June 5 The 'Right' to Live, Kill and Die

Justice, equity and compassion in human relations. Back in the 1960s when abortion was still illegal, Rev. Bob Eddy, retiring minister of the UU Church of Pensacola, helped women obtain safe abortions. In recent years he has been an escort at the clinic where Paul Hill killed Dr. Britton and a member of the Pensacola congregation—though he believes human life begins at conception. Rev. Eddy has been a member of the Hemlock Society since its creation, but he opposes "involuntary euthanasia." A pacifist since age 14, he supports the "conscientious warrior." Find out how he reconciles these seemingly contradictory positions.

I thank them, and you should, too.

Turmoil at the top could have disrupted all below, but the impact was minimized by leadership in key areas. RE leaders moved to establish stronger communication between parents, teachers, and students. Led by Norene Chase, the Sunday Adult Forum enjoys constant success. Freethinkers' Forum continues Tuesdays with excellent participation.

And Kristin King's Program Committee has a stellar schedule of speakers through August.

I cannot overlook Kathie Mackie's consistent admin support, Trudy Deyle's hard work in publishing the *Meridian* month after month, Dave Harvey's pursuit of the new sound system, and his and Steve Urse's work to buy and install a dishwasher for the kitchen. Christine Boczarska, Bob Deyle, and Annette Pearce deserve special mention for handling the congregational discussions fairly and openly and with instructive results.

Rev. Mary Higgins paid us a compliment back in February, when the future looked very uncertain. She told us that the church is in good shape. She was right. It is. And I thank you again for holding a steady course.

Congregational Conversations

The Saturday, May 21 congregational conversation was attended by nine people in addition to the Conversations Committee – Christine Boczarska, Bob Deyle and Annette Pearce. The announced topic was reviewing the findings and recommendations of the 2004-2005 Committee on Ministry Triennial Congregational Assessment. Bruce Brandt, chair of the Committee on Ministry, presented the assessment to us, with the assistance of Bob Deyle, in preparation for the Annual Congregational Meeting the next day on May 22.

The specific recommendations the COM has made also incorporate the issues that were identified by those who attended the March and April

congregational conversations as important issues to address as a congregation. (See *Congregational Issues Ranking* further on in this *Meridian* for information on the issues from the conversations.)

The May 21 conversation was a working meeting with a fairly open format. Ideas were posed, ways to approach problems suggested and time frames discussed. We seemed to be in agreement that until the interim minister is actually here and working with us, we should delay discussing and, if agreed to, putting into action the suggestions from the CCC meetings and the COM assessment recommendations.

We have done the preliminary work of identifying issues the congregation is concerned about – the congregation as a whole and as expressed by the different committees, staff and other elements of our church. Now we need a skilled, neutral minister to help us look at what a settled minister needs from us in order to serve all parties in the church successfully.

The recommendation of the May 21 group was to have the Executive Board meeting scheduled for June 15 at 7:00 PM be an open session, with the congregation specifically requested to attend. The Board President has agreed. At the meeting, the COM will present their assessment report with their recommendations for

action. This will give us all an opportunity to read through the COM assessment report and the CCC issues list beforehand and participate in the discussion of the COM recommendations.

The CCC will consider any relevant COM and board recommendations, such as issues recommended for

congregational discussion. Then, beginning with the start of the tenure of our new interim minister and with his advice, set a schedule for congregational conversations next fall.

We are doing the work that needs to be done to lay a more solid foundation for our church. That we are doing this on our own, without superimposed programs or protocols from outside our walls, is commendable. This speaks well of the health and strength of UUCT. 2005-06 promises to be an exciting year for all of us to live our expectations.

Committee on Ministry 2004 - 2005 Assessment

As part of its mission, the Committee on Ministry (CoM) assesses the state of the congregation every three years. The CoM's 2004-05 Congregational Assessment that began in July, 2004 is now complete and has been presented to the congregation.

The Committee decided to expand the assessment done previously to include not only a general survey of members' and friends' beliefs about the state of the congregation and its shared ministry with Rev. McKenzie, but also a survey of members of seven major **UUCT** committees. Specific information about RE and Sunday Service attendance and membership trends was also obtained. Finally, a scaled-down version of the members and friends questionnaire was sent to former members, friends, and visitors who were still living in Tallahassee to get information about why they left.

The full, CoM Assessment Report and a two-page Executive Summary were distributed at the 5/21 congregational conversation and the 5/22 Annual Meeting. Both of the documents can be obtained as hard copies form the church office, or as email attachments from blbrandt@earthlink.net. The CoM report will be discussed at the June 15 meeting of the Executive Board; all members and friends of UUCT are invited to attend. Discussion of all the issues raised will continue in the fall.

General Recommendations to the Congregation and Executive Board from the CoM:

The recommendations listed below summarize the specific recommendations in the CoM's report. The highest priority items are listed first.

- 1. Re-commit to the Raising the Roof/ Journey process to more clearly articulate the church's sense of direction and address those issues that arise from our being on the border between a small and midsize church. This must be considered within the context of working with an interim minister and doing the analytical work required before we start the formal search for a new settled minister.
- The Board should initiate a series of congregational discussions, facilitated by the interim minister or other neutral, UU facilitator, that address the following issues.
 Following each discussion, the Board should convene an ad hoc committee to develop recommendations, with additional input, as appropriate, from the interim minister and/or other UUA advisors.
 - a. What members and friends want and need from Sunday services, and how to most effectively meet those wants and needs in an equitable way through both lay-led services and services conducted by the settled minister.

- b. Congregational communication and decision making.
- c. Procedures for evaluating the minister.
- d. Our political biases and how we can foster constructive dialogue with people of more conservative political views who may otherwise embrace UU principles.
- Take initiatives to act on the congregation's covenant to support and sustain the youth RE Program and to evaluate the program on a regular basis.
- Continue the recommitment to the church's Campus Ministry Program.
- Take initiatives to better practice what we preach in terms of tolerance, respect, and welcoming of diversity.
- Take initiatives to enhance member participation in the shared ministry of the church and to enhance our welcoming of visitors and new members.
- Take initiatives to enhance our sense of common purpose, working together, and stewardship.
- 8. Develop a process for regular evaluation and reassessment of the role of the minister in the shared ministry of the church.

Congregational & Executive Board Actions in May

Annual Meeting 5/22/05

President of the Board Richard Dempsey called the meeting to order at 12:34 PM. Items to be voted on required a quorum of 25% of 181 qualified voting members (46 voters) and a simple majority to pass. Fiftyone qualified voting members were present.

The minutes of the April 3, 2005 congregational meeting were approved as presented. The motion to approve was made by Allen Turnage, seconded by Ron Crowe, and passed unanimously.

The minutes of the February 27, 2005 congregational meeting were approved with one revision. The title of Rev. Mary Chulak Higgins was amended from "UUA District Coordinator" to "UUA District Executive." The motion for approval was made by Joan Patterson, seconded by Jean Chulak, and passed unanimously.

DeWayne Carver announced that Rev. William Murchison has been hired as our interim minister. The one-year contract that has been signed is effective September 1, 2005.

DeWayne thanked the other members of the Interim Minister Task Force for their hard work. The task force consisted of DeWayne Carver (Chair), Ron Crowe, Sara Reece, Molly Schmid, and Kelley Turnage.

President Richard Dempsey presented the proposed slate of officers for the Executive Board. The slate was approved unanimously. The officers for the 2005-06 year are as follows (individuals within parentheses continue in office):

President: (Christine Boczarska—oneyear term, followed by a year as Past President) Past President: (Richard Dempsey—one-year term)

President-Elect: DeWayne Carver one-year position, followed by one year each as President and Past President

Vice President for Management: (Steve Urse)

Vice President for Worship: (Rod Oldenburg)

Vice President for Church Community: Dick Leinberry—one-year term, completing 2nd two-year term of William Adkins

Vice President for Social Justice: Melissa Forgey—two-year term

Vice President for Religious Education: Kelley Turnage—two-year term

Vice President for Finance: Jim Dawson—two-year term

Secretary: Molly Schmid—two-year term

Linda Oaksford and Don Crosby were elected unanimously to fill vacant positions on the Nominating Committee. The motion for these nominations was made by DeLos DeTar and seconded by Elinor Elfner. Barbara Donaldson and William Riedell remain on the committee for another year.

The 2005-06 Budget was approved unanimously as presented. The approved budget has \$213,696 in expenditures and is based on expected income of \$213,697 from all sources. The increase in pledging income is \$15,038. The motion for approval was made by Jennifer Carver and seconded by Rod Oldenburg. Jennifer Carver thanked the Canvass Committee—Chairperson DeLos DeTar, Isabel Sheridan, Margaret Mooney, and Trudy Deyle—for their hard work resulting in a very successful canvass.

The 2005-06 proposed fundraisers was approved unanimously as presented. The motion for approval

was made by Bruce Brandt and seconded by Joanne Taylor.

DeLos DeTar, Vice President for Finance, presented a report, "Brief Summary of Finances of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Tallahassee, May 23, 2004."

Bruce Brandt presented the "Report on Triennial Assessment of UUCT's Ministry," prepared by the Committee on Ministry. The other members of the Committee on Ministry during this past year were Sara Reece and Bob Deyle. Annette Pearce thanked the Committee on Ministry for their work this past year.

The report was presented on the congregational ranking of the major issues raised at the congregational discussion meetings on March 19 and April 16. A total of 76 persons participated in ranking the issues in terms of urgency and importance. The report is entitled "Congregational Ranking of Major Discussion Issues for Congregational Dialog Raised by Participants on March 19 and April 16, 2005." The report gives "Topical Rankings" for categories of issues and identification of the "Top Ten Items."

The meeting was adjourned at 1:30 PM

Board Meeting 5/11/05

Approved the minutes of the April 13, 2005 and the November 17, 2004 Executive Board meetings.

Approved the Treasurer's Report and the Balance Sheet for the time period of July 2004 through April 2005.

Approved the procedures of handling the severance pay for Rev. Amy McKenzie and the letter to Rev. McKenzie informing her of the procedures.

Approved the proposed list of fundraising events for 2005-06.

Congregational & Executive Board Actions (Continued)

Approved the movement of \$750 from current minister's package from the General Assembly line item to the Professional Expenses line item.

Approved the establishment of a bookkeeping fund for Spiral Scouts.

Approved the establishment of a new fund at Tallahassee State Bank for a Memorial Garden Fund.

Approved use of some of the money in

the Muriel Seibert-Memorial Fund, if needed, for the newly established Memorial Garden Fund.

Approved a revision to the Policy HA.1 Overall Guidelines for the Reserve Fund. The approved revision increases the limit from "up to \$2,000" to "up to \$5,000" as the amount that the Executive Board can spend from the Reserve Fund without a congregational vote.

Approved the 2005-06 fiscal year proposed budget to be recommended to the congregation.

Authorized the Interim Minister Task Force to negotiate a contract with the Rev. William Murchison.

Approved up to \$5,000 from the Reserve Fund for the task force to use in negotiating the salary with Rev. Murchison.

Congregational Issues Ranking from Spring Conversations

Issues for future congregational discussion were raised by participants at the March 19 and April 16, 2005 congregational discussions. The compiled lists were posted in the UUCT sanctuary for 4 weeks following the April conversation. Members of the congregation were allowed 10 "dots" each to vote on what they felt were the most important and urgent issues - affixing all their "dots" to one issue, to ten different ones, or to any combination of issues totaling ten votes.

The rankings below are based on the total number of dots affixed to each item. A total of 76 people participated. Individual discussion items were grouped into topical categories by the Conversations Committee. The first list gives the topical categories by the total number of votes received for items in that category. The second list gives the ten individual discussion items receiving the most votes, out of the 51 items listed.

The three-page document is entitled "Congregational Ranking of Major Issues for Congregational Discussion" and was handed out at the Top Ten Items 5/21 congregational conversation and the 5/22 Annual Meeting. - 7. How can we develop in the congregation a real respect for diverse opinions and beliefs of others? [29]
- Explicit process for soliciting feedback from members regarding satisfaction with all aspects of the church? [28]
- How to increase participation in leadership roles? [23]
- 10. How can we better nurture shared ministry, i.e. ministry by the minister and the congregation? [22]

Changes to Manual of Policies and Procedures

Well, it's the time of year again to update the *Manual of Policies and Procedures*. If you have new policies to propose or revisions to existing ones, follow these procedures:

- New or revised policies or committee descriptions should be approved and recommended by the appropriate committee or program coordinator and the Vice President over that area. If there is no committee or program coordinator, the appropriate Vice President or any Board member may make the recommendation.
- 2. After committee and VP approval, send the proposed item to Joan Patterson (1714 Ferndale Place, Tallahassee, 32301; patterson090@comcast.net, or in her box at church). Deadline for submission is June 27, 2005.
- Proposed items will be taken to the Board for approval in July. If additional discussion or clarification by the Board is

- needed, or if the Board recommends substantial changes, the items will go back to the originating committee, and be placed on the agenda for the next Board meeting.
- 4. Once the new or revised policies or committee descriptions are approved by the Board, the changes will be incorporated in the new 2005-2006 Manual of Policies and Procedures that will be printed and distributed in early September. The Bylaws require that the new manual be printed and distributed within the first three months of each new fiscal year, so our deadline is September 30.
- Copies of the manual are available in the church office if you wish to see the current versions.
- Proposed new and revised items received after June 27, 2005, will be considered at the January 2006 Board meeting for incorporation in the mid-year revisions.
