Minister's Message

Like many of you, I met a spiritual ancestor in High School, but it took years to acknowledge him. Ralph Waldo Emerson was an ordained Unitarian minister and parish preacher before his famous career as a poet, lecturer and Transcendentalist (he preferred the term, Idealist). Emerson was born on May 25, 1803, which makes this year the bicentennial of his birth.

In those 200 years, he's been reviled, respected, and rediscovered by teens in English class and then adults who study our religious history and find him lurking in the background; a reluctant pastor who staged a dramatic resignation. Or he is listed among the "prophets" of liberal religion especially for his Divinity School Address in 1838. We also recognize his speeches against slavery.

The Bicentennial Committee of the Unitarian Universalist Committee asserts that our understanding of Emerson has expanded over the last generation.

The earlier image of Emerson as an isolated and self-sufficient figure has also been undercut in recent years by study of his social relationships, his antislavery activity, and his mature, ethical thought. His optimism is understood as the fruit of a long and hard personal struggle. Appreciated in context, Emerson's self-reliance is the ability, in higher moments of faith, to affirm all creation even while coming to terms with manifest evil.

So he wasn't "flaky" or naïve. Just wise!

One of the sources of our living tradition is direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces that create and uphold life. Emerson named the "other" of this experience: God, the One Mind, the infinite Absolute, Infinite Being, the Highest Law, the ground of being, "dread universal essence," the "vast flowing vigor," "The Over-Soul."

Direct experience of this "eternal consciousness" ought to bring about a spiritual revolution—rejecting the God above, beyond, separate and distant and revealing the God within, immanent, pervasive and experienced in our consciousness. Emerson's ideas about a higher reality were grounded in humility, but through nature and humanity (not the supernatural). After his resignation, the church he served sang his words at the ordination of his successor. The third verse of We Love the Venerable House (Our Fathers Built to God...from 1833) goes

And anxious hearts have ponder'd here


The mystery of life,

And pray'd th'Eternal Light to clear

Their doubts, and aid their strife.

It's evident that Emerson was one of the "anxious hearts" he wrote about. Though he left parish ministry, he never really stopped pondering or preaching (even in his essays)! He died in his sleep in Concord, Massachusetts on April 27, 1882. He was 79. And so, Mr. Emerson, my spiritual ancestor: Happy 200th Birthday.

Green Corner

Be Cool and Bright at the Same Time By Ed Oaksford

I don't know but are compact fluorescent light bulbs cool or what? You can actually touch them without burning your hand off like you would with an incandescent bulb. What makes compact fluorescent lights (CFL's) such a bright idea is that the energy used to power them produces light much more efficiently without the waste heat byproduct produced by incandescent light bulbs.

A typical incandescent light bulb converts about 10 percent of the electricity used to light and 90 percent to heat. When lighting accounts for about 20% of all electricity use in the country and about 15% of electricity use in our homes as it currently does, that can mean a lot of wasted energy.

ENERGY STAR qualified CFL's use 66% less energy than a standard incandescent bulb, last up to 10 times longer and operate at temperatures less than 100 degrees Fahrenheit. Replacing a 100-watt incandescent with a 23-watt CFL, that produces the same amount of light, can save you at least \$20 in energy and bulb costs over the life of the bulb.

Where electricity is produced from coal -- and most is -- each CFL will cut carbon dioxide emissions by about 1,300 pounds over its lifetime. benefits are enormous. If every household replaced its most commonly used incandescent light bulbs with CFL's, electricity use for lighting could be cut in half. Doing so would lower our annual carbon dioxide emissions by about 125 billion pounds. This action alone could halt the growth in carbon dioxide emissions from the U.S., given recent growth rates.

The electricity savings and longer life of CFLs more than justify their seemingly high cost. Put in terms of dollars and "sense", investing in a CFL provides a risk-free "return" of 25-40% a year, and with the cost of CFL's coming down, the returns are getting better. Not bad, compared to investing in passbook savings, a money market account, or even the volatile stock market. So by installing CFLs in their most commonly used fixtures, consumers will do well for the environment and their pocketbooks. If more households did this, we could take an important step towards protection from global warming.

It's A Fact

⇒ If every household in the U.S. replaced just one bulb or fixture with an Energy Star qualified model, we could save more than 8 billion kWh -- equivalent to removing 1 million cars per year! All fluorescent lights contain small amounts of mercury, and some compact fluorescent lamps with magnetic ballasts contain small amounts of short-lived radioactive material. Because of these hazardous materials, you should not toss burned-out lamps into the trash. Find out if there is a recycling program for them in your community-they are becoming more common-or dispose of them with other household hazardous wastes such as batteries, solvents, and paints at your community's designated dropoff point or during a designated day when you can put such materials with your curbside trash pickup.

Facilities Update

COMPLETION DATE. We are getting close to the end of construction and site work! Our new completion date is June 1. This will give us plenty of time to get settled in our new quarters over the summer. The CIC has developed a space usage plan for the current and new classrooms with the input of other committees, particularly the Youth RE Committee. The plan will be sent to the Board soon for final approval.

SITE WORK. Those present on Sundays in late April saw much evidence of drainage work and driveway and parking lot grading from week to week. The new, large mound of earth that runs along the north-side of our property opposite the sanctuary and current classrooms is a berm that will direct water draining from the driveway back to our water retention facility, keeping it from draining onto our north-side neighbor's property, as it has in the past. The berm will be shaped a little more and then planted

Personnel Committee Update

The UUCT Personnel Committee (Jennifer Carver, Trudy Deyle, Pauline Masterton and Margaret Moonev) has been working steadily to develop personnel policies and procedures that will: enhance the professionalism of our staff, lead to good stewardship of the church's resources, and support our mission and vision as a congregation. The Personnel Committee handles personnel issues for all staff except the minister, whose personnel issues are handled by the Committee on Ministry, and the custodian, which is a non-staff position filled on a contract basis.

One of the Personnel Committee's goals is to initiate an annual staff review process, beginning at the end of this fiscal year. Our vision for this annual process is that it be a tool for dialogue and reaching a mutual understanding between staff member and supervisory team about with sod to immediately hold it in place against erosion. We anticipate that another form of vegetation may need to be added as the permanent planting in this mostly shaded area.

You may have wondered about the large, U-shaped pipe near the street. This is a back-flow prevention valve for the City-required fire hydrant on our property. It prevents water going to the hydrant from flowing back into the City water supply. The pipe and valve will need to be protected during severe freezes, such as we had this winter. When funds are available, we may want to purchase an insulated "hotbox" to permanently keep over the pipe and valve.

LANDSCAPING SUB-COMMITTEE.

Elinor Elfner has volunteered to head up a Landscaping Sub-Committee that will hold its first meeting Sunday, May 11. (See *May UUCT Events.*) Planning will begin on how to restore as much of our natural look as is possible, with

responsibilities, expectations and specific goals for the coming year. (In the staff position descriptions finalized last year, each staff member has a designated supervisory team. These teams are listed below.)

In many ways, the Personnel Committee is using Rev. Amy's relationships with the Board and Committee on Ministry as examples of efficient and effective relationships between staff member and programmatic committee or supervisory team. While we envision that employees and supervisory teams will always work together in a collegial manner, we also want to see the supervisory teams become more active in giving on-going feedback and input regarding the fulfillment of duties. We see them as having multiple functions and as being consulted often -- as being more than just a resource, advocate or liaison to the Board.
