reception in Amy's honor. I trust you will help us to make it more than a farewell, but a celebration of a faithful, hardworking, productive and memorable seven and a half years of service to our beloved community of faith.

And then we must dry our tears. There's work to be done.

I have been told that separating from a minister is like going through a divorce. That was the first sting I felt when I heard the news. Stunned. We have come so far together. From the time Amy was first considered as an extension minister, we, the UUCT, have had to organize our thoughts and decide what it is we wanted from ministry. We began to evaluate what was important to us as a community by first acting like a loving community without a minister, and talking to and actually listening to each other. We started looking at what was realistic to pay a minister that was right for us, rather than how little we could get away with. We understood that choosing a settled minister is a covenanting process, much as our forebears swore on their sacred honor in founding a new nation. We started acting like a church.

Since Rev Amy began with us, we:

- 1. doubled the annual budget,
- increased the number of activities held at church on a regular basis by at least twofold,
- 3. hired a Director of Religious Education,
- 4. built a new modern facility,
- 5. built 2 new playgrounds,

- 6. re-landscaped our grounds,
- became members of Tallahassee Equality Action Ministry (TEAM),
- 8. joined with other church groups in outreach,
- 9. were represented in the community as a liberal voice,
- 10. established a campus ministry,
- 11. became a welcoming congregation,
- 12. shared our church with a new, growing congregation,
- 13. enlarged our church choir,
- 14. purchased a grand piano,
- 15. purchased new hymnals,
- 16. increased UUCT presence at General Assembly,
- 17. increased our District participation,
- 18. offered Harmony Camp in the summer,
- 19. remembered the passing of many older members.
- refurnished the sanctuary with new carpeting, chairs, tables and platforms, and
- 21. wrote new manuals of bylaws and procedures.

There are many more things that occurred since1997 than I can mention or even remember. We have remained hopeful, joyful, linked in community with others of like mind. Through these years Rev. Amy has been right there with us, full of optimism, hope and joy, helping us find our vision. She has been part of our dream building, and she let us work through our struggles under our own steam, with her guidance when asked. For Amy, this was truly shared ministry, and all of us who worked with her knew that. We were partners.

Divorce can be a good move allowing both parties to grow. Rev Amy will be ready for new and different opportunities, and we must be also. She leaves with enormous grace, dignity and unfailing intelligence. She has left our church in good shape. We hope she will say the same of us. So, let us acknowledge all we have become together and wish each other strength from the memories of good work done together. Let these carry each of us forward to meet the interesting challenges ahead.

Keynote speakers for the conference will be Dr. Jeff Chanton, a local government commissioner, and Rev. Katherine Jesch. Dr. Chanton, a professor in FSU's Department of Oceanography, has developed expertise in the science of climate change. His work on the greenhouse gases methane and carbon dioxide led to his concern about their effects on climate and to his involvement with Heart of the Earth, a local citizens' group that promotes environmental education and sustainable lifestyles.

Planned Giving

Exactly what is planned giving? You might have heard this term used in conversations but weren't exactly sure what it meant. That was the situation several months ago when I was talking to my brother-in-law. He had recently made some planned giving decisions and explained the concept to me. Before, I just thought it meant providing for a legacy gift in a will. It is actually much more than that. There are other ways to leave a legacy besides wills that might be more attractive to you.

In recent years, what have become more popular are mechanisms provided in tax laws passed by Congress that make it more attractive to give to a charitable organization. Annuities are an estate planning tool that allows you to "have your cake and eat it too." For instance, if you own some stock that doesn't produce very much income but you would incur a very large capital gains tax if you tried to sell it, then one of the programs described below might just be what you've been looking for.

Annuities are legal documents that are usually funded by shares of stock or sometimes real estate property. You set up an annuity with the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) where there are two beneficiaries - the income beneficiary (you), who receives a fixed or variable amount from the annuity, and the church, which receives the assets of the annuity

when the beneficiary dies. Annuities can be set up for one life or two lives, where the income continues until the second person dies.

Legacy gifts that you can set up for the church are managed, at no cost to our church, by the UUA in Boston. They set up and manage the annuities on behalf of our church. The UUA has two programs for setting up a legacy gift. One is called Charitable Gift Annuity (CGA). This program provides a fixed percentage income from the initial assets of the annuity. The other program is called The Pooled Income Fund Gift. Under this, the assets you give are pooled into a common trust fund. The income from this varies from year to year and has the capability to grow. In both programs, your age and the age of the second person (if there is one) determine what the income will be.

Legacy gifts as described above have many advantages.

- 1. The rate of return is very attractive compared to other financial markets. Currently, for an older person, it runs around 5% to 6%.
- 2. You receive regular quarterly payments.
- 3. In the case of the Charitable Gift Annuity, the amount of your income payments is fixed at the beginning of the annuity and remains the same throughout your lifetime.

- 4. For both programs, the term is for the life of one or two adults.
- 5. The program is managed by the UUA and backed by the assets of the Association.
- 6. When you set up a gift legacy with the UUA, you get an immediate tax deduction and, in the case of the CGA, a portion of your income is also tax deductible.
- 7. Signing up for a Charitable Gift Annuity or the Pooled Income Fund is very simple with one form to fill out.
- 8. You received the spiritual satisfaction that you are providing for continued support of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Tallahassee.

If you would like to find out more about planned giving to the church, contact me or one of the other members of the Planned Giving Committee. We have information provided by the UUA that goes into more detail about the annuities.
