Social Justice Champions

With so many issues out there, it is difficult to narrow the focus of the Social Justice Committee. In addition, the Social Justice (SJ) survey found a diverse set of interests within our congregation. So, to ensure UUCT is well represented in important issues and to bolster our effectiveness, we are recruiting "Champions" for each of our seven principles. A champion will be asked to assist with the coordination of one - two efforts per year and can select the specific cause to coordinate. Read on for the details and contact Kim Ross or Abbe Justus for more information.

The inherent worth and dignity of every person.

Unitarian Universalists strive to make our social and political organizations recognize this principle to create a world where each person is valued and respected. The Champion of this principle might take on a cause such as:

- Call for action in Darfur,
- Racial Discrimination issues,
- Death Penalty issues,
- Call for the government to recognize gay marriages.

Justice, equity and compassion in human relations.

The second principle impacts SJ in working toward a more equitable distribution of resources and wealth. The Champion of this principle might encourage our church to:

- Feed the homeless,
- Call for universal health care.
- Participate in the Crop Walk.

Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations.

The Champion of this principle might organize and encourage our congregation to:

- Become a Welcoming Congregation (to the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender communities),
- Support the Matthew Shepherd Act.
- Welcome people with disabilities and raise awareness.

A free and responsible search for truth and meaning.

UUs have been longtime advocates for policies and regulations that based on research reflect responsible and effective methods for dealing with issues facing our congregations and our communities. The Champion of this principle might develop action issues for our congregation that deal with:

- Modification of drug laws,
- Ending funding for abstinenceonly sex education programs,
- Support for a woman's right to choose.

The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large.

UUs are concerned that all people have their voice heard in the decision-making process within the congregation and in society at large. The Champion of this principle might help our congregation:

- Petition the government for paperverified voting machines,
- Petition the government for a voting representative for D.C. citizens.

The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all.

UU has a long history of working for peace. Noted Unitarian and Universalist peace advocates include Adin Ballou, Henry David Thoreau, Clara Barton, and John Haynes Holmes. While many members advocate for peace, many also believe in just wars. The Champion of this principle might raise awareness and action among congregants for these issues:

- War in Iraq.
- Justice in the Middle East,
- Military Fellowship.

Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

Environmental experts recognize that environmental degradation disproportionately harms those who are poor and marginalized, even while they derive less benefit and have less control over how our resources are used. Our Champion of this principle will call on us to act on the personal, local, and national levels to adopt practices that will stem/reverse global warming/ climate change, such as:

- Not use bottled water,
- Make lifestyle changes that reduce global warming,
- Develop congregational practices that reduce the impact on the environment.

2007 – 2008 Curriculum. This year the Explorers, Artists, and Bridgers will use WE BELIEVE: Learning and Living Our Unitarian Universalist Principles. WE BELIEVE is a UUA-published curriculum designed for all ages. The twenty-two hour-long sessions include stories, discussions, activities, and worship experiences that are interesting and engaging for four-year-olds to sixty-four-yearolds and all those in between and beyond. The curriculum is based on the seven principles as stated in the UUA Bylaws. While learning more about our UU heritage our children will also learn to articulate their UU faith through positive statements about what they do believe rather than the usual UU counter statements to other faiths.

In twenty-one sessions our UU principles are explored in three different ways. Session number twenty-two allows each class to reflect upon and celebrate their memories of shared experiences.

In addition to the RE curriculum, our children have several opportunities to participate in intergenerational services held throughout the year and two exciting "Youth Celebrations!" with Rev. Robin Gray.

Adult RE This Year

The Adult RE Committee has compiled the results of the survey on classes and workshops the congregation may want in the coming year (see below). The committee will work with Rev.
