When are you most at home in your skin, with your thoughts, with your feelings? (Who are you with? What are you doing?)

I'm sure you can relate, though these are my questions for this time of life (late 30s) and this point in my vocation (10 years since ordination; currently on sabbatical). Whatever stage of life, we mature when we can integrate new information and experiences with an ongoing sense of self.

Over the years at UUCT, I've been a witness to changes in your health, job status, family makeup, volunteer position, spiritual focus, self-awareness, or level of commitment. I've changed in those areas too.

During the summer session of sabbatical I'll seek more insight into what it means to be a middle-class white lesbian minister--important identity factors for me. The first stop is Birmingham, AL for an Indigo Girls concert ('Love Them!) on the way to Colorado Springs and a seminar: *Renewing Your Ministry, Balancing Your Life* to 'identify the strengths and liabilities you bring to your ministry' and gain 'a clearer sense of yourself both professionally and personally.'

What they call liabilities I've heard called weaknesses or growing edges. At least "liabilities" implies assets in the 'incoming' column.

The weaknesses that bleed away the life source are countered by strengths that replenish it. Balancing your life, indeed.

As I embark on this learning adventure, I know you are in good hands--each others!--and in the gentle nudging grasp of the spirit of life.

Over the next four months we may run into each other; I'd like a smile and

handshake or hug, and then a bit of small talk. Starting again in September, we'll engage in deep conversations together!

## President's Message

The political season is upon us, and it is good to note members, friends, and visitors alike taking an active interest in issues which concern them. The fifth of our seven principles is "The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large," so activism is encouraged. I must, however, ask everyone to help us adhere to the law regarding prohibitions on political activity by churches. Here are some pointers the UUA shares with all congregations:

There is a total limit on partisan political activity. Congregations and their representatives can do nothing that advocates for or against candidates for public office or political parties.

This includes fundraising on behalf of candidates and donating meeting space, among other things. Election-related activities such as candidate questionnaires and forums are acceptable so long as all major candidates are invited to participate and they cover a broad range of issues.

## DO NOT ...Engage in Partisan Activities

• Do not endorse or oppose candidates for public office as a congregation. Religious groups may not advise members of the congregation or the public at large, directly or indirectly, to vote for or against specific candidates or political parties.

- Do not make financial contributions to candidates. Religious groups may not collect money on behalf of or provide in-kind services to a candidate. This includes creating a political action committee.
- Do not distribute or display partisan campaign literature or voter guides.

Naturally, these comments refer only to our Church facilities, members acting in an official Church capacity, and Church organs. So support the causes you find meaningful. Please just do not do it on our property or through any of our official groups or instruments.

### UUA Trustee Tidbits

By Joan Lund, FL District Trustee I am so enthused about General Assembly in Long Beach this year that I hope what I write may convince you to join thousands of UUs in the California sun at the end of June for what promises to be an outstanding time together. Sometimes I am asked, "What is GA?" It's a pep rally, an opportunity for leadership training, a gathering for our "family", a public witness event, and so much more. GA, as directed by our by-laws, makes overall policy for carrying out the purposes of our Association, and directs and controls Association affairs.

Although GA is supposed to be the coming together of congregation representatives to do the business of the Association, often delegates tend to be UUs who have the time and money to devote almost a week to this assembly. Some congregations are able to offer varying amounts of financial assistance for delegates, but I don't think any congregation makes it possible for their officers to attend, and it is important that congregational leaders are present at our Association's annual meeting.

The UUA Board of Trustees and the General Assembly Planning
Committee understand the importance of having elected congregational leaders present at our Association business meeting and are therefore offering to reimburse GA registration to the president or president-elect of each UUA congregation. Even though registration is a small part of the total cost of attending GA, hopefully covering this fee will help. It is important for the leaders of our congregations to be part of planning our UUA future.



## TAPP (Think About Personal Pollution) Campaign

Do you and your Neighborhood Association want to help to make our lakes, springs and aquifer cleaner? Do you want to help solve stormwater runoff problems in your yard, your neighborhood? This is another program about taking personal responsibility, like our Food for thought and Action and 1-2-3 Global Warming initiatives.

The **TAPP** (Think **A**bout **P**ersonal **P**ollution) Campaign is a project of our local Ochlockonee River Soil and Water Conservation District funded by a grant from the U.S. EPA through the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.

The goal of the TAPP campaign is to improve the water quality of our lakes, springs and aquifer through individuals' efforts – one yard and one landscape at a time. The objective is to **slow the flow** of water from our yards and to reduce fertilizer and pesticide use. In addition to this outreach effort, a media campaign began April 7 and includes a website with lots of helpful resource materials.

Neighborhoods, civic and environmental associations, landscape designers and commercial nurseries will be contacted. With the slogan, TAPP, we're reminded to Think About Personal Pollution. We want to encourage people to realize their part in the problems with water quality and then take action by changing one or two small things they do in their daily lives, particularly in their yards, by incorporating water resource friendly practices like mulching, using less fertilizer and pesticides, and perhaps planting a rain garden.



**TAPP** will offer educational materials and a yard certification program that builds upon but is different from the Florida Yards and Neighborhoods Program. The website has lots of useful information, <a href="www.tappwater.org">www.tappwater.org</a>. We will set up workshops to implement this program.

I have recommended to the Building and Grounds Committee that we adopt Best Management Practices for the UUCT Landscape. We will discuss the specifics at the next meeting. If you would like to have more info about these yard practices send me an email (surse2@earthlink.net).

subscribe@yahoogroups.com. As a member of the Network, you can connect with other local people who want to exchange, trade, borrow, or lend any of the following:

- Labor ("I'll work in your garden on Tuesday and you can help me in mine on Friday.")
- Information ("I just learned this great way to control garden pests naturally...")
- Equipment ("Sure you can use my chainsaw. Can I borrow your rototiller?")
- Plants and seeds ("I've got too many cantaloupe seedlings; can I trade you for some of your carrot seeds?")
- Food ("I'll trade you some of my tomatoes for some of your blueberries.")
- Inspiration, ideas and vision ("Anybody got any ideas about how I can turn my backyard into the Garden of Eden?")

The goal of this group is to build a community of cooperation and support around producing healthy local food for people in a way that is good for the environment, too. They look forward to your participation.

## Helen Falb and UUCT's Ministry of Music

Making music - not talking about it - is Helen Falb's great passion and love. In her first year (1989) with us, she was our new, paid pianist, succeeding Geoffrey Bays. In 1990, Helen became UUCT's first Music Director, bringing a high level of energy, talent, and professionalism to her job - performing an ever-growing, more diverse and new repertoire of classic, sacred, folk, and popular piano and choral works, in addition to the classic UU hymns, to fit each service and occasion. She is always introducing young, new musical talent of Tallahassee and FSU's music school, to perform with her during Sunday services.

Soon after arriving, spurred on by enthusiastic, musically-talented singers in our midst, Helen created the O.K. Chorale - a choir of a dozen or so singers who meet twice weekly (Wednesday nights and Sunday mornings before the service) to rehearse Sunday music. For all of us, Helen has introduced a great many of the little-known hymns in our 1993 "Singing the Living Tradition" UU hymnal. She keeps us well-grounded in old favorites like "Gather the Spirit" and "Spirit of Life," and with her encouragement we have come to sing 2- and 3-part rounds with magical harmonies. Ours is an experience of ever being re-born, musically (in our ears and voices), unfolding our hidden "musical spirituality" as a UU community.

And as if Helen were not already busy enough at her two responsibilities (Music Director and Sunday pianist) at UUCT, she also teaches piano privately at her home studio on nearby Starmount, accompanies stellar musicians for their degree recitals at FSU's Opperman Music Hall, and

serves as piano accompanist for *Voces Angelorem*. She also plays and sings with the Temple Israel Preschool three mornings a week (her "5th" job), making her life an ever-busy whirlwind of joyous music-making all about town.

We are all, in our own way, moved by Helen's presence at UUCT the last 15 years, by her sense of musicality and a balance she finds between music and other forms of expression in our worship together - and by her sense of finding the holy and sacred in all music. Who is her favorite composer? Johannes Brahms, she has long said, followed by Samuel Barber. What is her favorite UU hymn now? Hymn #347 - Jim Scott's "Gather the Spirit." (She also loves jazz with a growing interest. And you may have caught her and husband and guitarist Marty's rock'n'roll songs on special occasions!)

Through Helen's dedication and cause at UUCT, we have all learned the value of "gathering our spirits" on Sunday mornings, and beyond. Thank you, Helen, for sharing your inspiration, talent and joy of music-making with us all. May we ever keep finding ourselves coming to a church filled with meaningful music chosen by Helen – and keep on singing as a people for the joy of it!
