

## Minister's Message

#### **Year-end Review**

The Committee on the Ministry and I have talked about my goals for the year, and what I've done to fulfill them. The three goals were – 1. Launch "pastoral associates program"; 2. Continue to support UUCT's vision of growth in: a) physical plant, b) number of members, and c) spiritual maturity; 3. Recognition for UUCT for social justice actions in Tallahassee. I'll keep these goals for next year, too. Though I completed a number of the strategies that went with the goals, the goals are bigger than one year. Timing counts when setting goals, and even I am surprised at the slow rate of change of institutions!

The first and third goals depend on other institutions as well as our own. Much of the "pastoral associates program" training will come from Hospice (the UUCT Board wrote a letter of support for a grant that Hospice received for a Faith In Action Training staff position, which has now been filled). And I'm convinced that our local social justice actions will be strengthened by our participation in TEAM, Tallahassee Equality Action Ministry, the grassroots, multicultural,

interfaith group I helped form. The issues we take on will be defined by the entire membership – Tallahassee area religious communities – though one-on-one discussions are crucial to the organization's success. TEAM has now hired an Organizer, and we're moving toward the opening Covenant Assembly. But before then, UUCT will have a Listening Team to help deepen relationships in our congregation and to learn which social justice issues upset and motivate our members.

#### "The End"

I met another goal: I (finally) got to the last page of Herman Melville's Moby-Dick, only 5 months after I vowed to complete the novel. What an accomplishment! Speaking of which: Congratulation to the UUCT youth who are graduating this year; I and we will miss you. Take what you have learned and what you have begun to teach and share it with the world, or at least speak out at the campuses where you'll continue to grow a soul. Come back and say "Hi!" We bestow upon vou during this time of transition Many Blessings and we are grateful for your presence here among us.

### **Here Through Joys and Sorrows**

This congregation has much to celebrate in the results from the canvass to fund next year's programs and activities (and utilities). UUCT is a community effort. It's hard to unlearn the societal lesson that money makes the man or woman. When you're at UUCT, let it go. This church is here for you: to offer you solace, spiritual enrichment, service opportunities and social justice work. But most of all, you're a part of a community that welcomes you when you're here, misses you when you're not, and accepts whatever gifts of time, talent and treasure you are able to offer. "You are welcome in this religious home..."

### Green Corner

### A Review of Actions We Can Take

May 20, 2002 will mark a year since we decided as a congregation to apply for candidacy as a Green Sanctuary (GS) church. One of the actions we've taken as a GS candidate working toward certification is to include a *Green Corner* column in each month's *Meridian*. Highlights from these columns over the past eleven months follow. They suggest actions we can take to live greener lives and reduce our ecological footprints.

Centering Our Thoughts & Crystallizing Our Resolve. Five things you can do to bring silence and solitude into daily life: Turn off the phone, Walk in the park, Go on a media fast, Take a hot bath, Find the quietest time and place you know. (June 2001)

Measuring Your Ecological Footprint. Go to the Redefining Progress web-site to find two ways to calculate your footprint (www.rprogress.org/progsum/nip/ef/ef\_ main.html). (July 2001)

Hot Water Heaters (which can be responsible for 16-25% of home energy use). When buying a new one, consider gas, oil or propane-fired and a size that holds just enough water for your peak times. Bundle your water heater in an insulating jacket, unless the manufacturer says not to. Set the thermostat at 120 degrees. When going on vacation, turn the thermostat off or to the lowest setting. Insulate hot water pipes and the first three feet of cold-water pipe connected to the water heater. (August 2001)

Let's Talk Cars. Inflate tires to proper level. Switch to low-rolling-resistance tires. Keep your car tuned. Go easy on the AC at speeds below 40 mph. Travel light. Carpool. Combine errands and car trips. Use your bike or feet instead! Compare fuel economy and air emissions when shopping for a car.

Re-cycle by buying a used car instead of a new one. (September 2001)

Note: The October 2001 *Green Corner* column reported on our congregation's progress in implementing the seventeen required GS action items.

Choosing Refrigerators. Look for an "Energy Star" label to identify more energy-efficient models. Freezer on top models are more efficient, with the most efficient models being in the 16-20 cubic feet range. Automatic icemakers and water/ice dispensers on the outside consume more energy. (November 2001)

Decreasing Refrigerator Energy Use. Clean coils. Check seals. Adjust temperature. Make sure there is at least 1" of space to sides of refrigerator and 4-6" in back. Minimize the amount of time the door is open by keeping items in the same place, keeping those you use frequently in front, and labeling items in the freezer. Cool (no more than 30 minutes) and cover foods before putting them in. Freezers work more efficiently when fuller versus nearly empty. (December 2001)

**Food Consumption.** Buy fresh, local produce and products as often as possible. Avoid heavily packaged products. Buy organic foods as much as possible. Eat less meat. (January 2002)

Natural Landscaping. Landscape to minimize mowing, watering and fertilizing needs. Enrich soil by adding compost. For extra nutrients, use organic fertilizers. Control weeds, and improve soil even more, with organic mulches. To reduce pests, cultivate plants that attract beneficial insects. Keep your mower in good repair. Get rid of gasoline-powered yard tools all together, replacing them with electric or manual ones. (February 2002)

Reducing Pesticides. Get tough turf. Mow right. Water deeply. Know your enemies. Go lightly. Use biological warfare. Pick your chemical pesticides carefully. Follow directions. (March 2002)

Cleaning House. All-purpose cleaner: a few tablespoons of baking soda in a quart of warm water, or vinegar and salt mixed with warm water. Scouring cleaner: plain salt or baking soda. Disinfectant scourer: equal amounts of baking soda and borax with a little hot water. Drain Cleaner: ½ cup baking soda, followed by ½ cup vinegar, followed by ½ gallon boiling water 15-20 minutes later. Toilet bowl cleaner: ½ cup vinegar and baking soda, or 2/3 cup borax and 1/3 cup lemon juice. Glass cleaner: club soda or warm water with a little vinegar. Furniture polish: olive oil mixed with a little lemon juice. Floor cleaner: equal parts vinegar and warm water for light jobs, vegetable-based liquid soap for tougher jobs. Air freshner: set out bowls with a little vinegar, boil cinnamon and cloves, open windows. (April 2002)

## Facilities Update

**Site Work.** The drainage easement agreement with our neighbors to the north, Sheila and David Hutcheson, has been signed and recorded. Thanks to the Hutchesons for granting us the easement! (They did receive some compensation for it.) Our environmental permit has been granted, so we have the go-ahead to proceed with site work. Our construction manager, Curtis Whigham at Mad Dog Design and Construction, is now working out the Our plan is to have new carpet put final details to enable site work to begin. Thanks to the efforts of our civil engineers, the markings on newly paved Meridian Rd. were repainted to give us a turn lane into the church driveway, as had been requested prior to the re-paving.

Landscape Sub-Committee. The newly formed Landscaping Sub-Committee of the Buildings and Grounds Committee has been reviewing the landscaping portion of the site work plans and the current landscaped and natural areas on our property. Primary goals will be to use native plants for any new landscaping and to gradually weed out the exotics, such as nandina and ardesia, from the property, A big thanks to new member Cathy Briggs for contributing her landscape architect knowledge and skills to the effort. The Sub-Committee also met with Curtis Whigham to review plans for protecting trees during site work and building construction and felt satisfied with the measures to be taken.

Building Permit. Our architects are responding to minor points raised by the City in reviewing our detailed building plans and construction documents prior to issuing a building permit. We anticipate receiving the permit this month.

#### Sanctuary Improvements.

Meanwhile the Capital Improvement Committee (CIC) is continuing to make plans for interim sanctuary improvements. Thanks to Tom Chase for constructing a ramp and four moveable stage sections that will give us flexibility in stage size for different occasions. On Sundays, we will normally use two sections for a stage, with the choir sitting on the other two sections. down this summer, once we work out how to handle the sound system without a permanent stage. The ramp and stage sections will also be carpeted. Once we've set the timetable for re-carpeting, we will order the new chairs. Church Chair Industries will let us order, at the current price, the number of chairs we will eventually need when the sanctuary is enlarged in a later phase, but we can postpone the manufacture and delivery of a portion of the chairs until a number of years later.
