Minister's Message

Canvass (or annual pledge drive) time is an intersection for a congregation. Another intersection is the vote on March 10 including whether to accept the Board recommendation on additional funding for the building project approved by the congregation in September.

I'm glad for the help I get at intersections. On the road, the help is from other drivers. On the path of life, it's from others who care about which direction to go.

In the car, I already know which way I want to turn. During rush hour near my house, other drivers slow down and flash their lights so I can pull out into the line of traffic. They have trained me to do my part too. I've learned to pause and let someone else in before I turn at or go past the intersection.

At turning points in my life, I rely on others to help me consider possibilities and options. I ask them to assist me in operating budget and \$200,000 to the my journey. (Should I become a minister? Should I move to Tallahassee? How do I invest for retirement? Would this person be a worthy mate? And now: should Ellen and I buy a house?) Over the years, I've consulted friends, and my parents, my sister and brother-in-law, financial advisors and my grandfather. Each offers ideas, information and guidance. I feel lucky for their help.

Now we come to this congregation: on the one hand a bunch of individuals with strong opinions, and on the other a cohesive group that moves together whichever direction we take. What happens when we get to an intersection? I don't see how we'll get out into the flow of traffic, or take any action whatsoever without each other's help, ideas, information and guidance.

I can't pledge \$154,500 to the

capital campaign for phase one of the building project! My \$3,550 pledge for the 02-03 operating budget and \$5,000 pledge over three years to the capital campaign seem like mere drops in the bucket. And that's what they are. At least we all get to help fill the pail!

I'm no Miss Cleo, and can't say what the outcome of the vote or the canvass will be. However, I will say that in the past, UUCT has come through when it counted. Information and inspiration were shared, conversations were had, fear was named and addressed. enthusiasm was tempered with realism (and vice versa)--in the end the best possible direction was taken.

We'll only get there together. We're on our way!

The 2002-2003 Asking Budget will be challenging as our program and mission grow, but we can meet the challenge, each giving as generously as we are able; and we will be glad that we have done it.

Our Facilities Vote

On March 10, we will be making a decision as a congregation about additional Phase One funding. For me, this decision is more about faith in the future of Unitarian Universalism and our congregation than anything else. The Capital Improvement Committee (CIC), our architects, construction manager and civil engineer have worked hard and tirelessly to produce site and building plans that meet our programming needs for a number of years to come, but also prepare us for further building additions in the future. We have been engaged in a process of moving from the very rough concepts given in our Master Site Plan and its Space Needs Assessment to well-designed rooms that meet our program needs for children, teens and adults. I feel very good about the working relationships with Welch and Ward Architects. Poole Civil Engineering, and Mad Dog Design and Construction. We've worked as a team on the common goals of meeting UUCT's program needs and the City's permitting requirements, while remaining sensitive to our site, current facilities and funding limitations.

I believe with the site improvements and new space we will be able to become the congregation we envision and grow in both people and programs. A critical mass of members is needed for the depth and breadth of programming we envision for all ages in our Strategic Program Plan. I am confident that as we grow our total annual giving will grow both in numbers and amounts of pledges, and that our endowment will also grow to equal and go beyond whatever amount of Ralph Cook's generous bequest we use now for Phase One. In terms of membership, I am very encouraged by the number of transfer UUs we have had join recently and the increase in our certified number of members from 158 as of Jan. '01 to 172 as of Jan. '02, with four more people having joined since then.

We have made such incredible progress as a congregation since the mid-1990's in creating a vision for UUCT's future and working to fulfill it one step at a time - a vision of a congregation which nurtures the growth of its adults, teens and children, and which empowers them to make a

difference in this world, reaching out individually and collectively to have an impact in both Tallahassee and the greater society. For me, this is the last major leap into that future. UUCT will continue to grow and evolve, but with Phase One completed, we will be firmly on the path to becoming the congregation we envision. Without more space for people and programs, we are not going to grow significantly and move into this future.

I personally would like us to build enough space so we can wait awhile for the next capital campaign and reincarnation of the CIC. I'm ready to work on, participate in and support programs for our members and UUCT's involvement in the Tallahassee community. Let's build enough to meet our needs for at least five years, if not more! I am sure that many of us will need to be involved in the planning and fund-raising for the next phase. Let's give ourselves a break and attend for awhile to the real work of this congregation and Unitarian Universalism.

Be nurtured by spring in the mountains while you get to know each other better through games and laughter, singing and dancing, and creating together a family heirloom to take home.

Green Corner

Continuing with the lawn and garden theme of last month, here are a series of tips from the May/June 2000 issue of Audubon magazine for reducing the need for and impacts of pesticides in your yard.

- 1. "Get tough turf" Some turf varieties such as tall fescue, zoysia and Bermuda have high levels of endopthyte fungus that are lethal to aphids, billbugs, and sod webworms.
- "Mow right" Mowing high (2.5 to 3.5 inches) and often with a sharp blade can reduce weeds and insect problems. Go shorter in spring and 6. "Use biological warfare" fall (no less than 1.5 inches) to stimulate root growth. Frequent mowing generates shorter clippings that can readily decompose without causing thatch, which can retard passage of nutrients and water to the soil.
- 3. "Water deeply" Water only when grass shows signs of water deficiency - gravish, curled leaves. When you do water, apply at least 1 inch, and do it in the early morning, to reduce evaporative loss (heat of the day) or conditions that promote fungus and mildew (evening).
- 4. "Know your enemies" Get a good local guide to lawn and garden pests. (Can anyone recommend one for this area? If so

email rdeyle@garnet.acns.fsu.edu and I'll pass it along.) Know when you have a problem and when you don't. Some species of white grubs only hatch once every seven years.

5. "Go lightly"

Try alternatives first. Some insects 8. "Follow directions" can be removed by hand, e.g. Japanese beetles. "Aphids can often be controlled by vigorously hosing down your plants three days in a row. . . . Infestations of bagworms or tent caterpillars . . . seldom do serious damage. Simply prune the webs out."

- When pests do become a problem, 9. Web resources try a biological control or biopesticide. Lacewings and ladybugs can be purchased through catalogues and can help control soft-bodied pests like aphids, mealybugs, thrips, and mites. The bacterium Bascillus thuringiensis (Bt) control many common caterpillar pests; some varieties may harm desirable moth and butterfly species. Milky spore disease can effectively control grubs of Japanese beetles and their relatives.
- 7. "Pick your chemical pesticides carefully" Broad-spectrum organophosphates such as diazinon and chlorpyrifos kill a

- broad range of insects, and many are toxic to aquatic organisms and birds. Synthetic pyrethoids are more selective in what they kill and "are normally much less toxic than organophosphates or carbamates."
- Before you purchase and apply a pesticide, read the label. . . . If you read the label and still have questions, call your local cooperative extension service (in Leon County call 487-3006) or the National Pesticide Telecommunications Network (800-858-7378).
