Minister's Message

If your New Year's resolution is to speak out more about your religion and your beliefs, you may find it helpful to read what other UUs wrote as "elevator speeches" during the 11/30 Sunday service. Here's what you might say if you had only a minute or two to answer, "What is Unitarian Universalism?"

- * The UU faith, for me, allows for all ways of exploring the mysteries of human existence the path of the intellect (science and philosophy) the path of the mystic (meditation and inner knowing) the path of the creative (artistic and practical problem solving) and the path of social action (seeking justice and peace and harmony for all).
- UUism is a community of people who value each individual in their search for truth and meaning and respect the interdependent web of all existence.
- Peter Raible, the minister at the University Unitarian Church in Seattle, WA always ends the service with: "Let your acts rather than your words declare your religion." To me that is the essence of Unitarianism.
- * Unitarian Universalism allows people to ask questions. To develop their own beliefs about the ultimate. It also encourages doubts and honest discussion of belief. As a result, UUs do not share one idea of religion. They also borrow from many religions and honor what is similar in most religions – love and compassion.
- * Each UU has a unique perspective and definition of UUism. What seems to me to connect most UUs is the notion that UUism is a path or framework to support our own sincere and honest searches for truth and meaning. We strive to be open-minded, inclusive, and action-oriented, committing ourselves to seeking justice for all through our actions.

- Unitarian Universalist since 1999.
 Church of Tallahassee, it is the greatest church I know of. Thanks.
- * Being a UU is: freedom to believe what you choose; freedom to question openly; freedom to connect with others; freedom to be Me!
 - I don't believe: in organized religion; that there are preset creeds we must believe or ideas we must accept as truth even as evidence mounts against it; in an exclusive religion that says some must fail to find salvation. I do believe in racial equality and in a religion that accepts and welcomes rational science. I believe in the inherent worth of all people and the acceptance of spiritual questions and their individual answers. And finally I believe in a church the practices what it preaches. It doesn't just say "love one another" but encourages actions to show that we do and must love one another. All of this is what I feel about my place at the UUCT. UU is the table where Jesus sits with Confucius, Buddha, Jehovah, Abraham, Ralph Emerson, Chief Joseph and many others debating the nature of life.
- * I am a Unitarian Universalist because this religion fits my way of being in the world. It encourages me to be myself as I seek a path toward the spiritual meaning of life. That spirituality at the moment is about love, forgiveness, compassion, and social justice.
- Every one has their own truth.
 Question, be an insurrectionist.
 Respect all life.
 - As a Unitarian Universalist I believe that each day I must create anew the meaning and meanings of life. Its purpose and point. I believe in free will, biology, physics and rhubarb pie. P.S. The 7 Principles and 6 Sources are helpful and centering.

- UU is more concerned in making this world better, unlike, Christians getting ready for the next world, if there is one.
- * Four (Different) Sentences of Introduction – humor, avoidance, serious, as appropriate: A UU is an atheist with children; UUs believe in karma, not dogma; It's a secret, I can't say much; UUism is a spiritual home where seekers of all faiths are welcome and accepted to seek truth as they see it.

Thank you to those who wrote or spoke their elevator speeches at the service. Here is the elevator speech that started this recent round of brief statements on our religion:

"The Unitarian side tells us that there is only one God, one spirit of life, one power of love. The Universalist side tells us that God is a loving God, condemning none of us, valuing the spark of divinity that is in every human being. So my version of what Unitarian Universalism stands for is: One God, no one left behind." (UUA President, The Rev. William Sinkford)

Maybe each of us will always have different answers, but that's part of the draw of our religion. Belief statements are not written by religious authorities for everyone and for all time, but by individuals for themselves and for now.

For the second year, the four most recent Presidents of your church, plus a former Board member, have been meeting monthly with Rev. Amy and me to review leadership policies and procedures. The precise thinking of each participant is somewhat different, naturally, but I would explain it to you, generally, thus:

- We (members and leaders together) have a duty to continually be alert to new leadership talent among members and friends.

 Steinke tools for understanding.
- Managing committees and meetings; passing on the mantle.

4. Becoming a leader who cares, and other leadership skills.

Spiral Scouts

As recommended to the Church Council by the Youth Religious Education Committee, the Council is in turn recommending to the Executive Board that the Spiral Scouts - Seven Hills Circle become an officially sponsored program within the Youth RE Program. Spiral Scouts is a program for girls and boys of minority faiths working, growing and learning together. The international organization began in February of 2001 as an organized children's program within the Aguarian Tabernacle Church and now recognizes groups worldwide.

The program has a unique approach to youth programming. Each group is led by both a male and a female adult, to achieve and teach the balance that is central to Earth-centered beliefs. While Spiral Scouts was developed on Pagan beliefs and practices, it is designed to be adaptable by other minority faiths as well. In addition to traditional woodland lore, camping and the customary scout activities, the program includes teaching the many mythologies of the ancient world.

Within the program there are three levels of child participation: Fireflies, who range from preschoolers through age 8: Spiral Scouts, ranging from age 8 through 14; and Pathfinders, who range from 14 upward. Groups are

organized into Circles, which may be made up of Hearths for the different age groups.

Exciting News! Receipt Of Grant For Harmony Camp

In October the planning committee for a Harmony Camp August 2-6, 2004, at UUCT submitted a grant application to the Fund for Unitarian Universalist Social Responsibility (FUSSR). We have just received notification that we were awarded a grant of \$2,020 and a challenge (matching) grant of \$1,400.

Harmony Camp provides young people experiences with people of various religions, cultures, ages and abilities and with the interdependent web of life. It enables them to share common experiences, discovering that we are more alike than we are different.

We already have numerous in kind contributions including use of the UUCT facility and commitments of staff to teach diversity and conflict management through interactive activities, games and learning experiences. Other activities will include meditation, journaling, yoga, dances of universal peace, creativity through art, ethnic food preparation, cooperative projects like environmentally friendly gardening, and interaction with the elderly population at Edenbrook.

Partners from the greater Tallahassee community will be: the Islamic Center of Tallahassee; the School of Arts and Sciences, a charter school that emphasizes diversity and parental involvement; Temple Israel; Friends-Religious Society of Quakers; the Multicultural Families Group of Tallahassee; the Center for Equity and Cultural Diversity at Florida A & M University; the students at Florida State University's Center for International/Intercultural Development; and The Riley House Museum. Having Harmony Camp at UUCT is an important step in our commitment to diversity.

2003-2004 Issues Update

Housing and Homelessness: The Round-Up program has been changed so much by commissioners that it is unrecognizable. The TEAM proposal was to offer utility customers an Opt-Out on rounding our utility bills up to the next dollar, an average of \$6.00/year per customer (business and residential). However, the commissioners will vote on January 14 for an Opt-In rate of 50 cents/month. The original plan was based on a program that has been tested in other cities, and was to raise substantially more money to help meet the needs of local homeless people and help people stay in their homes. So the "Round-Up" program needs a new name; the 50 cents Opt-In version is not what commissioners originally agreed to.

Social Justice (Continued)

Teen and Juvenile Issues: Our elected UUA Study and Actions officials voted unanimously to budget \$50,000 for a teen center. The center is held up because no suitable property has been found.

Health Care: By a slim majority, commissioners voted to fully fund indigent health care in our area from the MSTU tax that had been temporary and raises \$1.2 million/year.

TEAM needs your help!

What will it take for this interfaith organization to gain the clout it needs to bring social justice to Tallahassee? More chances to propose issues, more follow-up at commission meetings, more active congregations, more people like you!

Support Drive

TEAM participants from UUCT decided to help with the corporate support drive (meeting with local CEOs) but not the congregation member support drive. The support drive goal this year is \$25,000. Older organizations like TEAM can raise 3–4 times that amount in order to supplement congregational dues that pay the organizers and keep up the office.

Next TEAM Gathering: Monday, January 26, Assembly and Support Drive Kick-off.

Excerpted from UUA Materials

UUA Study / Action Issues: Each year General Assembly chooses a social justice issue for congregational study and action for two years, so there are two current Study/Action Issues (S/AI). They give congregations and districts opportunities for study, discussion, involvement and action.

- 1. CIVIL LIBERTIES, the S/AI for 2002 - 04, will be presented for vote as a Statement of Conscience at the 2004 General Assembly. The Commission on Social Witness is asking for congregational input on the wording of the draft statement, by 3/1/04. What can UUs do to protect civil liberties against governmental violation in the name of "homeland security" and in the wars against terrorism and drugs?
- 2. CRIMINAL JUSTICE AND PRISON REFORM, the S/AI for 2003 - 05, asks: How do UUs successfully advocate for reform of the criminal justice and prison systems, even as the prison industry expands to accommodate more people and becomes increasingly inhumane and unjust? The Commission on Social Witness is asking for congregational input on this S/AI by 3/1/04.

Suggestions for congregational involvement are in the Resource Guide for each S/AI. These have been mailed to congregations. All information in the

guides is also available at the Commission on Social Witness web site: www.uua.org/csw. If you are interested in discussing these issues, contact VP for Social Justice Annette Pearce (386-4053) and see the information posted on the Denominational Affairs bulletin board at the back of the sanctuary.

Action of Immediate Witness: One of the Actions of Immediate Witness passed at the 2003 UUA General Assembly calls for congressional support for the Depleted Uranium Munitions Study Act of 2003. In addition to communications to members of Congress, we can use publicity in various forms to help raise public awareness and support for a study and hopefully a future end to the use of depleted uranium in weapons. One of these publicity forms is bumper stickers which can be purchased from UUs for Social Justice and which read: "Support Our Troops by Stop Using Depleted Uranium, www.UUsforSocialJustice.org, uusj@att.net". They can be purchased by mail for 10 for \$8.00, with each additional sticker costing 60 cents. Checks should be made payable to "UUSJ" for "bumper stickers".

FY 2004 - 2005 Committee Budgets and Program Plans

Attention to all who wish to have input into the 2004 - 2005 UUCT asking budget. The Finance Committee needs your help in determining what money is needed to support the programs of the church for next year. Each chair of a committee and anyone else whose work requires support from the operating budget needs to submit to me by Sunday, January 11, a request in writing which includes sufficient information to justify the budget request: the activities and items requiring funding, and the amount requested for each. (Submissions may be made via e-mail or by putting a hard copy in my mailbox at church.)

It will save committees time if they also think about and outline their accomplishments for the past year and program visions for next year. These are due to Canvass Chair Isabel Sheridan

February 1. Isabel has distributed last year's accomplishments and visions to all committee chairs for updating in a uniform format. The information needed includes: a description of what your committee does, recent accomplishments (since the last canvass), goals and plans for the coming year, larger hopes and dreams for future years, and names of committee members.

Committees are especially reminded that Rev. Amy will be on sabbatical leave during part of the next fiscal year (July and August 2004). They need to consider what effects, if any, Rev. Amy's absence will have on their work and whether they will require special funding to accomplish essential tasks. They should include such money in their budget requests for the next fiscal year.

Some activities are supported by collections or donations, are managed by "pass-through" accounts and do not appear in the operating fund. However, they need to be included in the budget to provide a complete description of activities of the UUCT. Estimates of amounts for these accounts, as well as any fund-raisers proposed for the next year, also need to be submitted with committee budget requests. Even if you can not give all the details of a fund-raiser at this time, it should still be included in your budget request if you are sure you want to do it in the coming year.

The Church Council will meet Tuesday evening, January 20 at 7:00 PM in Room C, to review budget requests and the draft asking budget formulated by the Finance Committee.

Church Council Actions in December

The Church Council met December 14, 2003 and considered the following:

- 1. **Budget Preparation** for FY 2004-2005. (See article above.)
- 2. Shared Ministry. Jennifer Carver reported her research into how other churches accomplish their Shared Ministry goals and noted that some congregations consider periodically volunteering for basic church tasks, such as Greeting and Hospitality, to be part of the membership covenant. Discussion followed on how that might be accomplished and kept on an "encouraged" versus mandatory basis, possibly as an addition to the Annual "Gifts of Self" form that members and supporting friends complete.
- 3. **Spiral Scouts**. Maggie Geraci, DRE, presented a recommendation from the Youth RE Committee that the local Spiral Scouts group be accepted into the UUCT as one of Youth RE's subcommittees. After discussion the Council approved recommending this

to the Executive Board on a one-year trial basis, provided that a covenant of mutual goals and responsibilities is developed between Scout leaders and the Youth RE Committee. A separate, related proposal to approve a Spiral Scout fundraising event in January will be forwarded to the Board with a recommendation that it not be approved for this fiscal year. However, the consensus of the Council was that, if the relationship goes well, a fundraising event by the Spiral Scouts might be considered for the next fiscal year.

4. Policy Concerning Sale of Books, CDs and other Materials by Guest Speakers and Presenters at or after Sunday services. At the request of the Green Sanctuary Committee and by vote of the Council, the Council's September 2003 policy recommendation to the Board was opened for reconsideration. A substitute motion was considered to permit Sunday morning service

presenters / Guest Speakers / musicians to offer books, tapes, and other materials related to their subject, topic or performance outside the sanctuary but on site, and without it being mentioned in the Order of Service or during the service. The substitute recommendation was not approved, so the September 2003 policy recommendation not allowing such sales stands. The key objections to permitting such sales are: first, that the purpose of Sunday morning worship seems undermined by the obvious goal of vending materials; and second, that making even-handed exceptions to such a policy, even when desirable, would be extremely difficult.

5. **Next Meeting**. The Church Council will meet again Tuesday evening, January 20 at 7:00 PM in Room C, to review budget requests and the draft asking budget formulated by the Finance Committee.

Often, the e-mail takes the form of an urgent ASAP reply requested. Maybe, we need to restrict such matters to less frequent meetings scheduled for this purpose. In the meantime, computer e-mail allows many of us to enjoy hearing from one another often and to keep up with our daily joys as well as concerns. Long live our e-mail and its church -- thoughtfully sent out. Joyfully received!

Gwendolyn Waldorf Is New A/V Coordinator

We now have a new Coordinator for our Sunday service audio-tape library and other such useful UU library resources at UUCT. Gwendolyn Waldorf brings a wealth of archivist experiences (in museum collections, exhibits, and administration) to her task. She is currently writing a history of Grady County, Georgia.

Gwendolyn writes: "We have over 200 tapes, with a new one added each week; we circulate around 30 tapes a vear. Most - 75% - of the tapes checked out are for dates within the previous three months. UUA Trustee Tidbits

The UUA Board of Trustees is vested

by the UUA Bylaws to conduct the affairs of the Association and, subject to the Bylaws, carry out the Association's policies and directives as provided by law. The Board also has the power to "act for the Association between General Assemblies". This is in contrast to the General Assembly's responsibility to "make" policy. The responsibility of the Board also includes the authority to adopt resolutions and to take actions necessary to implement policies. There are twenty District Trustees, four Atlarge Trustees, and a Youth Trustee.

Certain responsibilities are delegated by the Board to committees through which the Board may act. These include standing committees: Executive, Ministerial Fellowship, Finance and Investment. The Board is able to create additional committees and determine their duties. Examples include the Anti-Racism Assessment and Monitoring Team and the Justice working group.

In January, the UUA Board of Trustees will be meeting in Boston, with "working groups" meeting on the Friday preceding the Board meeting, which is held on a Saturday and Sunday. The Board meets in Boston three times per year and a fourth time

before and after General Assembly. The Board agenda is prepared by the officers and suggestions for agenda items are requested from Board members. We receive a tentative agenda at least a week prior to the meeting, with all available supporting documents. The Board, District Presidents, the Commission on Appraisal, and the full professional staff receive the minutes as soon as possible after the meetings. Minutes of past meetings are available at www.uua.org.

It is the normal practice of the UUA Board to conduct business in public, but the Board may decide by majority vote at any time to deal with certain matters in Executive Session. These may include personnel matters of a delicate nature, legal matters of which public discussion could be legally injurious, budget matters that involve legal or personnel matters, and property acquisition. Any officer or trustee may initiate a request for an Executive Session, a Session may be ended at any time by majority vote, and the session will close with a determination as to whether the material is confidential and needs to be confidential.

In addition to the President and Moderator, who may act as UUA representatives, Trustees may represent the Board or the Association at meetings and events where it is desirable and where the Moderator has agreed to the representation. Trustees are entitled to represent themselves as UUA Trustees at ceremonial events where such representation is considered desirable by the Trustee. Trustees are responsible and accountable for avoiding any ambiguity about their representative role or authorization to speak for the Board or the UUA.

Now that our Phase One building project is complete and final costs are in, it is time to finalize the long-term financing package, including how we will pay off the remainder of the construction loan. As you may remember, the construction loan was necessary because we did not have all the Capital Campaign pledge money available during construction. The three-year pledge period does not end until June 30, 2004. On March 10, 2002, we approved a flexible financing package for Phase One consisting of Capital Campaign pledges, endowment funds and a mortgage. It is now time to decide the specifics of this package: the final amount of mortgage, the final amount of endowment funds, and exactly how these endowment funds will be used.

Therefore, a **Special Meeting** of the Qualified Members of the church will be held at 2810 N. Meridian Road, Tallahassee, Florida, on Sunday January 25, 2004, at 12:00 noon.

As approved by the Executive Board on December 4, 2003:

"The purpose of the meeting is to approve alternative procedures for paying off the remainder of the construction loan using a combination of a 15-year bank mortgage and an interest-free loan from the Endowment Fund after the construction loan has been reduced as far as possible with current money in the Building Fund and from money yet to be received from building fund pledges. The loan from the endowment fund is to be paid off with income from the remaining endowment funds; this will require about 15 years. During this time endowment funds will not be available for financing Phase II or for other purposes."

Our By-Laws require:

- 1. A quorum of 40% of the Qualified Members of the church in attendance at this Special Meeting in order to take action on the above item, and
- 2. Two-thirds (2/3) of those in attendance voting in favor in order to adopt procedures.

"Qualified Members" are those who are 18 years of age or older who have been members of the church for at least 30 days.

Consequently, your presence at this Special Meeting is very important.

A discussion meeting will be held at the church, 2810 N. Meridian Road, Tallahassee, Florida, on Sunday January 18, 2004 immediately following the service.
