehensive systems approach to address the inequities, inefficiencies, and bureaucracies that impede service and support of congregations. They have been asked to report their findings and recommendations to the January, 2008 UUA Board of Trustees meeting.

How it is...And how it should be: Although our UU covenant calls us to be equitable, open, and in right relationship, staff support for congregations is inequitable and insufficient. Geography, access, and design vary enormously among districts. The way we fund our faith is cumbersome, commercial, and divisive. Now is the time to remember, refresh, and revitalize our UU covenant and strengthen the connections within our UU community.

Solar Power Fund Created

UUCTers have started contributing to a Solar Power Fund. Almost \$20,000 has been promised. With \$73,000, UUCT can have a 10 KW system installed on the south-facing roof of the new building. This system will enable the sun to provide approximately 31% of UUCT electricity needs. Through a system of net-metering, UUCT will get credit for electricity when the panels are producing more electricity than the church needs.

The cost is approximately \$1,500 per PV (photovoltaic) panel, and 50 panels are needed for our optimistic plan. To move forward quickly we might install the first 25 panels this fall and install the rest later. Financial assistance is being investigated, but your contributions are needed. They show your willingness to avert the disruptive climate change coming from the use of fossil fuels for generation of electricity and enable UUCT to act now and apply for a state rebate.

Strong Statement on Global Warming Adopted at GA

With much effort and with strong support from your representatives at General Assembly, the gathered congregations adopted a strong statement of conscience on global warming. It was great to see UUs effectively using the democratic process to over-ride the recommendations of the UUA Commission on Social Witness.

The call to action includes these personal actions. How many of these are you doing?

- Reduce use of energy and consumption of manufactured goods that become waste;
- Use alternative sources of energy to reduce global warming/climate change and to encourage the development of such sources (watch for opportunities to influence City Council commissioners on this one);
- Choose the most energy-efficient transportation means that meet your needs and abilities (e.g., walk, bike, carpool, use mass transit and communication technologies, and limit travel)
- Determine your personal energy consumption and pledge to reduce your use of energy and carbon emissions by at least 20 percent by 2010 or sooner and into the future;
- Reuse, recycle, and reduce waste;
- Plant and preserve trees and native plants and choose sustainably-harvested wood and wood products;
- Eat and serve energy-efficient food that is locally produced and low on the food chain;

- Use financial resources to encourage corporate social responsibility with reference to global warming/climate change;
- Model these practices by committing to a life of simplicity and Earth stewardship;
- Consume less, choose appliances that are rated energy-efficient (e.g., by the EPA Energy Star Program), and choose products and materials that are made from renewable resources and can be recycled at the end of their usefulness; and
- Commit to continue to learn about the science, impact, and mitigation of global warming/climate change and communicate this knowledge by teaching about and discussing the problems and dangers of, and actions to address, climate change.
