Minister's Message

From time to time, a phrase that dates back to my association with evangelical Christianity pops into my head. I was active in Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Campus Crusade for Christ during my teenage years. Here's a blast from my past: "...I did not abandon you; it was then that I carried you." That's god talking to a man or woman who wonders about the double set of Footprints in the Sand except during the most difficult times; when times were tough, there was only one set of footprints. This legend reminds us that being in relation is the human condition.

This legend teaches that our lives are not difficult <u>because</u> god has left the building; times aren't hard <u>because</u> we ditched the sacred. Rather, whatever the conditions of our life, we live in relationship. In the story, god and I (or you) stroll side by side. That changes when things get tough; then god carries us through in "the arms of love"

(a song from Christian singer Amy Grant). I'm not an evangelical Christian anymore. The story resonates though.

In difficult times, what gets you through? A time resting in the arms of love? The renewal of prayer? The support of friends? Communing with nature...being open to music or art...sharing a warm beverage and chocolate?

In easier times, who walks by your side? God or Goddess? A mysterious presence? Convivial friends? Neighbors who work for social change? Your spouse?

Whatever our individual beliefs, spiritual growth comes through relationship. May we seek out relationships based on love and respect with other people and the rest of the interdependent web. May we grow in relation to something greater than ourselves and make the most of

the gift of companionship and support.

This is the season of both giving and receiving. So, live side by side with others. Carry someone else. And allow yourself to be carried in turn.

Speaking of being carried, does anyone plan to do the Tallahassee Winter Festival Jingle Bell Run? I thought I'd try running it this year (run/walk, whatever). It's my first time, and though I don't think I'll need to be carried out of there on a stretcher, it would be nice to have company on the journey from start to finish line.

UUA Trustee Tidbits

This is my second effort at staying in communication with Florida UUs. There is much on which I could write but, due to recent conversations with UUs, I think I'll write some information about the roles of the UUA President and our UUA Moderator.

The President, at this time Rev. William Sinkford, is the chief executive officer of the Association and is an exofficio, without vote, of all standing committees of the Association, except the Nominating Committee and the Ministerial Fellowship Board of Review. The President is also a member of all standing committees of the Board except the Ministerial Fellowship Committee. The President of the UUA is elected every four years

by the delegates at General Assembly, and is eligible to serve two terms. Rev. Sinkford's first term ends in 2005.

The President is a paid officer of the Association. The Association President is our national spokesperson and is the voice of our denomination's "stand" on important social and justice issues. His role and activities are so varied and important that they are impossible for me to summarize adequately, and I suggest looking at the UUA website, www.uua.org, where it is easy to find his speeches, letters, etc., and photos.

The Moderator, also elected by the delegates at General Assembly, serves a four year term and is eligible for two terms. The Moderator presides at General Assemblies and meetings of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee. The Moderator

represents the Association on special occasions and assists in promoting its welfare in various ways. The Moderator has the top volunteer position in our Association.

In October, 2003, the Moderator, Diane Olson, resigned for personal and health reasons thus leaving an approximate two-year unfulfilled term. In the case of a Moderator resignation the Board of Trustees fills the position until the next regular General Assembly at which time an election is held. We, the Board, interviewed five declared candidates with carefully prepared questions, cast secret ballots, and filled the Moderator position by electing Gini Courter, who will serve until June, 2004, when an election will be held for the one remaining year of Ms. Olson's term.

Green Corner

One Step at a Time!

The UUCT five acres has been invaded by Exotic Pest Plants.

Although some of these plants are quite beautiful and have in the past been sold by nurseries, they are altering plant communities by displacing native species, changing ecological functions or hybridizing with natives. Ben Fusaro. Ed Basehart. both Master Wildlife Conservationists. and I walked the grounds assessing the trees and plants and marked many exotic invasives with orange tags.

The worst offenders are heavenly bamboo (nandina), coral ardisia, Chinese privet and Japanese climbing fern. We also have some mimosa. camphor tree and sword fern. All are on the Florida Exotic Pest Council's 2003 list of Invasive Species under Category One (see www.fleppc.org).

Removing the red berries of nandina and coral ardisia is a good first step. These plants must be removed before totally taking over our urban forest. It will take a combination of digging, cutting and applying herbicide. The good news is that we do not have airpotato, Chinese tallow, kudzu or taro (a form of elephant ear). For great photos and more info on identification and control, check the following US Forest Service field guide, Nonnative

Making the World a Better Place Invasive Plants of Southern Forests, which will be placed in our new UU Library. Thanks to Cathy Briggs for this recent and helpful donation. Do you have any of these invaders in your vard?

> More good news is that because of personal contact by Green Sanctuary committee members we now have almost 50 pledges to Combat Global Warming by reducing energy use and by eating more local and organic vegetables and less meat. Farmer Herman Holley and his wife, Louise Devine, sell their Leon County raised vegetables on Saturdays at Market Square. About Church Community (Part III)

On UUCT's Holy Spirit: Long-time UU minister Edwin Wilson (a founder of the American Humanist movement and composer of Humanist Manifesto I) asks us in his oft-sung hymn (#113): "Where is our holy church?" (Our holy writ? our holy one? Our holy land? Our paradise?) We sing this quest and try to find answers.

Where is this holiness? In our "community"?-- But where is that? Is it in our sanctuary or woodland grounds? In our new Lifespan RE building? In our minister? In our children's RE classes? In Sunday services or potlucks? In our Yard Sales or 'Fests or Heartbeats or Pig Roast? In our committee or study group meetings every week? In our District gatherings, or GA, or SUUSI? -- Or in our moral vision and principles, and our spoken "covenant" with each other?

I think it's in everything about and of us-- whatever we say or do-- whenever we meet (at church, on email, or elsewhere)-- whenever we share our dreams, thoughts, problems, personal stories, or quarrels with the world-- and in our fights for a better and more just world for all. It is we who are our church's holy spirit-- we are our paradise, our holy land, our holy writ, our holy one!

We are the "holy spirit" that makes us "feel alive" as Unitarian Universalists. We have a rich heritage in our religious "movement" in America-- we are on the move, we are ever-changing (and ever re-creating America)-- ever growing (even though our number as a denomination is still quite small!) -- ever finding new ways to state our sense of the Right, the Good, the True, and the Beautiful-- the "holy." We honor and consecrate the larger

society by our moral vision. Ours is an "established" church-- but it is our "movement" to change it all which keeps us from dying as a UU people-as we come to grips with our faith -- remaking it, renewing it, year after year, month by month, even day by day. And all in a very troubled, unpeaceful world.

Not to 'commune' in our church is for us to die as a church. The more we meet and try to stay in touch with each other, the more alive we are as a community. We act like a "second (or extended) family" for one another, sharing our common (and uncommon) joys and concerns. We act as a refuge home-- a safe haven of peace and recharging our own personal "spirits."

We could "measure" UUCT's "spirit," or sense of community, by the abundance of activities we generate every week. If you look at the *Meridian* monthly calendar, you will see that we are a "livewire" church now -- becoming more so every day. Let us celebrate this fact! Keep in touch with each other! Help each other out, as needed! Sense an awakening "spirit" growing in us, ever. Keep a fire burning brightly in us and everyone at UUCT, like our Sunday UU flaming chalice.
