to approach our last hour with the calm of a philosopher and the gentleness of a saint, and to leave the world enriched by a treasury of kindly deeds and a memory of love;

this is our Aspiration, this is our Ideal.

President's Message

"If the map doesn't agree with the ground, the map is wrong." Think about it. A stunning metaphor. It's one of the rules proposed for healthy living by psychiatrist Gordon Livingston. If the hill drawn by a mapmaker isn't where it should be, the mapmaker got it wrong. I thought immediately of the number of times I've been mistaken about events and issues over the years and have had to adjust my thinking, my map of how the world works, to bring it in line with reality. Maybe you've done the same. It's called "experience."

It is surprisingly easy to convince people of things that don't exist. One lady auctioned a toasted cheese sandwich on E-Bay recently for \$26,000 because it seemed to bear the image of the Virgin Mary. You know how hard it is to get cheese to melt in just that shape? I've ruined a lot of provolone trying to duplicate the "miracle," so maybe it's the real thing.

Still, I can't believe it belongs on the "map," although the Holy Mother is flexible in showing her image. Before the cheese, there was a plate of spaghetti, mistakenly eaten by a hungry teenager who didn't realize its holy nature. And before the spaghetti, there was a plate glass window in a mid-Florida bank.

And the mistakes get even bigger. The President has been following God's orders to reorganize the Middle East, evidently assured by the Almighty and by Iraqi émigrés that the U.S. would be welcomed with open arms. So he didn't plan on using overwhelming force, didn't plan on casualties, so didn't mobilize adequate medical forces to back up the troops, didn't plan on total collapse of order so he disbanded Iraqi police and the army, didn't plan on the infiltration of jihadists so the borders were left open, didn't plan on ... you get the picture. Somebody's cartographer got it mighty

wrong, but there's no admission of mistakes. It is unthinkable that God's map was in error, so they're still trying to locate that hill.

There is merit in checking the ground, now and then, to validate the map. We plan to do that in coming months. Please keep the Saturdays of February 26, March 19, and April 16 open. We need to hear you tell us what you think about things. We want to know whether we and Rev. Amy are doing what you have in mind for our journey as a church community. We want to move ahead, but we need to be sure of the path, and a couple of hills have appeared that weren't on our map. Time to make adjustments? You tell us. We're going to give you that chance. This is what it's like to live in the real world.

The RCDC, at its meeting in December, decided to go into a "placeholder" mode. That is, since no one is able to chair the committee right now, we decided to keep the committee in existence. At face value, this situation seems more problematic than it is, I believe. The reason no one is able to run the committee is that so many committee members are on the ground running, doing the social justice things that we as a church value. For example, many RCDC members are involved in Harmony Camp, which RCDC initiated last year. That is a year-round commitment. And many of the RCDC members have major responsibilities on other UUCT committees. In my view, it is the same "not enough chiefs to represent the tribe" issue that led to the VP for Social Justice vacancy on the Board.

Several RCDC initiatives continue to happen on a regular basis, for example, Riley House's Rock-a-thon, Blended Lives, and Harmony Camp. And as individual church members offer social justice events (like the civil rights trip to Alabama in February), racial and cultural diversity continue to play an important part in our church.

We'll learn more about global warming and brainstorm together to commit to action on behalf of the environment and the world. More environmental and healing issues will be developed in the adult forum and service that Sunday as we focus on our UU seventh principle, "respect for the interdependent web of existence of which we are a part." Reverend Jesch will give the homily. There will be more information on the weekend's events in the February Meridian.

Global Warming

It's on its way! Floridians may expect rising sea levels to impact coastal property. (Sell soon!)

We can expect saltwater intrusion and perhaps more intense hurricanes. Scientists are still not sure of the effect of global warming on the frequency of these storms. However, Alaskans, Canadians, and people in other Arctic lands in Europe and Asia are already feeling changes. In August, I returned to the Brooks Range within the Arctic Circle for a 10-day river rafting adventure on the Kongakut River. I saw changes attributed to global warming which I did not see six years ago while rafting the nearby Hulahula River.

This summer we saw cottonwoods growing beside the river and also climbing up the mountains, the only trees visible in the entire range other than small river willows. Moose feed on cottonwoods, and their range is moving further north. We saw several of them this year. Rivulets of melting permafrost ran steadily between the hummocks of soggy tundra as we labored to hike up mountains in rubber boots. The ice pack at the coast off Kaktovik on Barter Island is receding further and further, making it difficult for the Inuit people to reach whales, seals, and polar bears. Marie Antoinette might say "Let them eat Spam," but today their subsistence way of life depends on living off the sea. In the Alaskan interior, houses are sinking due to the melting permafrost

and roads are buckling. Global warming has arrived in Alaska.

This crisis will effect us soon enough. For these reasons, the Green Sanctuary Committee has chosen to address the issue of global warming proactively: to help our congregation learn more about what is occurring and why, and to commit to action personally, as families, as a church and as a community—as well as to affect legislation at a national level. The nature of the interdependent web on earth is quickly becoming apparent world-wide.

Mark Twain said: "Everybody talks about the weather, but nobody ever does anything about it." The Green Sanctuary Committee and UUCT disagree. Many members are already making strong statements through educating themselves to current issues and through personal change. Remember to join us for the Saturday workshop and Sunday forum and service the weekend of Feb. 19 - 20 as we strengthen our inquiry and commitment together!

UUCT and Tallahassee Civil Rights History

I am proposing that the historic, former Unitarian Fellowship of Tallahassee building be saved and included in the Florida State University (FSU) Campus Master Plan.

In 1954, the Unitarian Fellowship of Tallahassee was formed, with its constitution, bylaws and charter from the Unitarian Association in Boston. Dr. and Mrs. Paul Finner gave the land on what is now Wildwood Drive, on the south side of the FSU campus, for the construction site of a chapel. Dr. Finner was a retired FSU psychology professor, and Bertha Finner was famous for having been asked to stop teaching at a Methodist Sunday school because of her liberal beliefs.

Architect Ernest Daffin and building contractor Arthur Fixel, a UFT member, went to work. Construction began in May, 1956, and was completed that December. In 1964, North Meridian Road was chosen as a possible site for the ever-expanding church, and in 1966, FSU agreed to buy the Wildwood property.

While I was presenting this information to fellow members of the board of

directors of the Tallahassee Trust for Historic Preservation several months ago, two people said that the Unitarian Fellowship was where civil rights initiatives were talked about in Tallahassee during the late 1950s and into the 1960s. This intrigued me, so I did some research.

The Tallahassee Council on Human Relations was Tallahassee's first integrated civic organization. It met during the late 1950s and into the 1960s. In The Pain and the Promise: The Struggle for Civil Rights in Tallahassee, Florida, Glenda Alice Rabby says the following about the council: "... held its weekly meetings in the Unitarian [Fellowship] near Florida State University. Those 'blessed Unitarians,' Lillian Shaw recalled twenty-four years later," (Ms. Shaw was interviewed in 1982.) Rabby also says: "... the fact that black and white citizens were gathering on an integrated basis somewhere in the city was news in Tallahassee."

On Heritage Day in January 2004, FSU's "Integration," a group of three

African-American figures sculpted by Stanley W. "Sandy" Proctor out of bronze, was dedicated on Woodward Street Plaza on the north side of FSU's campus. This is in a line with the Wildwood site, which is just to the south. The three figures are: Maxwell Courtney, the first black student to enroll at FSU in 1962; Fred Flowers, the first black baseball player in 1965; and Doby Flowers, the first black homecoming queen in 1970.

Just think about it. Civil rights plans were made on Wildwood in the fifties and sixties and "Integration" was dedicated on Woodward in 2004. You could not mark the civil rights movement in Tallahassee better than to preserve the Fellowship building on Wildwood. Yet the FSU Campus Master Plan is considering tearing the building down.

I hope this important monument in Tallahassee will be allowed to stand and be restored to its architectural splendor.
