Everything we think and do is governed by some paradigm, big or little, authorizing, justifying, explaining. Everything we think and do. There is never a vacuum. When Socrates advised, "Know thyself," he said perhaps more than he knew. Our lives are ordered by the way we see the world: e.g., our attitudes toward women, toward men, gays and lesbians, marriage, war, the gods, teenagers, SUVs, etc. mark with her poems. God mend thine every flaw

- Confirm thy soul in self-control
- Thy liberty in law!

What she wanted for our country, I want for our country. In my travels, I have seen so much beauty-- a diverse landscape, variety in vegetation, rich soil of red, brown, black. But also broken down buildings, lives bent from unfair policies, land stripped for unreasonable monetary gain. That's just in the U.S.; what of our attempts to export democracy? How is that going?

The gap between the aimed-for and the actual was not lost on Ray Charles*, who recorded "America the Beautiful" in 1972. His gospel/blues interpretation was not ironic. On singing about harmony and ideals during oppression and injustice, Charles stated, "I'm the first to say this country is racist to the bone, but that doesn't mean I can't be patriotic. For all the b---s--- about America, I still work and live here in comfort." We live in a beautiful land. An imperfect country. A nation that acts impetuously at times. A place that wants to be known for freedom. Whose laws are sometimes unjust in practice if not in writing. Yet, this land of liberty is a grand experiment. For all its flaws, it still seems possible to bring forth a free land from the seeds that have been planted.

Keep the ideal before us. Admit the flaws. Praise the beauty. Sing the truth!

This is why it's important to peek around the edges of the ruling paradigms and see what else is there. What a surprise to learn that other ways of seeing the world actually exist and often appear no worse, or possibly better, than the ones we normally use. Which, to get closer to my point, is why Religious Education is so important. Children need to be taught early in life (and adults need to be reminded) that the single viewpoint, or religion, or pathway is never the only possibility and is more likely a preference acquired through familiarity or practice.

Our aim is not to paralyze the mind nor to suspend ourselves, feet off the ground, between choices of action. Preference is okay, quite often. It's just important to know that it IS a preference and not God's dictate. Personally, when people talk about God's will, I start looking for a bunker. Moral: Call Maggie Geraci and volunteer for the RE program at UUCT. Or enroll your child for the fall session.

Late-Breaking News on Piano Purchase

As this *Meridian* goes to print, our music director, Helen Falb, has been busily hunting a piano for our sanctuary, and it looks like we've found a winner! It's a 7-foot Baldwin, 2002 model, that has never been sold. The price will be negotiated, but will be in the \$26,000 range in addition to the trade-in value of our current piano. (An '04 model retails at \$53,000, so it appears to be a very reasonable price.)

The piano sat in Jim's Piano Store in Albany, Georgia, where Helen played it June 21. It was moved to the UUCT sanctuary at the end of June, where it will be carefully inspected by an independent piano technician, Bruce Hargabus, before we agree to buy it, pending board approval July 8.

The existing piano fund contains \$20,463.40, so we're short about \$5,000. The Finance Committee has recommended to the board borrowing against the reserve fund for that amount; we'd repay it by continued fund-raising. In addition, we need to

Green Corner

This *Green Corner* is somewhat nostalgic for me because it will be my last as editor and chair of the committee. What a great, enthusiastic group of people to work with! Seeking the Seventh Principle Project (7PP) accreditation has been a journey more than a goal. The committee and the church have engaged in many green ventures these past few years.

The last week in June the committee set a goal to assess all accomplishments and compare them to required goals. Two necessary ones are "becoming involved in an ongoing environmental justice project with other organizations" and assessing the operations of the church to determine if they are as green as possible. January 2005 is a reasonable date to become an official 7PP Church because of some of the things mentioned in the next few paragraphs. Other good news is that a



new crop of volunteers have offered green sanctuary gifts of self.

UUCT has paid dues to join the UUA's 7PP and our region's Big Bend Environmental Forum, an alliance of local environmental organizations.

Locally this means that as part of the BBEF alliance, UUCT's GS Committee will be co-sponsoring three upcoming Forums. They are: Monday, July 18, "County Greenways;" Monday, August 23, "Environmental Candidates Forum" (local commissioners); and Thursday, October 7, "Secrets of Wakulla Springs". The first two are in City Hall in the Commissioners' Chambers. There will be an opportunity to set up a table showcasing our endeavors.

You are encouraged to support the TAPP (Think About Personal Pollution) Campaign. That project has the goal to make our lakes, springs and aquifer cleaner. This is another program about taking personal responsibility. Visit <u>www.tappwater.org</u>. The Building and Grounds Committee will be asked to adopt the principles in TAPP's Guide to Water-Friendly Landscapes. That also meets a 7PP requirement.

Bruce Brandt has encouraged for adult religious education to "Let 1,000 Flowers Bloom". One of the blooms this Spring was a Voluntary Simplicity workshop, coordinated by Kathie Mackie and Maggie Geraci using NW Earth Institute materials. Their lessons learned are shared in the following article.

How will you become more environmentally friendly this year?

Green Corner (Continued)

Lessons Learned from Voluntary Simplicity

Gwendolyn Waldorf: I am consolidating errand days and grocery days instead of having multiple trips spread all over the week; taking more time with my family instead of trying to do as much as possible; doing one thing at a time; appreciating delays waiting for the computer, traffic lights, etc. - as natural breaks in my day; planning my life instead of my time.

Linda McConnell: My personal experience with this group was excellent. I enjoyed the materials, the companionship, and hearing from such diverse perspectives. I realized that I was not the only "mom" who boycotted offensive toys/products/fads aimed at children. I enjoyed the thoughtful and provocative insights concerning making choices. How I choose to spend my money does make a difference, and the choice I make with my money does reinforce my beliefs and lifestyle. I have begun to carefully research the appliances and products I intend to purchase (and have purchased) with zeal.

Chelsea Fox: The results of my involvement in the Voluntary Simplicity course might not be noticeable to most. It's not really something you can observe, but more of an enhanced mindset. I take my goal of living a simpler life and apply it to everything I do, all day, every day. Now I have a clearer sense of what simple living actually is, and every time I have a choice in what I do or how I do something, I can call upon that knowledge and act accordingly.

Beryl Cassiday: Besides getting to know some great people and hearing from different age groups, I learned that it is time to "pare down" all the "stuff" I have accumulated over the years. I have been giving things away to people who can use them, taking things to Goodwill, and even donated some crystal to the UUCT auction this year. (Note from one of Beryl's daughters: GO MOM!).

Kathie Mackie: I enjoyed this group so much. Everyone reinforced my living simpler views. I have been working the most on "precycling." A quote from our VS workbook gave this definition: "Reducing garbage by preventing it in the first place rather than to deal with it once it is here." I have been buying as much as I can in bulk, making just about all of our evening meals and everything else I can think of from scratch, thus eliminating almost all prepackaged foods from our kitchen. Making compost out of produce scraps and coffee grounds has also benefited my precycling efforts and our garden.

All felt the workshop and materials were beneficial and encourage others to study using the NE Earth Institute format. We will be offering their course *Choices for Sustainability* in the fall. Look for the sign-up sheet.

Articulating Our UU Faith

How do you usually describe and explain your UU faith: in terms of what it is, or what it is not? In words for today's world, or in out-dated Judeo-Christian terminology? With too much brevity, or in too much detail for the listener to grasp? Seriously, or jokingly? I've got to admit it's a challenge! But does it matter for our listeners, for our fellow UUs and for ourselves how we describe our faith? You bet it does!

Give some thought to whether or not you are talking about UUism in as straightforward and positive a way as possible. Perhaps, it's time to reevaluate ways you have become accustomed to talking about your faith - re-evaluating them in terms of the effect it has on yourself and others, including your fellow UUs. For instance, in the "Articulating Your UU Faith" adult enrichment class last winter, one participant said that to avoid potential conflict, he often referred to UUism jokingly when talking with others, especially non-UUs. He realized this was really putting down his faith in his own eyes and the eyes of others. After taking the class, this same person gave a very sincere and affirmative canvass testimonial at a Sunday service.

Another UUCT member has been used to referring to UUism jokingly around fundamentalist Christian relatives, as a

necessary and understandable coexistence tool and tension diffuser. But when this same method of articulating UU faith was used in a public, nonchurch setting around a fellow UU, the other member found it deeply offensive.

So spend a little time thinking about how you refer to and describe Unitarian Universalism and how you might want to improve on it. The five session "Articulating Your UU Faith" class will be offered again next fall or winter. You might consider taking it. Those who took it last winter had a wide range of years as UUs, and all felt that the class definitely helped them out in their articulating!

TEAM Chooses a New Direct Action Issue for 2004-05

Unitarian Universalist Church of Tallahassee (UUCT) remains active in TEAM, helping to choose a new issue to tackle this coming year. Sunday, June 5, 2004, UUCT members and friends voted their choice of issues via paper ballot. With 46 ballots submitted, the results are shown in the opposite column.

These votes together with one-to-one conversations between members helped a group of seven UUCT members and friends cast their votes (2 for jobs, 2 for healthcare, and 2 for public transportation) at TEAM's annual assembly held June 14 at Temple Israel. Faith Presbyterian's large contingent voted as a united block of 46 votes and threw the vote for public transportation. Although TEAM will continue it's work on affordable housing, health and teen issues, we will also begin work on public transportation.

Monday, June 28, TEAM held its annual research training at Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church. For all of those who are aching for an inspiring joining of forces with people of diverse faiths for the sake of positive social action, we urge you to keep an eye out for future TEAM events like this. You will be amazed at how much can be done for the common good when folks put aside their differences and channel their energy towards issues of mutual concern. Even though you have greeters at the doors, a welcoming table for visitors, nametags, packets to be given or mailed to people and lots of activities for adults and children, sometimes visitors say that no one talked to them when they came.

Remember every member of your church was at one time a first-time visitor and all of us get only one chance at making a first impression. Each one of us can be prepared to say "Hi I am----, I don't think I've had the pleasure of meeting you; were you able to sign our guest book?"

Visitors can be encouraged to talk about themselves and their journey to the church. It is important that guests Sept. 3 - 6 - CLF Community Gathering at The Mountain: The 2nd annual UU Church of the Larger Fellowship gathering for all CLF members.

be asked to visit at least three times, and that they are introduced by you to at least one other member. I suggest if the minister, president, or lay service leader is close at hand, you could make an introduction to her/him.

Another valuable process for assessing your church's welcoming profile is conducting guest interviews. Interviewing visitors can provide some of the best information you can receive about how your congregation and its members are viewed, how your facilities make an impression on the newcomer, and how well your congregational systems for welcoming newcomers actually work. It would be beneficial to have a team of members from your congregation to do visitor interviews, dividing up the responsibility for the total number of interviews to be done.

Someone on the team should compile the responses to the questions you've chosen and summarize them to share with the team and the membership committee. These interviews should provide a good general profile about the impressions you are making on your visitors and your strengths, problems, and limitations as a congregation. From all of this you will be able to make recommendations to the congregation regarding your ability to welcome newcomers.
