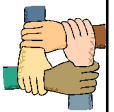

Recycle Your Ink Cartridges at UUCT

Never know what to do with your used inkjet or laser jet cartridges? You know if you throw them away they are going to end up in a landfill. But who wants to take them off your hands?

Well...we do! Bring your cartridges to the church, deposit them in the box clearly labeled in the sanctuary, and we will turn them over to the InkBank company, who in turn will send the church a check for every good cartridge they can use in about 30 days. **Cartridges cannot be** previously remanufactured inkjet and laser cartridges. Off-brand, or cartridges that have been previously refilled, or that do not have the original OEM manufacturer label on them are not eligible. Only cartridges with Hewlett Packard, Lexmark, Canon, IBM, Apple, Sharp, Panasonic, Pitney Bowes or Xerox are eligible for recycling. **Sorry, Epson cartridges are not recyclable.**

Kathie will have a list of the cartridges and their numbers on a sheet posted in the sanctuary near the collection box. You can bring us your cartridges from work as well as home. If you need a box or bag for collection, let Kathie know, during work hours only please (M-F, 7:00 AM - 3:30 PM, 385-5115). If your workplace uses many cartridges, bring them to us! The more the better.

Facilities Update

CURRENT UPDATE

Our site-work and new building will be substantially completed by early June. This means that a "Certificate of Occupancy" will be issued to us by the City, and we can begin to move into and use the new building. Mad Dog Construction will have 30 days from that date to take care of any loose ends. In terms of site-work, we can begin to use the new driveway and parking areas soon after the asphalt is put down and the equipment is cleared away.

THE FUTURE

Several people have asked when the fellowship hall will be built. This will be done as part of Phase Two of implementing the master site plan we developed with the architects and approved as a congregation.

The new building has been designed structurally so that the fellowship hall can be added. A number of features were also added to Phase One to prepare for the future and avoid re-doing things in Phase Two. These features include upgrading to the capacity of electrical service we will eventually need and laying piping and electrical wiring for the fire alarm/sprinkler system we will eventually be required to have. These features for the future have added costs to Phase One, but will save us substantial amounts in Phase Two.

Phase Two will also involve renovating the sanctuary and original classrooms. In a Phase Three, we will build an administration building with staff offices and the eighth multipurpose room, and a small maintenance office and storage area at the southwest corner of the new building.

Based on over 20 years of working with UU and other churches, Jerry King, the UUA consultant who did our Feasibility Study for Phase One and also helped us with our Combined Campaign for it, advises doing a capital campaign no more often than every 7 - 10 years. Congregations need breaks between campaigns and an opportunity to grow in programs, community outreach, and pledge base.

If we were to follow Jerry's and the UUA's advice, we would conduct a capital campaign for Phase Two no sooner than the spring of 2008 - beginning to plan the details of the building project with the architect and the construction manager in 2006. The CIC has learned a lot in Phase One, and hopefully a few of us will have the time and energy to serve on the CIC again or at least be involved in an advisory capacity for Phase Two!
