Dec. 4 Christianity, the Beginning

Many of our Unitarian Universalist folks came from Christian backgrounds, and in our society we are surrounded by churches of that particular faith. There are even some who say that the United States is a Christian nation. This has prompted Rev. Bill to deliver two sermons relating to the beginning of Christianity and its development as a major religion. On the first Sunday, he will talk about the man Jesus and the attributes that were attached to him by his followers. Dec. 11 Christianity, Its Continuation

Dec. 18 Reading Between the Lines

Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations. Jewish tradition has a unique way of reading biblical text and ascertaining the meaning(s) of the text. This discussion will use the story of Joseph to demonstrate Jewish methods of exegesis. We will look at the episode of the attempted seduction of Joseph by Potipher's wife, both through the biblical narrative and through the Jewish art of *midrash*—the Jewish method of reading between the lines of the story. Together we will explore the hidden meanings in the biblical text that are implied by *midrash*. Rabbi Jack Romberg from Temple Israel will be presenting, and the cantor and choir from Temple Israel will join our choir to make a joyful noise!

Minister's Message: In the Interim

In my first sermon at UUCT, I used this church (Thursdays, 12/8 and 12/15 at quote by Lewis Carroll from The Walrus and the Carpenter.

"The time has come," the Walrus said, "To talk of many things:

Of shoes and ships and sealing wax, Of cabbages and kings,

And why the sea is boiling hot, And whether pigs have wings."

This, for me, is a metaphor of what is done in interim ministry. A metaphor is and isn't, and this metaphor tells us that we need to talk and plan for the exciting future of the congregation.

You have done well over the years, and the congregation is to be admired for its accomplishments. Just last Sunday I expressed my appreciation for the number of outstanding efforts you make in the area of social justice. Thank you for all that you do. No, this is not intended to say that you are perfect, but I do see you as being exceptional. No system is really perfect, and most entities can occasionally afford a little polishing, some positive movement.

During my time here, I have had many conversations and have had a private interview with each board member, plus I have talked with many members who have come to my office for a visit and with others after services. One of my goals for the remainder of my time with you is to continue these discussions, one-on-one and in groups. We will begin this in December by having "brown bag" lunches at the

noon in Rm. L). I hope that many of you will participate in "Brown Bagging with Bill." It is good to eat together and discuss. There is no need to RSVP.

Another interim goal is to strengthen denominational linkages, and judging from the excellent participation in the FL District Leadership Conference in November, we are well on our way to doing this. It is valuable for us to meet and visit with members of other congregations. I also see our younger members taking leadership positions and making commitments to being a greater part of the life of UUCT. That, too, is an interim goal and is a positive aspect of what is happening.

An important area of interest is our new identity. It is a commitment to a new future. The operative word here was stated in my sermon "To Keep an Open Mind." We could indeed talk about our vision for UUCT and consider, not our limitations, but our possibilities. We need an open and adventurous spirit as we gaze into the looking glass of our future and develop that new vision for the congregation. What we have been is what we have been, and what we are is what we are, but what we can be is something else.

Traditionally, congregations in transition talk about their history. What brought us to where we are today? We should invite our personal observations and the observations of others in order to be impacted in a significant and positive way. Change is inevitable and

is at the heart of all that is. You are a different congregation now, and the historical question is what brought us to this point? Nothing stays the same. We cannot hold on to the past and who we were. Transformation is inevitable. It is a given as part of life. And, it just never seems to be easy. My ideas for you are directions of growth, and I hope this can be a part of our discussions in the coming months.

It is normal for there to be some stress during interim years. You have experienced the loss of your minister, and though I see you as having a bright future, I know that uncertainty frequently creates anxiety. During this interim time, remember that you are a fine and deserving congregation. And while you are keeping this in mind, also remember to relax a little (well, perhaps a lot) and have some fun as a church family. Be mindful, be present and laugh often (and a bunch), being certain that you enjoy your life as a church community. As was often said back in days past, laughter is good medicine, and I do believe that it is a great tool for dealing with whatever stress we may be experiencing.

For me, it is important for you to know that I like you and care for you. I want vour future to be remarkable, bevond your greatest expectations. Again, thank you for all you do. "The time has come, the Walrus said, to talk of many things . . ."

Congregational Conversations

The Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) board appointees eagerly await four additional MSC members elected by the congregation, cottage meetings with members and friends, and in mid-January, Rhonda Thomason, our assigned MSR (Ministerial Settlement Representative).

The board-appointed MSC members, Bruce Brandt, Bob Deyle and Mimi Jones, have met and are eager to get started on our task, seeking the best possible fit of minister to membership. We believe the congregation is eager to begin our year-and-a-half journey, too. To that end, we have decided on three beginning cottage meetings in December, designed to pick up where we left off after the two congregational conversations that were conducted last March and April. There will be additional cottage meetings, perhaps modified as we go along, as well as other modes of conversation, reflective of the "will of the people." We want to get it right.

We are trying to discover how our annual Thanksgiving potluck dinner at UUCT came into being. We know Eleanor Moore (91+ years old and now living in Newnan, Georgia) started it and kept it going all these years. Louise Kahn, a former UUCT member, tells Will Adkins that she helped Eleanor start it. Will remembers his first Thanksgiving Day dinner here in 1973, at the time he joined the church. About 30-40 "pilgrims" show up every year. Most are UUs, but the gathering also includes relatives and friends. The food tables are the greatest, most varied, and special that you could imagine. No two Thanksgivings are the same, except for the gift of quiet, peace and goodwill, and the warm sharing, including stories and old memories that we bring.

Special thanks go to Robyn Wallace, Linda Logan, Karen Share, Randall Gann. Pam and Don Crosby, and Jerri Lee Wagner for helping to create this event and seeing it through to "clean up," and to everyone who brought their food dishes, drinks, music, and new friends to share with everyone else.
