Green Corner

The following is excerpted from the Union of Concerned Scientists "Greentips" website article for November 2002 entitled "<u>Tree-Free</u> <u>Paper</u>."

From its invention in China in 105 A.D. until very recently, paper was made from non-woody plant fibers, like hemp and cotton, or from textile waste. That changed when the wood pulping process was invented in the 19th century, not because wood produced a superior product, but because it solved the problem of scarce raw materials. At the time, most paper in the Western world was made from rags, but supplies were hard to come by. Trees, on the other hand, were plentiful -particularly in North America with its vast forests. It seemed like the perfect solution.

Today, we know differently. Many of the world's biologically-rich forests are disappearing at an alarming rate. Each year an area of tropical forest the size of New York State is lost. A major cause is the expansion of industrial tree plantations, which supply pulp to meet worldwide demand for paper products.

In developing countries, a third of the paper produced is already tree-free, and there is now a budding, if small, tree-free paper industry emerging in the West. The materials used are:

• **CROPS**, including kenaf, an African plant which makes an excellent paper pulp; hemp, a versatile plant and

a component in the first papers ever made; flax, the plant used to make linen; and cotton.

• AGRICULTURAL RESIDUES, or crop leftovers, such as rice and wheat straw, sugarcane bagasse, banana stalk fiber and grass clippings.

• **COTTON RAGS**, as in the days just before wood became the raw material of choice.

The benefits of using non-wood sources extend beyond saving trees and forest habitat. The production process is itself more environmentally sound, requiring fewer chemicals and less energy. [According to an article on the Betterworld.com web page by Chris Nedler, this is because of the lesser amounts of lignins in non-tree fibers. Nedler also notes that because most plant fibers are naturally a whiter color than wood, they require less bleaching and, in some cases, none. Less bleaching results in less dioxin and fewer chemical by-products being generated by the papermaking process.]

For this reason, it is important to not only look for tree-free paper products, but chlorine-free ones as well. There are two chlorine-free designations:

• **TCF**, or *totally chlorine free*, meaning paper that is made without chlorine or chlorine derivatives. This applies to virgin paper.

• **PCF**, or *processed chlorine free*, which means much the same as TCF, except that it applies to recycled paper.

Many tree-free papers are actually blends of non-wood fibers and postconsumer waste (recycled) paper. This is a good thing. Using recycled paper to create new paper saves both water and energy, and helps keep pollution down.

So, next time you shop, seek out the tree-free blends marked PCF -- they're the best paper products you can buy. Don't forget to encourage your office supply store to carry these papers if they don't yet. Let the publishers of the magazines you subscribe to know you care, too. That's how to be a real engine of change.

For example, Nedler reports that Bandelier Designs Inc. of Santa Fe. New Mexico, offers several lines of tree-free papers made from banana sludge and seaweed that are marketed to stores such as Waldenbooks and Barnes and Noble. Even the national office products stores like Staples (Tree-Free Recycled Multipurpose Paper: 90% post-consumer and 10% hemp; chlorine content not indicated) and Office Depot (several types of Southworth paper: 25% Cotton Paper and a mix of recycled and postconsumer fibers; chlorine content not indicated) offer tree-free papers.

Caring Co-Chair, Where Art Thou?

Are we, the very active community of fellow Unitarian Universalists known as UUCT, a "caring" church? (I ask.)

<u>Of course, we are!</u> This is one of the most caring churches I have ever known in my life. As a UU community, I see us, above all other attributes we possess (like our tremendous love for singing and talent at it, and our great sense of humor) interested in one another and each other's welfare.

So why can I not find new Co-Chairs -after Peggy Lentz stepped down last summer -- to head up the Caring Network Committee of UUCT?

I need others to help me "network" among ourselves -- Board members and anyone else interested in helping me search -- to ask around to see if anyone feels the need as many who are so active in the church see it.

So far, **Joanne Taylor** has agreed to be our new "Co-Chair" (Thank-you, Joanne!)-- but only if it is with someone else. So where is that 'Someone Else'? A job description would help! What's involved?

Well, mainly a Co-Chair for Caring is a "Contact" person at the center of UUCT's "Web" (or "network") which includes virtually everybody who is a church member. If someone in the church has a "need" which we can deal with, the Co-Chair will know who to call, who can help with what. (We have data base lists, needing updating all the time, in our church computer! The Co-Chair asks around, does surveys, updates who can do what, if called upon.) Leon County fourth graders. What kinds of "needs" come up which our church can help with?

1. Giving someone a ride to church on a Sunday (or to a committee meeting or other event at UUCT).

2. Helping someone meet a doctor's appointment or get to a hospital.

3. Visiting a person who is sick in the hospital, bringing them flowers, etc.

4. Taking someone to pick up a prescription at a drugstore.

5. Helping to organize and run the reception after a "Memorial Service" when the need arises.

6. Sending a Get Well card or Thinking Of You card to someone who has not been awhile to church.

The Co-Chairs will, in time, begin to "sense" the many types of little needs which are part of our lives and which we, as a church, might be able to help out with.

The Church Office does get phone calls from folks in need. It would be good if Kathie Mackie or Membership Chair Trudy Deyle or Rev. Amy could pass along these "calls of need" to a "Core Group" of Caring Network UUs (or their Co-Chairs) to look at, to check out our rich data base of "Gifts of Self," and to determine who might be able to come to the rescue.

Helping friends in need at UUCT is a truly immeasurable "gift of self", far more meaningful than going to church on Sundays. You may know this already! For example, on Saturday morning Dec. 7th, I went with Joe Lama, Ed Oaksford (and his son James), and Rod Oldenburg up to Charlie Terrell's tree farm to find a Christmas tree. Coming home, Ed treated us to a meal at a little pig-out restaurant on the road south of Cairo. That morning and afternoon -- out with The Guys -- was (is), for me, what the joy of being a UUCTer is all about. Pure Saturday Fun!

Helping another person, or a friend, in need at church is a human experience of powerful, positive spiritual growth, whenever we get a chance for it. Extending a helping hand is a meaningful way of affirming the interdependent web of all being (which we UUs call one of our 'Principles'). It is way of making "connections", of "staying connected." Caring expands one's Universe!

If you are a computer-friendly person who is people-friendly also, then becoming a Co-Chair of the UUCT Caring Network committee may be the way you may best serve your church! And then you, along with Joanne Taylor, will become our *Ambassadors* of *Caring* here. Think about it!
