

### Minister's Message

The Passion of the Christ is one of several current movies with religious themes and spiritual pull. They portray: not just violence, brutality, and a trial that results in execution but also redemption, love, free will and the drive to live. I saw *The Butterfly Effect* and *Monster*.

"God" is a name for unconditional love. The movie, *Monster*, about convicted and executed serial killer Aileen Wuornos, humanizes her. After I watched the movie, I read more about her various and vicious crimes in order to keep the cry for justice loud. Even so, let our response neither be the cold, hard ease of revenge and retribution, nor the agonizing fires of eternal damnation. It's a worthwhile discipline to hold someone responsible when you also hold them in the human race—hold their inherent worth and dignity with their despicable acts, in

concert. Rely upon and do the work of love, forgiveness, understanding, and reconciliation.

"God" is a name for the generator of the urge to new life, the source of the nudge toward goodness. I believe that our choices change the way things will be. God hasn't pre-ordained this moment or the next. From the moving and informative United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, I learned that our country might have altered the course of history if we had revised our immigration policy or boycotted the 1936 Berlin Olympics.

In the movie, *The Butterfly Effect*, we are warned against "playing God"—going back in time to change the future. In the movie, one person's point of view is too small to manipulate things for the better for everyone in the scene; a small tweak makes a big

difference, but not always a <u>better</u> difference for the characters. I agree that the past is held in the mind of God if you will, not in the hands of humanity. But the present and so the future is in the hands of all the entities that live and act in this world.

During these final weeks of winter, ponder a religious or spiritual question.

And by the way, welcome back into my everyday schedule! We'll talk about sabbatical and what we want to do the same and what do differently during our time together in March and April, and for the remaining months of sabbatical (summer session, May-August).

# What is a Child Dedication or Naming?

A Child or Youth Dedication Ceremony is a traditional Unitarian Universalist ritual of accepting the parents' and

congregation's responsibilities in the religious development of the child or youth and welcoming her or him into participation in the beloved community. Verbal commitments are made to nurture and support. The participants are then dedicated to a life of love and service to the world and to one of creative possibility and meaning.

Any age child or youth may participate, both those new to our church community and those who have been here awhile. Our church will have a group ceremony once a year, but it is also possible for members to arrange individual ceremonies. For the group ceremony during a Sunday Service, we will learn why children were given their name and the hopes that parents have for their children.

A Child Naming Ceremony is a similar UU ritual usually done for infants.

# Ceramic Insulating Paints For Your Home

As spring arrives and the weather kind of paint. T becomes more pleasant, your thoughts tint-able white. might be turning to opening up the

house and giving the walls a fresh, bright coat of paint. You might also want to spend some warm, dry weekend painting your home's exterior. For both of these projects, there is a unique category of paint product on the market, energy-saving ceramic insulating paints.

With these paints, room interiors feel more comfortable in cold weather, allowing the thermostat to be lowered. During hot weather, the exterior paints are highly reflective of the sun's heat, reducing air conditioning costs. In both cases, homeowners can reduce energy usage and contribute a little less to global warming.

The insulating properties of these paints are due to the addition of microscopic, hollow ceramic spheres that have a vacuum inside them. Once the paint is dried, the spheres become closely packed and form a continuous ceramic film. The vacuums inside the spheres, added to the general insulating and heat dissipating qualities of ceramic material, block radiant heat loss. They lower the emissivity of the wall surface similar to low-e window glass.

Ceramic insulating paints are available in one and five gallon cans and can be mail-ordered. I was not able to find a local retailer who carries them. There is a Tallahassee painting contractor called Liquid Ceramic who uses this kind of paint. These latex paints are a tint-able white.

Other desirable qualities provided by the ceramic spheres include a degree of sound insulation, very effective covering of surfaces, and a tendency to fill in tiny cracks and imperfections. Painted surfaces also are easier to clean and less likely to get mildewed because they are not porous. Finally, ceramic insulating paints generally last longer than conventional paints. The paint is applied much more heavily than conventional paint, sometimes eliminating the need for a primer, but its appearance is like that of ordinary flat, satin, or semi-gloss paint.

Ceramic paint can cost two to three times more than conventional paint, and there is additional cost if you take it to a local paint store to be tinted. The higher cost may be offset by longer life and reduced energy costs. Other products available include a ceramic sphere additive which can be mixed in with any other paint, and coatings for the outside and underside of a roof.

Some ceramic paints are low-VOC (low in volatile organic compounds), an important quality; a separate consideration in making a "green" choice in paint is the environmental effect of the materials and manufacturing process. In a future *Green Corner*, I will write more about "green" paints. I'll also report about my experience painting a perpetually-cold room in my house with insulating paint. # Committee On Ministry: Sabbatical Role

In last month's article, I talked about what we normally do as the Committee on Ministry (COM). When Rev. Amy is on sabbatical, we have a slightly different role in addition to our regular functions.

One change in our role involves the discretionary fund that our minister is in charge of. It is used, at her discretion, to assist members and friends who may have a temporary crisis. She appointed the chair of the COM to handle the fund in her absence - myself for January, February, May and June and Bruce Brandt, COM chair as of 7/1/04, for July and August. During sabbatical months, the COM chair is also the first contact for emergency and other pastoral needs. Rev. Amy resumes these roles for March and April and in September.

Both times when Rev. Amy returns, the COM will meet to discuss and help "debrief" her regarding her sabbatical studies. This will give us some idea of

what she has absorbed through her work in the two courses she pursued and how she will be using this to help reach her goals and the congregation's as well. Then we will help her with a new plan for the upcoming year of her current contract. During the discussion we will refer to last year's goals and address any new issues. This process will repeat after the second part of the sabbatical is concluded.

Keeping in touch with UUCT committees' needs and suggestions provides the COM with useful information to move the minister and congregation forward together. There are so many functions in the church and so many people performing them that it is very easy to feel separate or disparate. We hope to work with the Executive Board and the Church Council to make each member feel a part of this larger whole we call a community of faith.

Every 3 years the COM is in charge of conducting an evaluation of "ministry."

This is a review of all of us and how we work together. The UUA has a model on which we will base our review. The model has a congregational survey and outlines a process for analyzing and using the information gathered. The survey will come sometime in the fall of this year, and I hope everyone responds to it, so we can get a true "temperature" of our church community. We know we're good, but just how good are we?

The results of this review will be part of the church's future planning, with improvements, revisions and changes that many of us may want to see but haven't voiced yet. This is a very different time for our congregation with a beautiful new building, many committees active in both the church and the community at large, and a minister who has been part of all that. It can only get better from here.

### Publicity: What's Up with the UUCT Ad?

The Publicity and Membership committees continue to receive questions and comments about UUCT's revised weekly *Democrat* ad. Although many comments have been favorable, some people want to know why we dropped the title of the service and the speaker's name from the ad. This article is an attempt to explain how we arrived at that decision.

When the Publicity and Membership committees met in December 2003, we discussed the current budget and priorities for the next fiscal year. Some members complained that the *Democrat* ad was too busy and that the type size was too small. Realizing that there was not enough money left

in the current budget to enlarge the *Democrat* ad, we pondered other ways to create an attractive, eye-catching ad. Finally we decided to remove the bubble containing the speaker's name and the title of the service, and to enlarge the type size for the remaining text. We retained Rev. Amy's name because she is our full-time, settled minister, regardless of her sabbatical schedule or whether she is speaking on any given Sunday.

Based on visitor statistics for 2002 and 2003 (see note at end of article), we also agreed that any additional money for FY 2004–2005 should be spent on other types of publicity, not on enlarging the *Democrat* ad.

In January 2004 we began placing ads in several local publications read by diverse audiences. (See the new UUCT ads in Kaleidoscope, the Apalachee Tortoise, and the Center for Participant Education Catalog.) We also started publishing notices of special events in the Democrat's Religion Briefs and religion calendar. In early February we revised one of the questions in the visitors' log to identify the publications in which visitors learn about UUCT. The data we collect this year should tell us whether our additional advertising is bringing us new visitors.

The Program and Membership committees believe these were

equitable choices, given the visitor statistics and the budget money available. The weekly *Democrat* ad, now very noticeable (and readable), still provides the church's Web site and phone number. Anyone who wants to know the topic and speaker for a particular Sunday service can either go to our Web site or call the church office. (Check out our new Web page, redesigned and updated by our Webmaster, Jack Martin, at <a href="http://www.nettally.com/uuct/">http://www.nettally.com/uuct/</a>.)

We appreciate your comments on our publicity efforts. Please take a look at the new ads and tell us how you like them, and give us your creative ideas for publicizing UUCT activities.

Note on visitor statistics: Since December 2002, comments compiled from the visitor logs have helped us determine how visitors learn about UUCT. Our statistics reveal that in 2002 and 2003 only 4 percent of all visitors came to UUCT because they read the *Democrat* ad. Most people (30.6 percent) heard about the church from their friends. The first contact for another large group (22.5 percent) was our Web site. Other respondents said they learned of UUCT by word of mouth (about 12.2 percent), called the church (4 percent), or found us by other means (about 26.5 percent).

I may be looking for certain information and then find myself way off course finding so much interesting and informative "stuff", that I will have forgotten my original quest (maybe that's a symptom of my years on the planet).

As a result of visiting one of our Florida congregations and hopefully sparking an interest in becoming actively involved in social justice in their community, I researched social justice through <a href="https://www.uua.org">www.uua.org</a> for additional areas of concern. Seven were listed, and all had a wealth of information, plus words asking what the reader thinks and listing the email address at which questions may be sent: <a href="https://www.socialjustice@uua.org">www.socialjustice@uua.org</a>.

One important issue is Accessibility. Persons with disabilities are members of America's largest minority, cutting across racial, ethnic, religious, economic, and social lines. The UUA

committed itself to the removal of all barriers that prevent the full participation of persons with disabilities in the life of our Association. The UUA Board of Trustees appointed an Accessibilities Committee to provide planning, implementation, and support to our congregations because so many have yet to remove the barriers that keep persons with disabilities away from our religious communities. Our faith requires us to begin or continue the task of removing both the physical and attitudinal barriers to those persons in our congregations who have disabilities. I hope your congregation is working toward or has completed this task.

I offer a few suggestions to assist congregations in this endeavor. Before becoming an "accessible congregation", an audit must be conducted to determine the architectural, attitudinal, and communications barriers currently existing in your congregation. Once the physical barriers have been removed, it becomes time to make certain the Sunday service and all other activities are "user friendly". This should include

the use of an amplified sound system, provision of assistive listening devices, and large print orders-of-service, hymns, and readings. There should be a list of volunteers willing to provide transportation to and from meetings, service, and other congregational services. Ushers and greeters need training in the etiquette of welcoming persons with different types of disabilities.

The UUA website on social justice offers many more suggestions for becoming a more welcoming congregation to persons with disabilities. You know I enjoy and expect to hear from you so "keep those cards and letters coming".
