Minister's Message

The Real Danger of Democracy

...it is not only by shooting bullets in the battlefields that tyranny is overthrown, but also by hurling words of redemption, words of freedom and terrible anathemas [curses, including those backed by religious authority] against the hangmen that people bring down dictators and empires.... [from Emiliano Zapata (c. 1877-1919)]

I have mixed feelings about starting this column that has my comments from the 2/15 Tallahassee Peace Rally...with words from a leader of the Mexican Revolution! Of his antiimperialist sentiments, his famous quote (something like: "I'd rather die on my feet than live on my knees.") is less overtly violent and rebellious than this one: "Never beg with a hat in your hand for what you can get with a gun in your fist." If there's a Zapata in Iraq I want to hear more of the "hurling words of redemption, words of freedom" sentiment than the armed combat kind. But from President Bush I'd also like to have more word hurling in favor of freedom here and abroad than the war build-up we've gotten. The real danger of democracy is that you might not get your way, so that a better way may be found.

I haven't previewed the show, but on March 9, FX channel has The Pentagon Papers. Note that the 1972 General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association "commend[ed] the Beacon Press for its publication of The Pentagon Papers" and also

endorse[d] and support[ed] the actions taken by President Robert West and the Board of Trustees in resisting the efforts of the federal government to subpoena the financial and other records of the Association and of Beacon Press.

and in alerting the denomination and the nation to the serious threat to freedom of religion, of expression, and of association represented by the government's actions.

Comments Given at the 2/15/03 Peace Rally, Park & Monroe Streets

Hi, I'm Amy and I am here to remind myself that I am not alone in wanting peace not war, I am here to be with others who think like me. And I'm The Rev. Amy McKenzie, from the Unitarian Universalist Church on N. Meridian Rd. (I mention where we are because I want to invite you there--our congregation will host the second interfaith community peace prayer on Monday, March 3 at 7 PM.)

Be assured: I'm not the only religious leader in Tallahassee who is not for the U.S.A. starting a war in Iraq at this time. You may not hear that from us during worship services, though, because we need to hold together the various beliefs and politics of those in the religious communities we serve. But today we are at a peace rally, so I can speak out for peace and against war in Iraq.

This is a critical moment. It is critical as we take issue with the way President Bush has gone about banging the war drum. It is critical because if there is to be peace, it is time to speak up for peace. [This is when I took out my drum from its case.] I brought my drum; it's not a war drum, it's a peace drum. But I fear I don't know how to use a peace drum. That's very sad, coming from a person of faith. But other people of faith, like the president, have defined our response, and forced it, so that here we are, for 'the 20th month running,' on the brink of a war that we will have fired the first shot to start.

Now people of faith will always have

differences. Life is boundless, people are diverse, beliefs vary. Plus, we are adept at using religion to justify anything. I choose to follow the path of peace. I mean peace not only as an outcome but peace as a means to that end.

MLK, Jr., said at Riverside Church, NY City, in April 4, 1967: "...when the issues at hand seem as perplexing as they often do in the case of dreadful conflict, we are always on the verge of being mesmerized by uncertainty. But we must move on....We still have a choice today: nonviolent coexistence or violent co-annihilation..."

How often has this country been on the brink of war? And now we have terror attacks to worry about.

James Thurber gently urges us: "Let us not look back in anger, nor forward in fear, but around in awareness." What do you suppose we'd notice? Here's an act we can take today, and every day-look around in awareness... Awareness of the many options that are not violent. Awareness of the dear people in our families, extended families, circle of friends. The dear people in our town, on our round good earth. Awareness of the cycles of politics and the eras of history. Awareness of the big, big picture in which we play a small, small part. But this is a critical time for peace.

Lao-Tse (Lao-tzu; 5th C. bce; legendary founder of Taoism) shows us a path to peace on earth:

If there is to be peace in the world,

There must be peace in the nations.

If there is to be peace in the nations,

There must be peace in the cities.

If there is to be peace in the cities,

There must be peace between neighbors.

If there is to be peace between neighbors,

There must be peace in the home. If there is to be peace in the home,

There must be peace in the heart.

Ah yes,...the heart...where the drumbeat of peace begins. It turns out I don't need lessons on this instrument, the peace drum. The peace drum sounds as long as I'm alive; as long as

you are. It beats in my heart, and in yours. We may feel it driving the pulse of the world. Look around in awareness. Listen deeply. Foster faith—remember to trust—the ways of peace. Did you notice? I didn't use texts from the three major monotheistic religions in my words today. You'll have to supply specific beliefs and religious particulars for yourselves. But somehow: find peace in your hearts.

My final quote is from Alice Walker:

Love is not concerned
with whom you pray
or where you slept
the night you ran away from home.
Love is concerned
that the beating of your hear
should kill no one.

What is a Child Dedication or Naming?

A Child or Youth Dedication Ceremony is a traditional Unitarian Universalist ritual of accepting the parents' and congregation's responsibilities in the religious development of the child or youth and welcoming her or him into participation in the beloved community. Verbal commitments are made to nurture and support. The participants are then dedicated to a life of love and service to the world and to one of creative possibility and meaning.

Any age child or youth may participate, both those new to our church community and those who have been here awhile. Our church will have a

group ceremony once a year, but it is also possible for members to arrange individual ceremonies. For the group ceremony during a Sunday Service, we will learn why children were given their name and the hopes that parents have for their children.

A Child Naming Ceremony is a similar UU ritual usually done for infants. These are two of the special ceremonies our church has to recognize our youths' transitions in life.

This sanctuary ingathering is <u>not</u> to be a peace vigil, <u>not</u> a time to pray for peace or for any divine intervention or "magic," <u>not</u> a time to protest the imminent war on Iraq, or any kind of discussion group on War & Peace. In keeping with the Buddhist traditions of <u>just letting it be</u>, we will sit in a circle around a candle, or candles, lit to remind us to touch the inner peace possible within us-- that we may feel in our own daily lives (a "peace beyond all understanding")-- no matter what the nightly news or morning newspaper report.

This is a peace to be found and embraced, in a time when any hope for averting international war by the United States is being dashed. We come just to sit quietly, together, to reflect on this peace-of-mind, to nurture this peace, and to share it with others. (Maybe bring a little poem or quote or a candle or other object that helps you keep this peace, to share.) Come join this *zazen* circle of peace.

The Caring Committee: About to Awake From a Long Winter's Nap

Several Sundays ago as I listened to our February joys and concerns, I realized I wanted to talk about a concern I have, not for myself, but for the whole congregation. UUCT needs an active Caring Committee. In casual conversations in just the last month, I have found out about current or imminent needs of several members and friends, and I'll bet you have, too. But they probably were not the same people. So there are a number of us who need caring at any one moment in the life of the church.

The good news is we have someone who is willing to be a co-chair. And we have volunteers who are willing to help, but not to organize. So all we need is one more person to say "yes." The hours needed for the job of co-chair will vary – from a few hours a month to a few hours a week in a particularly busy time. The skills needed are a caring heart (there are tons of them in our congregation), an

ability to organize, and a willingness to contact people on the phone and/or by e-mail. The Caring Committee Co-Chairs do not have to do the caring; they have to set up the caring done by others so that the needs are covered and there is no unnecessary duplication of effort.

Let me give you an example. When Mary Jones was dying two years ago, Peggy Lentz organized daily visits and nightly overnight stays at Hospice House for a month - all from her home. Most of the time she sent us emails; sometimes she phoned. The volunteers came from UUCT and from Mary's wide and deep circle of friends - all coordinated by Peggy. None of us felt overwhelmed - because Peggy had made our help manageable. If she hadn't been there, I and others would have been running in to visit or stay only to find three other people were there - or, worse, no one would have been there. Coordinating help is absolutely essential - for everyone involved. That way no one burns out and the persons in need are truly cared for.

I cannot do this job myself because of other UUCT responsibilities. But I am committed to having this committee up and running before the next issue of *The Meridian*. So I will phone everyone on our phone list. You don't have to be a long-time member; the co-chair already on board is wonderful at caring and organizing. All she needs is you.

The 8th Annual Florida District Social Justice Conference

over the 8th Annual Social Justice Conference in Orlando on Feb 8. The topics were the two current Social Action Study Issues of the Unitarian Universalist Association. The two year study cycle is part of the very effective Commission on Social Witness created a few years ago by the UUA.

The morning keynote address on the subject of Economic Globalization was given by Professor Eric Schultz from Rollins College. The afternoon keynote on the subject of The USA Patriots Act and Civil Rights was given by Howard Simon, Executive Director of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) of Florida. Each keynote was followed by small group discussions. Both speakers were outstanding. The conference was well attended by 90 UUs from all over the District. Copies of Howard Simon's handout on his key points may be obtained from Nancy Bass.

To facilitate communication between congregations in Social Justice and Social Action issues and initiatives, a Network of Social Justice Chairs held its inaugural meeting during lunch at the conference. The next meeting will be held in conjunction with the District Annual Assembly, April 25-27.

Annette Pearce, UUCT's VP for Social Justice, and Elinor Elfner, member of RCDC and the Green Sanctuary Committee, also attended the Social Justice Conference. Annette and Elinor have each led a series of discussions on globalization this year at UUCT. The decision to have those discussions was made at last summer's UUCT Social Justice Retreat.

Green Corner

Green power is here! As reported in the June 2002 edition of *The Meridian*, the City of Tallahassee was in negotiations with Sterling Planet to provide Green Power alternatives to Tallahassee utility customers.

Two types of "renewable certificates" are now available for purchase directly from Sterling Planet:

- a solar/biomass blend at 1.6¢ per kilowatt hour and
- (2) (2) pure solar at 11.6 ¢ per kilowatt hour. One certificate is issued for each unit of renewable electricity produced.

When you purchase a renewable certificate, you are buying the renewable attributes (i.e. environmental benefits) of a specific amount and type of renewable energy generation. Your purchase of renewable certificates helps offset conventional electricity generation in the region where the renewable generator is located. Your purchase



also helps build a market for renewable electricity and may have other local and global environmental benefits such as reduced global climate change and regional air pollution.

In addition, your support goes directly toward new, local solar projects. The City of Tallahassee and Sterling Planet are jointly developing 625 kilowatts of solar energy in the Tallahassee area that are planned for completion in 2004. This commitment ranks among the nation's largest solar projects.

You continue to pay the City of Tallahassee for electricity and set up an additional account with Sterling Planet. You are billed separately by Sterling Planet for renewable energy. Sterling Planet provides you an annual report on the actual resource mix of the certificates you purchase.

The solar/biomass blend consists of 5% photovoltaic and thermal solar and 95% biomass in the form of wood waste and "forest droppings"; no trees

are harvested for the sole purpose of power production. If you choose this option you can opt to replace 50%, 75%, or 100% of your power consumption with solar/biomass power.

The pure solar blend is 100% photovoltaic and thermal solar. It is available in 10% replacement increments from 10% to 100%.

The solar energy will come from Tallahassee and other Florida facilities, and the biomass from Florida and the southeast.

Usage Policy Summary

The UUCT Board is making progress in revising the Policies and Procedures Manual.

The section regarding usage of church property by members and non-members of the church is completed. A summary follows:

Use of UUCT facilities

A. Officially sponsored events:

An event originating directly from church activities (for example, planned by a committee of the church) is not subject to fee payment. Any proceeds (contributions, etc) devolve to the church treasury.

B. Co-sponsored events:

An event originating outside the church, but deemed to contribute to the central mission of the church, is subject to the same rules as an officially sponsored event (A above). No fee will be levied, but any contributions will go to the church general fund.

As may be appropriate in each instance above, a Contribution Box will be prominently displayed at the door, and contributions by participants will be graciously encouraged.

C. Outside sponsored events:

An event originating outside the church and not considered as contributing to the central mission of the church will be subject to payment of a usage fee, according to a schedule available from the church office. Any contributions remain the property of the sponsor.

The document also sets the rules under which certain items may or may not be used off-campus.

The general policies are available in both a statement for administrative use, and as a set of instructions given to users. A simple one-page contract spells out the agreement between user and the church.
