Message From Your President

Since I joined UUCT almost twenty years ago, I have been continuously active either as a committee member, committee chair, or Board member. As we approach FY 2002-2003, I am beginning a seventh year (total) of stewardship on the Executive Board. Each year the experiences of search and service have challenged me, brought new opportunities for growth, and strengthened my faith in our UU principles.

Each year I can see more clearly how FREEDOM, REASON and TOLERANCE feed into the democratic process we have chosen as our preferred method for getting things done. Our boundaries of FREEDOM are stretched

by accepting responsibility, and by making our decision process more transparent. Practicing TOLERANCE enhances the capacity for empathy needed for using REASON in a fully responsible manner. All of our principles require diligence in seeking valid and reliable information, and in soliciting feedback. We need both creativity and empathy in defining issues and seeking solutions. I have seen how these processes work in the small universe of our Board and congregational activities, and in our District and Association operations. I am always finding evidence that the process can be applied in the larger world.

Last month my faith was tested in a typically UU way, during a series of two Sunday services conducted by Reverend Amy and Rod Oldenburg. In this shared ministry effort, we explored the ramifications of PACIFISM vs. PRAGMATISM, in considering "the use of force" (on both a national and personal level) in response to aggression or threats. After the first service, we were asked to choose which camp we favored. I wavered initially, then found myself firmly in the PACIFIST camp, though without articulated reasons why.

At the second service, during the congregational discussion, someone made the point that if PACIFISM is at the "opposing" end of our "Use of

Force" continuum, then the other end ought to be the "supporting" end, which levels, there are political or diplomatic could be called MILITARISM, representing those who actively advocate the use of force, or mobilize resources for using force, whether in response to an attack, as a deterrent or as a pre-emptive strike for potential threats. PRAGMATISM is really in the middle.

The MILITARIST position is wellsupplied with money, political influence, and popular support. What would happen if there were a comparable level of grass-roots support for non-violent

Green Corner

<u>Green Power? Tradable Renewable</u> <u>Energy Certificates? Green Tickets?</u> Is this for real? Evidently.

At a workshop on April 24th, the Tallahassee City Commission voted to authorize the negotiation of a green power program implementation agreement with Sterling Planet, entitled *Green America*. The program may include a variety of components including the opportunity to purchase "green power."

So, what is green power? It's electricity generated from one of the following sources: solar electric, wind, geothermal, biomass, and small or certified low-impact hydro facilities.

How can we buy green power in Tallahassee? I thought all our power comes from the city's generating facilities that are natural-gas and oil-fired steam-electric generating plants. Well, it does, except for a small hydro-electric facility on Lake Talquin and a miniscule amount of solar energy generated at the swimming pool complex on John Knox Road.

At some point you may be able to actually buy your electricity directly from a green power supplier somewhere within the regional electric grid or power pool that supplies electricity to this part of Florida. Once that becomes possible, you will essentially be paying for green our outreach to three diverse campuses. You can help! If you have connections with FAMU or TCC, please contact me at kim@cennexus.com or 385-6856. Also, you can join the Campus Ministry Committee; spread the word through flyers, other publicity and sitting at an information table during orientation; create welcome baskets for incoming students, etc. Join the Campus Ministry team today!

Our group will be meeting once per week over the summer, Friday evenings at 6:00 PM at Black Dog Café. We will have a combination of Coffee Hour and Discussion, with students bringing a

power that is actually generated and used within the regional grid. (You won't necessarily use that electricity yourself, but you will be paying the generator of that green power for producing the same amount of electricity you actually use.)

Right now what you can buy, in the form of "tradable renewable energy certificates" (TRECs), are the "unbundled" positive externalities of green power from certified power producers elsewhere in the country. "The what?" you say. TRECs are payments for the extra costs associated with producing electric power that yields "green" benefits by reducing or avoiding the environmental impacts of electricity production from fossil fuels: emissions of carbon dioxide, sulfur oxides, and nitrogen oxides, water consumption, thermal pollution, solid waste, noise, and adverse land-use impacts. When you buy a TREC your payment goes to the green power producer to offset the extra costs of producing the positive benefits of green power.

Sterling Planet is one of several certified purveyors of such certificates. Currently you can purchase TRECs directly from them or several other organizations. The Center for Resource Solutions (www.resource-

solutions.org/TRECs.htm) has certified

six purveyors including Sterling Planet:

Apparently the program to be negotiated by the Tallahassee Utilities Department and Sterling Planet will allow Tallahassee residents to buy green power (TRECs) more easily, perhaps at the same time you pay your city utility bill.

So what do TRECs cost? At present the Sterling Planet pricing system is not specific for different locations and the mix of energy sources from which a consumer currently obtains their power. TRECs (or "green tickets") are priced

site work will begin in the drainage easement granted us by our neighbor to the north, then move to our northwest corner in back, and continue from there toward the front of our property along Meridian.

Building construction. Work on the new building will start as soon as the building pad is ready, about six weeks after the start of site work. This should be about mid-July, with building completion in mid-January or mid-February, if all goes according to schedule. Our building permit has been issued. The only major item that had to be added in order to receive a permit

was a fire alarm system.

We are currently working out the final details of our construction contract with Mad Dog. The contract will be written in such a way that items we had to postpone to keep costs down (and be able to handle the addition of the fire alarm system) can be added should costs for other work and materials come in lower than bid by subcontractors and suppliers. The CIC has prioritized these "add-alternates" as follows, beginning with the first item to be included should funds be available: the remainder of the cabinetry and shelving, the drop-off canopy along the new driveway, the moveable partition between the two multipurpose rooms opening into each other, the sidewalk canopies, and the remainder of the outdoor signage. Currently, we are only planning to have the signage absolutely required by the Fire Department. We are also hoping to include an electrical upgrade of the service in our current facility as a definite part of the construction contract.

Sanctuary Improvements. We are still planning to have the sanctuary recarpeted and purchase new chairs this summer. However, we must first determine what to do about the sound system; the sound system wiring is tied into the current stage, which is to be replaced by the new moveable stages. Victor Venos (current sound system volunteer), John McDevitt (who installed the current system when the sanctuary was built), and I met with sound system consultants about our current system and our future needs. We have received a proposal for upgrading our current system and replacing our current speakers with a single, high quality one. The CIC would like to be able to upgrade to this proposed system, replacing the patchwork system we currently have.

Financing. The Board has approved a final financing package which falls within the parameters voted on by the congregation March 10, 2002 (use of up to \$350,000 in endowment principal and a mortgage of up to \$200,000):

- We will use \$250,000 of Endowment principal (\$150,000 from current funds + \$100,000 from the bequest of Ralph Cook). This will leave \$300,000 in the Endowment, assuming we receive the full \$400,000 possible from Ralph's estate, which appears quite likely.
- We will have a \$200,000 mortgage with payments to be covered equally from the operating budget and endowment interest approximately \$11,500 in payments per year from each. It is estimated that even after using some endowment principal and interest, we could grow the endowment to be around \$420,000, after fifteen years, depending on how the principal is invested and provided we receive the full bequest from Ralph Cook.
- The remainder of the financing will come from our Capital Campaign gifts of \$446,500 (\$470,000 in pledges discounted 5% for unmet pledges).

We have met with Stephen Kahn, Ralph's personal representative, and informed him about our plans for Ralph's very generous bequest. Tallahassee State Bank (TSB) has agreed to give us a \$200,000 mortgage, and we are finalizing arrangements with them. Part of these arrangements will be for the building fund account to be transferred to TSB now and for the church operating budget account to be transferred to them at the beginning of the new fiscal year July 1, 2002.
