Minister's Message

Renewing Vows

Please let me know if you are a couple who wants to renew a vow of commitment during the service on Sunday, 2/16; partners and spouses who have been together only a few years or over a few decades are welcome.

TEAM (Tallahassee Equality Action Ministry)

After several years of planning with other religious leaders in town, this grassroots organization is finally about to sprout. On Saturday, 2/15 a number of UUCTers will get together with members of other congregations for a Faith In Action Workshop. It's not just for those active in social justice groups. I helped form TEAM so it could be an outlet for interfaith cooperation and city-wide congregation based social justice accomplishments.

This summer, TEAM member congregations (including liberal and conservative; Protestant, Catholic, Jewish, UU, hopefully Muslim; both primarily African-American and primarily European-American) will gather to select one specific and realistic issue to change within a year. Other groups like ours in other cities have secured public transportation for second and third shift jobs, ensured funding for education, and otherwise helped the elected or appointed "powers that be" implement changes.

On the TEAM agenda: changes will benefit people with few dollars or other resources. Another item: choose only one action per year to research and do. It's possible that some of us will find our own issues tabled or not taken up. A workshop at the Unitarian Universalist Association annual meeting noted that groups like TEAM may challenge our comfort level and

familiar methods since we like to decide things all by ourselves and we like to get a move on, anxious to Do Something. Remember, everything we need to know we learned in kindergarten ①.

In addition to TEAM activities, UUCT has the second Monday Shelter Meal, the UUCT Social Justice group and the Racial and Cultural Diversity Committee (RCDC). UUCT groups allow us to pursue our own issues and to provide direct help, as well as work for social change.

Alternate Program Group

I and two members of the Board have met a couple of times with two members of the congregation about how to go about fulfilling "our vision...of a **growing**, caring congregation...which **welcomes** people of different racial, ethnic, and cultural groups..." In general and as a part of the Alternate Program Group (APG), I have to check my tendency to jump to conclusions and rush to answers (hey, I'm only human!).

The APG, the Board, and indeed all members and friends of the congregation, are "living the question" about membership growth and increased diversity as much as TEAM participants will before the vote at the summer gathering. Just as TEAM actions aren't decided ahead of time, the APG seeks a process by which we'll come to a decision; the APG agenda is not to propose, say, a Tuesday forum or Sunday afternoon second service.

Keep in mind: year long process; lots of info to get; many chances for input, and yes even more forays beyond our familiar ways. In the process, I trust and vow that we won't lose the **caring** aspect of our vision!

Sabbatical

When I first came here we agreed that if UUCT and I lasted for 6 years (ha, ha, ha!) UUCT would grant me one month for every year served for sabbatical. Sabbatical is time apart for both parties with benefits upon return for both. The UUA Sabbatical Handbook says: "sabbaticals are neither extended vacations nor tightlystructured, highly-focused study leaves...." During the proposed sabbatical (January and February 2004, and June-September 2004) I want to read and study, help other people, hone my ministerial skills, learn more about leadership, and after I rest a bit think about UUCT as a whole.

While I'm doing that, you will be sole proprietors of our shared ministry. We'll figure out what that entails together. Discussions have begun! I'm talking with the Committee on Ministry and a "Leadership Development" group -- of past presidents, the current president, president elect and others -- about how to plan and prepare for everyone to be able to offer his or her gifts of service and to grow as leaders. Conversations about lay leadership are of course ongoing.

There's more to discuss about sabbatical, and we will. If you have questions, please ask me or a member of the Committee on the Ministry, (chairperson Richard Dempsey, richardd@nettally.com, 671-2748; Christine Boczarska, 893-7079; Bruce Brandt, blbrandt@earthlink.net, 644-4068).

As I read through this message I think it's really all about commitment. Enjoy your commitments!

A Religious Perspective

Remarks made at the Tallahassee NOW Candlelight Vigil, outside the Governor's Mansion, on the 30th Anniversary of Roe v. Wade. Shall we come together for a moment of silence to hear the truth of our hearts? (Pause) First, I want to acknowledge and welcome the many voices along the continuum whose endpoints are named "pro-choice or

abortion rights" and "pro-life or antiabortion."

On this 30th anniversary, I look back to a resolution made by my denomination—it wasn't 30 years ago

though, it was 40 years ago, in 1963. What happened was: a religious group voted for making abortion legal. Okay, but I'm here to say that if your profound spiritual belief affirms reproductive rights, you don't need to convert to Unitarian Universalism. For, there are humanists including atheists who are pro choice, Christians both Catholic and Protestant who are pro choice, as well as groups in both the Jewish Conservative and Reform movements. People of faith are diverse, and there is no monotone in monotheism, no drone in Christian denominations.

Some things I cannot do:

I can't serve or preach a God who sends women to Hell for choosing to end a pregnancy;

I can't tell you the precise moment that groups of cells can be called human beings;

I can't reject either the value of life itself or the quality of individual lives;

I can't decide for anyone else whether to become a parent...

But I can call sacred: free will, the dignity of individuals, the urge for holiness, and the right to choose. Women have the ability to reason, pray, discuss and decide about this moral choice. To get to the core of their faith and the center of their lives. To include their partners. To make the most conscientious and life-affirming decision.

Women have the ability to choose consciously, and the ability to feel. To

feel relieved, confused, angry. To feel sad. To feel both resolved AND regretful.

And so I could provide spiritual counsel for a couple who is trying to decide or a woman who has to choose whether to end a pregnancy, or to raise a child, or to grant a child to an adoptive family. I would say: search your heart and appeal to the source of meaning in your life for the best answer. What does your god say? What does your gut say? What is your intuition and the advice of your intimates?

And then, if abortion is your choice, I would ask: what will promote healing? Not physical healing, as was needed when abortion was illegal, but spiritual support.

What promotes healing? It is the word or deed that takes us from the present moment to meaning in the next moment. It's the heartfelt prayer and the joyful song. It becomes the will to reach out for the next moment. Human beings usually have to practice the journey from moment to moment, as we tend to jump around from memories of the past to projections about the future.

The past does matter though. And there are religious leaders like me who honor why ending a pregnancy may be the ethical way. We want to know: why are you pregnant? Not the biology of it. But the conditions. Unprotected intercourse? Or in spite of your best efforts, birth control that didn't. Or did violence lead to pregnancy? Did circumstances, like

economic stability or a willing partner or good health, suddenly change this month to make last month's decision to conceive ill-conceived? That's the past.

The future matters too. Imagine. What family do you want your children to grow up in? What plans do you have for yourself? What hopes, fears and dreams do you attach to a group of cells or a fetus? Is economic stability in reach? What's the image you carry of you as a mother? Is the future you imagine today full of potential or empty of possibility?

In my opinion, religion only works when it answers despair with hope; overcomes hurt with healing; challenges agitation with peace, and inequality with social justice; replaces hate with love and power-over with the power to choose.

This is my prayer. May you find people of faith and established religions to meet you in the fullness of your choice to end a pregnancy or continue it. May you find hope, healing, peace, justice and love when you seek spiritual support from clergy and religious leaders. May you come to terms with the past and embrace the future. Always in community. Always with freedom AND responsibility. And even, for some, secure in the presence of the Great Mystery at the heart of Life. God of many names and no name. Source of Meaning, Creator, Sustainer, Friend.

So may it be.

Facilities Update

CONSTRUCTION SCHEDULE: It's certainly great to see the vertical dimension of our new building taking shape. And yes, those are the correct

heights for the walls. Remember that the exterior walls facing our current buildings will eventually be the high, interior walls of the fellowship hall. The

roofs of the classrooms will slope down from these higher walls to standard wall height; classroom ceilings will all be standard height.

Between holiday time-off and the ground being so saturated from heavy rains that cement and delivery trucks could not get in, we are now about a month behind schedule. The current substantial completion date is in early April - plenty of time for a deliberate and well-planned move-in prior to next fall. The CIC and Youth RE Committee have been busy developing a use plan for current classrooms and the new building. It is exciting to finally be so close to not only having more spaces but also having larger spaces than our current classrooms.

Look for the first layer of asphalt to go down on the new driveway soon. This

will carry construction traffic and will be covered at the very end with a second layer, once all construction is done.

BUILDING DEDICATION: We have decided to schedule the building dedication for mid-September, in conjunction with the In-gathering Service we have each year. President Jennifer Carver inquired about the possibility of having UUA President Bill Sinkford attend our dedication, but he has no current plans to visit north Florida again after his visit to Gainesville in early February. We'll have to celebrate on our own!

CONSTRUCTION ZONE. All adults of the church, please set a good example for our children by not entering the construction zone on Sundays and also help keep any children out. Mad Dog, has seen evidence that people have entered the construction zone on Sundays, and they are very concerned that someone might be hurt. If you want to take a better look at progress, walk around and view the building from the upper drive. Also, after the service each Sunday, a CIC representative will be outside the current classrooms--for answering any questions and providing information about the new building. Look for the person wearing a hat.

UUCT Chance to Curb Global Warming

The Green Sanctuary Committee is proposing a UUCT resolution to adopt two environmental programs addressing global warming. The church-wide action called for in the resolution will fulfill one of the fundamental requirements for UUA Green Sanctuary certification: to "pass an all-church resolution committing to an all-church environmental project for a year". We will vote on acceptance of the resolution at the Congregational Meeting scheduled for March 9.

A summary of the two environmental programs and the proposed resolution are given below. To learn more about the programs and the resolution:

Following the February 17 information and discussion meeting, the proposed resolution will be edited if necessary by the Green Sanctuary Committee and then forwarded to the Board for approval and inclusion in the materials to be mailed to the congregation prior to the March 9 voting meeting.

Also, members of the Green Sanctuary Committee will be attending a regional Green Sanctuary Conference in Atlanta in mid-February. They will report on this meeting at the Adult Forum on Sunday, February 26 at 9:45 AM in Room 4.



Programs To Be Adopted

The environmental programs to be adopted in the proposed UUCT resolution are household pledge programs: (1) a 1-2-3 Response to Global Warming pledge and (2) a Food for Thought (And Action!) pledge.

For the first pledge, each member household of the congregation would be invited to sign a 1-2-3 Pledge in which they commit to take as many as possible of the following actions: adjusting their thermostat, reducing driving speeds over 60 mph, and replacing some conventional light bulbs with more energy efficient ones.

The Food for Thought (and Action!) household pledge addresses three actions: (1) eat less meat, (2) eat local produce, and (3) eat organic foods. (Visit the Sunday table or see the November *Meridian* "Green Corner" article for details on the pledges.)

A UUCT Resolution to Meet Green Sanctuary Requirements

Whereas:

Global warming, accelerated by atmospheric accumulation of CO2 from excessive burning of fossil fuels, is perhaps the most significant current environmental threat to planetary stability and has the potential to seriously disrupt ecosystems everywhere [and that]

Transportation, food, and household activities collectively account for the creation of 80% of greenhouse gases, 77% of common air pollution, 67% of common water pollution, and 75% of common habitat alteration [and that]

Average household cars are responsible for 3.7 tons of greenhouse gas emissions--just over one-fourth of all greenhouse emissions linked to household purchases [and that]

Food also has a pervasive impact on our environment with sixty percent of our country's land area devoted to either crops or grazing with other significant impacts of agriculture including fertilizer and pesticide use, handling of animal wastes, water quality degradation and erosion, and air pollution and greenhouse gas emission from energy use and ruminant livestock [and that]

Meat and poultry consumption in particular have a large impact on common water pollution, water use, and most important, land use [and that]

The following three areas of household operations: 1) heating, hot water, and air conditioning; 2) appliances and lighting; and 3) water, sewage, and solid waste disposal, place the greatest burden on the environment. The first two of these categories contribute the most to greenhouse gas emissions (31%) and common air pollution (24%)* [such that]

We now therefore resolve, that the friends and members of the UUCT congregation pledge as individuals and households to adopt the following programs:

- 1) 1-2-3 Response to Global Warming
- 2) Food for Thought (And Action)

over the course of the next year in order to meet critical Green Sanctuary requirements and make a conscious commitment to reduce greenhouse gas emissions that cause global warming and the associated impacts of air/water pollution and habitat alteration.
