

Theme through December 24: Tzedakah (charity or giving)



Justice, equity and compassion in human relations. Maimonides was a 12th C. Jewish sage who was physician to the sultan of Egypt. When the rabbi organized the eight levels of giving described in the *Talmud*, he ranked them by how much merit they had. But even the lowest three levels of giving are beneficial. Giving because it's right to do so is a religious duty with spiritual benefits.

Dec. 12 Giving is its Own Reward

The inherent worth and dignity of every person. The middle levels of giving described in the *Talmud* and organized by Maimonides are relational. Empathy and compassion come in handy as we exercise giving in order to give. This is our UU *Mitzvah* Day, when we may each choose to help others outside of our congregation in the afternoon. **Rev. Dec. 19 Giving that Empowers (Intergenerational Winter Solstice Service)

Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part. The final two are the most meritorious levels of giving that Maimonides organized from the *Talmud*. This kind of giving frees the giver and the receiver from the potential dependency of charity. The best of giving empowers and renews. Dec. 24 Gifts of Merit (Intergenerational Christmas Eve Service)

Gift giving has gotten a bad reputation from its association with greed, self-satisfaction and over consumption. However, giving is also good! President's Message

What does it mean to be "liberal" in a conservative era? Answer: The same that it means in other times. It means common sense caring, a willingness to listen to other views, an abiding concern for the earth, and a sensitivity to our own foibles and desires. We haven't left the human community, no matter what Jonah Goldberg writes, nor have we dug ourselves an antichurch pit to fight off clericalism. We are what we are and have been for some time: ordinary people who struggle for civil rights, for adequate health care for everyone, for keeping our heads in a crisis, and for talking first, and second, before resorting to force.

William Adkins shared an email containing political analysis of the recent election. Most interesting was the finding that shouldn't have been

lost in the election results: that the Republican "sweep" was barely a victory, that radical conservative policies held no majority, and that Democrats were out-worked in mobilizing their voters. In short, a more liberal political agenda isn't lost for the next two generations. It was a set-back, not a destruction.

Therefore, if you were working in support of environmental issues before the election, continue as you were. If you believe that health care should be a universal right, as I do, continue to push. If you think the homeless deserve to be fed and housed, support The Shelter in Tallahassee and help us feed them once a month. If voter registration and education are your passion, do not be deterred.

And don't even think about moving to Canada, lovely as it is in summer. Nor to Europe, where the Euro is smashing the dollar as I write, despite the Administration's assurance that it favors a "strong" currency. It doesn't. No, this is your country, your home. This is where the struggle for human rights means the most, and so the venue is here, as it has been for the past half-century, and now, as always. Fight the good fight, and fight it here, in our neighborhoods. We are the home of liberal faith in Tallahassee. Steady on.
