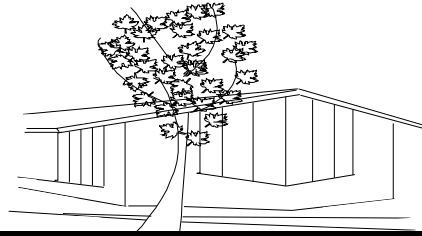

Minister's Message

Greetings from sabbatical land. I hope your needs are getting met and surpassed. I'm getting what I wanted out of the first half of winter session: reading, rest, reflection and running. Here's what I'm subjecting my self to in the name of theological study (one of the goals of this sabbatical):

"The prehensions in disjunction are abstractions; each of them is its subject viewed in that abstract objectification. The actuality is the totality of prehensions with subjective unity in process of concrescence into concrete unity." This quote is from the mind and pen of Alfred North Whitehead (*A Key to Whitehead's Process and Reality, edited by Donald W. Sherburne, p. 37*). Each underlined word has a paragraph or two in the glossary dedicated to explaining it!

Philosophy wasn't one of my college electives, so I look forward to learning more at Meadville Lombard Theological School's "Introduction to Process Theology" course. (I will have taken it by the time you read this.)

After that, it's back Down South to Norcross, GA for the Alban Institute seminar, "New Visions of the Long Pastorate." I wonder if perfect understanding of Whitehead is required for a settled ministry that continues to be creative over the years?!

You are on my mind and a big part of my meditations -- and even appear in my dreamtime. It has taken a couple of weeks to get used to this planned time apart, but the words of advice and encouragement you wrote in the Sun and Moon notebook have eased the sense of distance. I savor each page for a few days, so as to extend the number of weeks during which I get to consider what you want me to know, in your own words. Thank you for that thoughtful and useful gift.

Perhaps reading Whitehead and other process theorists meets the sabbatical goal of theological study, but I turn to another quote to further another goal of sabbatical: spiritual growth. This is from Rumi.

"Make me sweet again, fragrant and fresh and wild, and thankful for any small event."

The guest speaker and musician for our February 1 service is Steve Finner, who is now the Director of Music at the Universalist Unitarian Church of St. Johnsbury, VT, a small and growing congregation of 45. He moved to Vermont after a twenty-three year career in higher education labor relations in New York and Washington, where he was also an active layperson in UU congregations. He is a composer whose music has been sung in many of our congregations and has served as an officer in the Unitarian Universalist Musicians Network through which he met UUCT Music Director Helen Falb.

FEBRUARY 15

Connie Barlow, a well-known science writer and author of 4 books on evolution and ecology, will be speaking at both the Adult Forum and service. Her husband, Michael Dowd, who pastored Christian churches for 10 years, will be speaking at the United Church of Tallahassee.

In the American tradition of itinerant preaching, the couple have shed home and possessions and been living on the road for just under two years. They pursue what they regard as their joint "mission" in life - to tell the story of the universe in ways that deepen one's faith, build bridges between different faith perspectives, provide hope for the future, and motivate concern for the

well-being of the entire community of life. They sustain themselves on profits from book sales and by the grace of home hospitality offered by church members, teachers, and others. Weekdays often include speaking (free of charge) at colleges, high schools, grade schools, spiritual retreats, or environmental organizations.

Before hitting the road, the couple lived and worked just north of New York City. After the September 11 tragedy, they decided to pull up roots and follow their hearts, hoping to make a real difference in American culture by simply speaking to small groups of people. North Florida's Water

High Stakes for North Florida's Water: Time for a New Panhandle Boosterism, reprinted from Apalachee Audubon newsletter

The very notion that economic growth in Atlanta and Tampa is more important than North Florida's rivers and springs rubs me the wrong way. There is a certain arrogance that is expressed in the idea that big growth economies are more desirable than those organized around hunting, fishing, boating and birdwatching.

Here is how the logic works. Atlanta is big and growing, and lots of people are making lots of money. North Florida is still mostly rural and, while pretty, doesn't have a lot of get-rich opportunities. Therefore, Atlanta should have first claim on most of the water that eventually drains into the Apalachicola River. Apply the same logic to Tampa and you get a similar conclusion, except with a pipeline to our springs.

One issue that unites residents of North Florida as much as any other is the claim made by our more populous northern and southern neighbors on the water that makes this area so special. That may be because many of us live in North Florida for very specific reasons that have little to do with the economic imperatives of the cities to our north and south.

For me bicycling, birding and boating make Tallahassee nature-based recreation ground zero. I can access the solitude of water and woods in almost any direction. Yes, there is a trade-off in reduced opportunity. No Underground Atlanta or theme parks for me. No problem.

North Florida is richer in culture, history and natural history than in investors and philanthropists. We are also richer in water. Thus, the water envy. Many of us want nothing of

Atlanta and Tampa. Yet, their boosters want cheap, accessible water that can continue their endless growth. A report by the major developer-led Florida Council of 100 even suggested paying North Florida communities for the water that the Council proposed taking to promote South Florida sprawl. How generous!

The recent water debate reminds me of Killlearn developer J.T. Williams' decision to abandon Tallahassee for Atlanta. After turning 8000 acres of swamps and woods into sprawling subdivisions - congesting roads, crowding schools, and polluting lakes in the process - Williams left unsatisfied with Tallahassee's business climate. Some people think Atlanta is a better fit for a company that takes credit on its website for "changing the way people live."

Atlanta-Tampa logic says sprawling, congested growth and the opportunity it provides is the ideal ultimate goal. That type of economy takes a lot of water from nature and gives it back as polluted runoff and sewage effluent. The economic boosters' logic of growth at all cost defies common sense.

Fortunately, Florida's laws guard our springs and rivers from both overuse and from long-distance transfer. The principle "local sources first" has become a rallying cry for North Florida. If you listen to the people making the noise, the reason becomes obvious. They will say that you can't fish in a dry river or drink from an empty spring.

That is Panhandle boosterism. Live here or visit for the natural beauty and outdoors recreation, but leave our water alone.

About the Committee on Ministry

While Rev. Amy is on sabbatical, the Committee on Ministry is the contact for pastoral needs and the Minister's Discretionary Fund. We thought this would be a good time to remind the congregation who we are and what our role is.

We are a board-appointed committee of three members, each of whom is a long-term member of the congregation and has served on other committees in the church. The term of appointment is 3 years with the last year of participation as chair. We meet once a month to work with the minister to help maintain harmonious professional relations between the congregation and the minister.

Typically what we do is:

- review what the minister has planned for the upcoming year or season,
- help her define her goals and the congregation's goals, such as for the current Sabbatical,
- suggest areas to address, improve, and/or possibly change,

-discuss problems we have encountered (both minister and committee) and help her work out a resolution,

-maintain confidentiality.

What we do not do is:

- tell the minister how and what to plan,
- define her goals for her,
- tell her what to do to improve and/or change,
- solve problems for her or for the congregation,
- take sides or present one person's specific problem to the minister in that person's place.

Our role is as an impartial intermediary to keep the dialogue continuing between the minister and all parties. We often need to refer to the contract and the Covenant that the congregation and the minister mutually agreed to for guidance. As the UUA has suggested in its Committee on Ministry workshop, we try to keep in mind and remind the congregation that

we cannot look to the minister as the source of our religious health. It must originate in each of us. The dialogue must be kept alive as we work for the UUCT.

When a member has a problem with the minister, it is of course, best if that member sees the minister for an honest open discussion. In the spirit of the Covenant, we remind ourselves that seeking a positive resolution is the aim of us all. Should a member request, any COM member will accompany the member to the minister to help put the dialogue in motion in a search for solution.

UUA Trustee Tidbits

I appreciate the suggestions and ideas you have presented regarding topics for my monthly writing. Because of recently received correspondence, this month I will talk about the Commission on Social Witness (CSW).

The CSW's mission is to help UUs put the Principles and Purposes into action and to assist congregations and the Association in expressing concern for social justice. The CSW is involved in all the steps of the 3-year process to adopt Statements of Conscience. Each year, the CSW receives proposals from congregations and districts for Study-Action Issues that they hope will be selected and eventually result in a UUA Statement of Conscience, as voted upon by the delegates at General Assembly after two years of study and action.

The Social Witness Process Review Panel - a group that has been studying our Social Witness process, particularly as it relates to General Assembly - has issued a report on "The Direction We're Going". It is available on-line in PDF format at

January 25, 2004 Congregational Decisions:

The purpose of the meeting was to consider three motions proposed by the Finance Committee concerning paying off the construction loan and meeting cash flow needs for doing so.

The following motions were considered:

Motion 1: The congregation reaffirms taking out a bank mortgage of \$100,000. Motion passed: Affirmative 68, Negative 1, Abstained 2.

Motion 2: The congregation approves taking an interest-free loan of up to \$140,000 from endowment funds. Motion passed: Affirmative 67, Negative 0, Abstained 4.

Motion 3: The congregation approves taking an additional short-term loan from the endowment of up to \$40,000 to meet cash flow needs. Motion passed: Affirmative 70, Negative 0, Abstained 1.

www.uua.org/uuawo/new/article.php?id=146 or from me as a Word document via email (jlund@uua.org or lundjb@earthlink.net). There are some thought-provoking ideas in the report, and until the end of March, they are inviting opinion and input from interested individuals and groups.

The Panel believes that much more of the responsibility and ownership of the social witness process belongs in the hands of UU congregations. They feel that the current process is not engaged in sufficiently by congregations, either qualitatively or quantitatively. Changes are being recommended. They also believe there is not sufficient attention to implementation of statements once they are created and have recommended adding a fourth GA (third year) to the process - to take time to learn together how implementation of the statement is proceeding rather than rushing on to the next one. The Panel wants to remove amendments from the GA floor and take them into small group "mini-assemblies", to avoid the mass "word-smithing" that sometimes occurs.

Significant changes to the process for Actions of Immediate Witness have been proposed, and they are considering a new type of witness that would allow the staff of the Association, as well as UUs and the public generally, to know our UU policies on a given issue without searching through a many-paged book of old resolutions. I strongly suggest you express your opinion to the Panel after reading the thoughts from the CSW Panel of Review.
