Minister's Message: Humanism & Unitarian Universalism

After the Sunday service about Humanism one of you wished I had talked more about Humanism and Unitarian Universalism. So here's a brief sketch. Humanism has been redefined several times, and probably will be again. The tree of Humanism is no one-stalk palm – Humanism's branches include Secular Humanism and Religious Humanism. The branches are intertwined and as soon as one gains ascendancy, the other starts to rise.

Humanism is the core of 18th C. enlightenment rationalism (historians call those Humanists "Deists" - for example, Thomas Paine) and 19th C. freethought movements (Ralph Waldo Emerson [d. 1882] and the "Transcendentalists" are found here: Francis Ellingwood Abbot [d. 1903] was a Unitarian minister and a leader of the Free Religion Movement; Felix Adler [d. 1933] founded Ethical Culture in New York City – from Reform Judaism.) They were political and social activists. Some located God everywhere and rejected the distant judge image of the sacred. Some located God nowhere and rejected the supernatural aspect of the sacred.

Before Felix Adler founded Ethical Culture, he was a part of the Free Religious Association, organized in 1867 with Ralph Waldo Emerson's leadership when the American Unitarian Association tried to impose a test of belief. Emerson and the others would have landed outside that circle of inclusion. Unitarian "theological radicals" as well as non-Christian religious liberals were drawn to the Free Religious Association. The end to this conflict? The American Unitarian Association re-drew the circle he was dean of the Abraham Lincoln of inclusion bigger, the Free Religious Association disbanded, and not only are all sorts of Humanists welcome in

the American Humanist Association, a great diversity of beliefs are welcome in the Unitarian Universalist Association (the Unitarians and the Universalists merged in 1961).

Of the 34 people who signed the Humanist Manifesto I of 1933, 14 were Unitarian ministers. The ones who launched it were Midwestern the Chicago group.

Raymond B. Bragg organized that first manifesto when he was 30 years old. A graduate of the Meadville seminary in 1928, for two years he had a ministry in Evanston, IL. He was the associate editor of "The New Humanist" and Secretary of the Western Unitarian Conference.

Charles Francis Potter was a "catalyst" for the academicians who mulled over the idea of defining humanist ideas. Potter was a speaker and author who had served as minister of Unitarian Churches in Canada and the U.S.A. for years. He was helpful to Clarence Darrow and the defense during the Scopes trial as "librarian and Bible expert."

Ray Wood Sellars was lecturing at the University of Chicago in the Fall of 1932; he prepared a draft of the manifesto from conversations that had been flowing for at least a year.

Curtis W. Reece grew up and was ordained Baptist. Later, he became a Unitarian. He was a founder of the American Humanist Association and its president for 14 years. In his professional career, he served Unitarian Churches in Alton, IL, and Des Moines, Iowa and like Potter, was Secretary of the Western Unitarian Conference. For most of his career, Centre, Chicago, IL (1923-1957). In 1926 his book, "Humanism," was

published; in 1931, "Humanist Religion" was published. Note of Florida trivia: Reece and his wife moved to Kissimmee in 1957.

John H. Dietrich is known as the father of Religious Humanism. He was Mercersburg Academy's valedictorian in 1896 and a hard worker on his family's farm. He converted to Unitarianism from the Reformed Church, where his beliefs in Jesus' humanity and the fallibility of the Bible led to his trial for heresy. In his ministry with the First Unitarian Society of Spokane Washington (1911-16), the congregation grew from 60 to 1,500 members. In 1915 he preached on "The Right to Be Well Born", in favor of family planning.

Dietrich defined his religion as Humanism, following Frederick M. Gould's usage in the British Ethical Societies' London magazine, that is "in the sense of the belief and trust in human effort." From 1916-1938, Dietrich served as minister at the First Unitarian Society of Minneapolis. Dietrich was central to the defeat of legislation that would have stopped teaching evolution in Minnesota public schools. In 1927, Dietrich's sermons were published as texts in the monthly "The Humanist Pulpit." Dietrich died in 1957, and toward the end of his life he wrote, "I like to think of myself as both a theist and a humanist."

A comment about Emerson to close this article: in this 200th year anniversary of his birth, we have a resurgence of interest in Ralph Waldo Emerson's ideas, both mystical and humanist. Not long ago, the president of the Unitarian Universalist Association, William Sinkford, wrote of the benefit of religious language. The debate reminds me of the response to then

president of the UUA, William Schulz in his 1990 article with capitalized words like Creation, Holy, Sacred, Divine, Profound and Grace. In 2003, what was released but ... "Humanist Manifesto III"?! Unitarian Universalist ministers were among those who

signed on. Humanism is dead; long live Humanism!

Creating a Green Sanctuary (GS) - Past and Future

PAST. Creating a Green Sanctuary for UUCT and striving for certification has been a continuing church-wide endeavor, with many people already involved. Shortly after Green Sanctuary (GS) became a Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) concern, Tom and Norene Chase alerted Dexter Easton to the existence of the program that had been announced at the UUA General Assembly. Dexter liked the idea and ordered a copy of the GS manual.

Shortly thereafter, we held a general informational meeting at the Church, together with Heart of the Earth (HOTE), so we could learn more about the concept. HOTE and some other groups described their interests, and Dexter presented a review of the material contained in the GS Manual.

The committee began informally, and at some point, Dexter nominated Ed Oaksford to be the Chair. The committee agreed and so did Ed. He turned out to be an excellent choice and has been at the forefront of UUCT's Green Sanctuary movement, leading the effort for the greening of UUCT and increasing environmental awareness of its members.

The Committee along with other UU green supporters and Heart of the Earth members recognized Ed at a Summer Solstice celebration at the Oaksfords. Citing just a sample of Ed's accomplishments, he organized two Earth Day services, a concert with UU green troubadour Jim Scott, and conducted energy and trash collection assessments. The energy research resulted in a lower energy bill. We are appreciative of his work and also thank him and Linda for hosting the Celebration. (We initially told Ed that this event was just to celebrate GS accomplishments.) We also thank Linda for her support with this event and for being a green trooper throughout.

FUTURE. Pledges for the Resolution to Combat Global Warming will be sent out and collected. These Green Corner articles and the once a month Green Forums will continue. Expect upcoming articles on Energy Efficient Washers and Dryers (Elinor Elfner), the Benefits of Ceramic Paint for Houses (Pam Hoskins), and The Problems of Exotic Invasive Plants (me). UUCT has at least three plant invasives: Coral Ardesia, Creeping Japanese Fern and Nandina.

New GS Committee initiatives include 1) Planting a Butterfly Garden (with Youth RE classes) and having more environmental education for the children, 2) Developing an Environmental (Green) Library, and 3) Having outdoor environmental education field trips and adventures. We also need to find a local environmental issue and work with a local environmental organization to solve it. An alliance with the Big Bend Environmental Forum may be the answer to this. Also the Landscape Sub-Committee led by chair Elinor Elfner will be asking for your help to restore and enhance our grounds as Mother Earth intended her garden to be. We on the GS Committee think these are exciting opportunities and say to you "All Aboard".

This month and next, several groups will meet with decision makers in town to research the areas within the issues.

Homelessness/Housing: 1) Inadequate services; 2) Emergency housing for families: 3) Education for homeless people, especially youth.

Heath Care: Barriers to access to affordable health care for people who are...indigent; students; working poor; elderly.

Juvenile/Teen Issues: 1) Lack of afterschool cultural and life enrichment programs; 2) Differences in school performance around the county.

On September 22, TEAM will sponsor an Action, where officials who can make changes will agree to the proposal/demands that will positively affect the lives of low- and middleincome people in our area. Social Change! Social Justice! Come, be a part of the Action – the more bodies, the more good thoughts, the better. Save the date, and we'll save the world (or something like that).

Facilities Update

Completion Inspections

On Thursday, June 12, the **Inspection Sub-committee of the CIC** (Tom Chase, Nina Cline, Trudy Deyle, Elinor Elfner, and Francis Ventre) spent the afternoon looking over the site work and new building in detail with our architect, Andy Welch, and representatives from Mad Dog. Andy noted all items needing completion or further attention and subsequently issued a Substantial Completion Report.

Additional inspections and reports were done by the civil, structural, and mechanical/electrical engineering consultants who have design and construction review subcontracts with the architect. Mad Dog also produced their own report on items needing completion or further attention. They are working on the items listed in the various reports and a few items cited in final inspections by the City and hope to be done within thirty days of receiving the architect and consultant reports. At that time, a **Final Inspection** will be done.

Drainage is one area where some refinements to what was planned were needed. The two new "speed bumps" are not to slow our driving down as much as they are to direct water into the drainage inlets. Some additional berms have also been added around the inlets to direct water flow. Along our northern perimeter where the driveway and yard meet, Mad Dog is working on ways to spread out the flow of water and so lessen its velocity.

Our Playgrounds

At a joint meeting of the Youth Religious Education, Buildings and Grounds, and Capital Improvement Committees, the following plans were made regarding the toddler and main playgrounds:

- The **toddler playground** (to be called "the tot-lot") will be a fairly large area just to the northeast of the new nursery, in the direction of the sanctuary. It will be large enough for romping around - approximately 25 by 33 feet in dimension and bounded by sidewalks at its southwest corner,

closest to the new building. Its western boundary will be along the straight sidewalk running between the new and old buildings.

The tot-lot will be on the opposite side of this walk from the new building courtyard and will encompass grassy areas and a mulched area under the trees (where the play equipment will be). It will have a single gate near the nursery and will be surrounded by a fence - most likely a low, toddlerfriendly, picket-style one. A stand of wildflowers within the tot-lot will be fenced off and protected.

- The **main playground** (to be called "the playground") will be behind (or northwest) of the new building. It will have the foundation wall of the building as one boundary and then follow its own former fence line along the north and west. A new fence line will be created along the south.

Our old playground was originally sized to be used by a pre-school during the week. Without this need, the playground can be somewhat smaller than it was before. However, there is room to expand to the south if we need to do so in the future as we grow. There will be a single gate into the playground at its southeast corner, with the possibility later of adding a second gate at its northeast corner and a "bridge" and path to the gate, running from the wooden walkway behind Room 6.

- For safety, the Buildings and Grounds Committee will fence in the air conditioning units and the dry wells for condensation which are located behind (or west of) the new building. They will also put a fence at the edge of the grassy field where a rubble-filled drainage ditch goes down to the water retention facility. **Workdays are scheduled** to create the tot-lot and reclaim the main playground. We need the help of UUCTers of all ages. This includes volunteers to come set out a simple meal for the workers at lunch-time. See *Events* for the workday dates and contacts.

Thanks to a gift in memory of Richard Lee from his daughters and wife Christine Boczarska, we have the money for one new play set for the playground. This will be a fitting gift in Richard's memory, as he was always concerned about meeting the needs of our children and youth. We will purchase needed, additional play equipment for both play areas as funds become available. The picnic table will be moved within the main playground for use there.

Surplus Furniture and Cabinets

The Buildings and Grounds Committee has been busy procuring free, surplus furniture to meet our additional furniture needs, with the help of Blaine McBride, a retiree who gathers surplus furniture and distributes it for free to non-profit organizations. The Committee is gradually chipping away at the list of needed items. They are also working on any changes needed for Room 4 to become the Religious Education/Campus Ministry Office and for Rooms 3 and 6 to become one large room - for the Middle School class Sunday mornings and the YRUU youth group meetings Sunday evenings.

In addition, Margaret and Neil Mooney have given their former kitchen **cabinets** to the church for use in either the new or old classrooms or in a combination of the two. Since RE attendance is lighter in the summer months, Room 5 is currently being used to store these cabinets.

Our New Drive & Parking

We have a number of improvements to our driveways and parking. They were required by the City for a very good reason: traffic, bicyclist and pedestrian safety. For example, although we were used to entering the church property via either access drive to Meridian in the past, doing so was potentially dangerous. Another example is the former cut-through drive behind our street sign, which has been eliminated because it was potentially dangerous. Let's all play it safe and observe signs and driveway markings!

For everyone's safety, please observe the following guidelines in driving and parking:

- Observe the entry and exit drives. (From Meridian Rd., our left-hand drive is now exit-only and our right-hand drive entrance-only. Please do not enter via the exit drive or exit via the entry drive.)

- Go slowly and don't spin your tires on the gravel parking surfaces. (Drive as you would in snow, if you have experience with that!)

- Park only in gravel areas or in spaces marked on the pavement, and not in the turnaround loop or unmarked area in front of the new building. (The concrete bumpers will be used again to mark some of the gravel spots.)

- When parking in the gravel spaces on the south-side of the drive to the new building, go around the loop at the end of the drive and then park at an angle.

Our former grassy field - to the southwest of the new building - will eventually be available as a gathering/play area or an overflow parking lot, as needed. However, for now, we are not going to use it, so that grass seed and sod can take hold there.

Board Actions for June 2003

The Executive Board met on June 5, 2003 and took the following actions:

- Approved the revised and updated Policies & Procedures Manual.
- Reappointed Ellen Dempsey to serve as Treasurer and Joan Patterson to serve as Assistant Treasurer for an additional two years, starting July 1, 2003.
- Approved the Fiscal Year 2003-2004 Covenant and Working Agreement between UUCT and Rev. Amy and authorized the President to sign the agreement.

- Appointed Sara Reece to a threeyear term on the Committee on Ministry, beginning July 1, 2003.
- Authorized the construction of three plaques honoring the following esteemed, deceased members of UUCT: Ralph Cook, Paul Finner, and Herbert Taylor. The Board approved the wording proposed by the Honors Committee and requested that a chalice be printed on each plaque.
- Approved acceptance of a nonmonetary contribution (a native tree to be professionally planted in honor of a deceased relative), if

the Landscape and Honors Committees feel it is appropriate. The Board requested that these committees provide feedback on their decision to provide guidance in the development of a policy for acceptance of non-monetary gifts.

 The Board accepted the following to serve as delegates at General Assembly: Dexter Easton, Jennifer Carver, and DeWayne Carver; Rev. Amy as our Ministerial Delegate. The Board authorized the President to appoint an additional delegate to complete our voting delegation.

A Report from the Ad-Hoc Honors/Recognition Committee

By Trudy Deyle, Committee Member The Finance Committee and the Executive Board concluded several months ago that UUCT needs a comprehensive policy on recognizing gifts of self and gifts of substance. In general, there is a need for consistency in the way different levels of gifts are recognized, at the same time that we continue to appreciate all gifts of self and substance, no matter what their duration or size. Specifically, there is a need to recognize the generous beguest of Ralph L. Cook - a bequest that has enabled us to construct the entire "L" of our new building, in addition to doing all the site work for our master plan.

In order to address these needs, VP for Finance DeLos DeTar was asked by the Board to form an Ad-Hoc Honors Committee. The Board also decided that Ralph's bequest should be recognized on a plaque hung in the new building, with the Committee to work on proposed wording. Del asked William Adkins, Pauline Masterton and myself to serve on this committee, renamed the Ad-Hoc Recognition Committee. Our first tasks were the proposed wording for the plaque for Ralph and considering whether there were others whose gifts should be recognized by a plaque. We considered input received from: District Executive Mary Chulak Higgins, the congregation - at the March 2 congregational forum, and individual UUCT members and friends. We agreed on the following guidelines regarding plaques:

- Those honored on individual plaques will be those who have made an exceptional and substantial contribution to the church's growth.

- Those honored with individual plaques will usually be deceased, with exceptions to this considered on a case by case basis.

In keeping with these guidelines, the Committee proposed and the Board agreed that two other former members should be honored with plaques:

- Paul F. Finner for the gifts he made as our church began - the land for our first building on Wildwood Ave., the space in his nearby basement for our first RE classes, and bequests for our endowment;

- J. Herbert Taylor for his ideas on the general design of our Meridian Rd. sanctuary and original classrooms and for overseeing their construction.

The Committee went through numerous versions of language for the three plaques and consulted writers within the congregation. We feel that the simple wording chosen, and subsequently approved by the Board, will appeal to a majority of the congregation. For Ralph, there is recognition of his dream for UUCT, as well as his bequest. Our hope is that the plaques will be ready for the New Building Dedication on September 14, although this may not be possible. We our now turning our attention to development of a proposed, comprehensive UUCT policy on recognition, again incorporating the input received in recent months from others.
