Minister's Message: In the Interim

This is the time of the year when our congregation has the annual canvass and you will be given an opportunity to make a financial pledge to this congregation for the coming year. I am comfortable with this situation because I am not going to ask any of you for a financial contribution. Is this because I am leaving and will not be here for the next year? No, it is not. It is just that it is my general policy to not get involved in this activity.

However, after being her for almost 6 months and getting to know you as a congregation, I want you to know that I am pleased with your many fine attributes that I have observed while being among you. And, there are some things that I would like to ask of each member and friend of this church family as we plan for a new year and for exciting developments. You are going to have a new interim next year and a new settled minister the following year, and I feel it is time to request some important and special things of you.

I want to ask you for a renewed involvement, rededicating your talent, your time and your commitment. As much as at any time in its history, your church needs your talent(s) to help it grow in many ways. By each person

rededicating his or her talents, we will assist each other in developing the finest congregation possible in this city and will all grow spiritually, intellectually and emotionally.

Yes, I know that we are busy people and we have many activities in which we participate with our church family. However, some of the time a small group is left to do much of the work. If every member would dedicate a little more time, think of the exciting things that we could accomplish, and by spreading out the responsibilities, we would, each of us, grown in the Unitarian Universalist spirit.

The third thing that I would ask is an overall commitment to the life and work of UUCT. This means commitment to programs, both internal and external. What I am suggesting is a passionate involvement in the life of your church family. Claim it as your own and make it transformational in your life and the community of Tallahassee.

We have approximately 175 church members and around 50 who are listed as friends of the church. That gives us an active group of about 225 people. If you do these three things, the financial commitment will be there. You will give what it takes to enhance the growth and development of this congregation.

If I had asked you for money, which I haven't, and each of you sent the church a yearly contribution of \$20,000.00 we would have a sizable bank account. But if you did not give of your time and talents and make the commitment of yourself, and you just stayed at home, we would have plenty of cash but no church family, no congregation, no community of Unitarian Universalists.

By rededicating your time, talents and commitment, there is no doubt that you will want to contribute financially to your church, and it is your privilege to do that; it just follows. So, I leave the decision to you and will let each of you decide the level of your involvement in our congregation and the congregation in your individual lives. To give is to nourish your church, and to nourish your church is to nourish yourself.

I have great respect for you and ask much of you because I care for you and want you to be all that you wish to be, all that your hearts desire. And, I wish you well in your pledge drive. Somehow, I have a feeling that it will be outstanding because you are outstanding.

Settled Minister Search Process to Gear Up in March

By the Settled Minister Search Committee

Following election of four additional members of the Settled Minister Search Committee (SMSC) at the congregational meeting on February 26, the full committee will have a busy first month preparing itself for the work ahead. The committee's first task will be to confer with a UUA Ministerial Settlement Representative (MSR) early in March. The Reverend Katy Korb, of Naples, should be ready to assume her new position as MSR for the Florida District by that time, so our SMSC will work with her for the duration of the search. Our thanks to Rhonda Thomason, MSR of the Mid-South District, for her help getting UUCT started on the search process.

The Search Committee's next task is to conduct a retreat focused on team building. Florida District Executive Mary Higgins has offered to help the committee design a retreat that will be most appropriate to our needs. Mary, or a facilitator engaged by the Florida District, will most likely staff the retreat for the SMSC.

Following the retreat, the SMSC will select a chair, lay out its agenda of tasks to be accomplished, and allocate responsibilities for those tasks. The primary focus of the next several months (approximately April through June) will be on what the UUA's Settlement Handbook refers to as the self-study phase – gathering input from the congregation as background for preparing the Congregational Record that describes who we are and what we hope for in a settled minister.

In the meantime, the Committee on Ministry (COM), at the direction of the Executive Board, will be developing a proposed compensation package for the settled minister, which will be presented to the congregation for formal approval at the Annual Meeting. The COM also will be reviewing content of our By Laws and former Covenant Working Agreement with Reverend Amy McKenzie to suggest appropriate revisions concerning the procedure by which the congregation calls a minister, how the congregation conducts regular evaluations of the

church's ministry, and the procedures that govern termination of ministry.

Recommended By Laws revisions will be presented to the congregation for action at the Annual Meeting. Recommendations concerning the Covenant and Working Agreement will be provided to a Negotiating Team which is to be convened by the Executive Board in June. The Negotiating Team will take the lead on developing the formal draft ministry agreement to be included in the Information Packet prepared by the SMSC. The Negotiating Team will subsequently have responsibility for negotiating the final ministry agreement and compensation package with the candidate selected by the SMSC.

In addition to sharing valuable information regarding compensation and benefits, Joan wrote: "Interesting factoid if you want to increase membership - Recent studies indicate the following as characteristics of successful and growing churches, in order of importance: 1) a charismatic leader, 2) a clear, straightforward message, 3) nice facilities, 4) a sincere and warm sense of belonging, 5) high expectations (members are expected to demonstrate their commitment to both the message and the institution by giving of time and money), and 6) many opportunities to participate in small-group activities: shared ministry, social activities, study groups, etc."

December & January Board Actions

December Board Actions:

1. Approved the Personnel Committee's recommendation for a new Staff Personnel Manual policy on the provision of health insurance benefits to part-time staff, to take effect July 1, 2006. The recommendation was summarized as follows: "In brief, we are proposing to cover all nonministerial staff working 16 hours (40% time) or more a week at the proportion of a 40-hour work week they work, with a limit on how much we'd pay for a group policy or reimburse for a private policy. The limit is the 100% amount we will pay for the Office Administrator's health insurance policy next year, \$3,600. The allocated money would only be available for health insurance reimbursement, although we are recommending further exploration and discussion of possibly reimbursing doctor and prescription medicine costs up to the allocated

reimbursement amount, if the employee can not pick up the remaining cost of health insurance and therefore can not purchase it. We feel this would be the fairest thing to do. but it needs to be workable for our Finance people, and we also are not sure about the tax ins and outs."

The Board took note that the employees need to understand that reimbursement for health insurance expenses may have some tax implications for them.

2. Approved providing health insurance for Music Director Helen Falb this fiscal year beginning in January or February. The music director works 42.5 % of a 40-hour work week, so 42.5% of her total private policy health insurance costs of \$350 per month will be reimbursed by UUCT (\$149 per month). The money will first come from the music director's professional fund expenses, then from

the piano fund if there are no prohibitions regarding that.

3. Approved providing a neutral pulpit to a nearby UU church to observe a settled minister candidate one Sunday. with that church reciprocating by giving us one when we need it next year.

January Board Actions:

- 1. Approved the 11/28/05 minutes.
- 2. Authorized the payment of the \$285.00 registration fee for the Conference for Midsize Congregations to be attended by Isabel Sheridan in early March.
- 3. Approved an amendment stating that the above registration fee would be paid from leadership school funds and that Isabel would submit a written report to the Board upon her return.

February Congregational Actions

At our 2/26/06 congregational meeting, 52 qualified members were present. Items required a guorum of 25% of 176 Committee to serve on the Settled qualified members (44 voters) and a simple majority. The congregation took the following actions:

- 1. Approved the minutes of the 10/16/05 congregational meeting. (Unanimous)
- 2. Approved the Asking Budget for Fiscal Year 2006-2007, as recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Board. (Approved - 50, Opposed - 1, Abstained - 1)
- 3. Approved the expenditure of \$8,000 from the reserve fund to replace and upgrade the heating/cooling system for the sanctuary. (Approved - 50, Opposed - 0, Abstained - 2)

4. Elected the four at-large members proposed by the Nominating Minister Search Committee: Annette Pearce, Christopher Ellrich, Sara Reece, and Hollie Lloyd, (Approved -49, Opposed - 1, Abstained - 2)

Note: This completes the committee; they will serve along with the boardappointed members: Bruce Brandt, Bob Deyle and Mimi Jones.

5. Voted to support the UUCT Global Climate Change Action Group's recommended changes to the draft **UUA Statement of Conscience on** Global Warming and to encourage **UUCT's General Assembly** representatives to lobby for passage of the edited document. (Approved - 47, Opposed - 0, Abstained - 5)

Prior to voting on the global warming statement, an amendment was proposed to strike the following wording from lines 197 and 198: "and fourth generation nuclear plants with recycled fuel." The amendment failed. (Approved - 10, Opposed - 38, Abstained - 4)

Note: The full wording of the bullet in question under "We commit to proposing these Advocacy Goals" was as follows: "Shift of federal subsidies for fossil fuel industries to renewable technologies, and in the transition, funding for research and development of renewable energy technologies, and fourth generation nuclear plants with recycled fuel." (Lines 196 – 198)

Florida District & National News

Changing of the Guard

FL District Executive Mary Chulak Higgins will be leaving the position this summer. She has been invited to be the DE of the New Hampshire/Vermont and Northeast Districts as they move toward consolidation. The district board will announce plans for the interim time and for the search for replacing Mary as soon as they have completed them.

Acting Program Consultant

Connie Goodbread, who has done or participated in at least three workshops at UUCT, has been hired by the FL District as acting program consultant through June, 2006. The quarter-time position has been vacant since the departure of Laurel Amabile for a full-time position with the UUA; Laurel also filled the same position part-time for the Mid-South District.

The focus of the program consultant has been to support and deepen our relationships with youth and young adults, and also support the professional religious educators in the district so that they are better able to serve the education needs of their congregations. Rather than providing direct service to congregations with the limited hours funded, Connie will train others to do so and supervise their work.

In her introduction to the district, Connie wrote: "I will enjoy working with you to achieve the vision that includes wonderful, varied, innovative programs for youth. These programs should help congregations to build dynamic youth programs that enhance the faith communities and support youth as they grow and become our leaders.....I would like to support our new DREs with a new DRE workshop and our long-time RE professionals with the support they need to go deeper into their calling."

During the time Connie is in the position, the UUA and the Mid-South and Florida Districts will be envisioning the continuation of the joint funding of a program consultant to serve the Southeast.

March's message from FL District Trustee Joan Lund is posted on the bulletin board at the back of the sanctuary; you may also contact Meridian editor Trudy Devle for a copy (gdeyle@juno.com). The topic is the **UUA Office for Congregational** Advocacy and Witness (OCAW). This office assists UU congregations and organizations in developing their capacity and effectiveness for social iustice work and involves them in state. national, and international coalitions on these issues. Among other duties, OCAW manages the "Social Justice Empowerment Workshops," which bring together at least 20% of a church's membership along with clergy and help accurately assess capacity in terms of size and other factors, and also identify the "passion" in a congregation. The office is piloting a follow-up consultation to congregations that have sponsored these workshops.
