Minister's Message: In the Interim

A few weeks back in a sermon I made a joke about not being able to preach about the war in Iraq. My hope is that all understood it was an effort at levity in the midst of a sermon. If the time comes when I need to make a statement, it will be done, and I will not be shy about my feelings or what I feel to be the needs of our country. It is a part of the UU tradition that the minister have freedom of the pulpit, and it is a tradition that must be maintained. I assure you that I will do that. We must feel free, though maybe not always comfortable, to preach sermons speaking to the human need and to the needs of a particular issue.

One of my frequent thoughts is about the moral environment in which we live, and as in the past, I ask you to answer for yourself how you can cast the moral landscape in which we humans live. We live in a big, busy, and often times dangerous world, and though we are a small group and you are only one person, it is important that we speak against abuse,

discrimination, global warming and other social and political issues. Only by doing this can we seek to influence the moral landscape in which we exist.

However, it is not only to social issues that we speak but also to the moral environment of our congregation. This year I requested of the Committee on Ministry that they work on a Covenant of Right Relations for us. Why, because it is important in every sense that we treat each other with respect, kindness and understanding. Only by doing this will we be able to reach the high goals that we have set for

ourselves. If we do not treat each other with love and respect, our future is questionable; without right relations, we will eventually destroy what so many have worked so hard to build.

So, I ask you to consider the moral landscape in which we live, both within our congregation and within our nation. By so doing we and our world will prosper. Let me share with you again the words of Joseph Campbell:

"People say that what we're all seeking is a meaning for life. I don't think that's what we're really seeking. I think that what we are seeking is an experience of being alive. . .so that we actually feel the rapture of being alive."

Perhaps this is a gift that we can give to each other.

We also earnestly believe that we are a congregation that can attract a skilled and caring minister whose call to ministry will strengthen and nurture our own.

I am blessed to be working with a dedicated and talented group who are committed to honoring the trust placed in us by the UUCT congregation to pursue this opportunity with hard work, optimism, and a promise to do our very best to faithfully represent and serve the interests of our congregation. In May we begin the crucial Self-Study phase that provides much of the input for the *Congregational Record* (CR), which will be studied carefully by min-

isters who are looking for a new settlement. The CR will present a picture of who we are as a congregation, what we hope to be, and what we are looking for in a settled minister. This picture will influence the ministers who respond and the way in which we assess their fit.

To capture and focus a valid picture of UUCT, we need input from as many members and friends as possible. Over the next several months, we will be asking you to provide input in several ways, each of which will provide unique information, all equally important:

- May June: cottage meetings
- May June: strategic interviews with UUCT lay leaders and staff, UUA district staff, and Tallahassee community members
- June July: congregational survey
- Late August: congregational review of draft CR and Information Packet

Our first Self-Study initiative is to conduct a final set of **cottage meetings** to address three questions:

- 1. What is the essence of UUCT today, the glowing coal at its center?
- 2. How do you hope to be able to describe UUCT in five years?
- 3. What skills and qualities does a minister need to help us get there?

As before, these meetings will be groups of six to 12 UUCT members and friends, facilitated by two SMSC members, for a period of two hours. Tentative times and dates follow. Locations will be at the church or in members' homes. Sign-up sheets will be available at the back of the sanctuary starting May 5. If you are interested in

participating, you may also contact Mimi Jones (385-4249; mgjones111@earthlink.net). If you would be willing to host a meeting (provide chairs, drinks, and cookies), please also contact Mimi.

Also, please indicate if childcare is needed. We'll try to offer meetings with childcare for those who need it, and we'll schedule enough meetings total so that everyone who wishes to participate will have an opportunity.

Canvass Campaign Report

The Asking Budget for next year was by far our most ambitious one in recent years, calling for a 15% overall increase in pledging, versus the 5% - 7% increase called for in most recent years. With no growth in membership in the past year, the pledging increase needed had to come from those of us already here who were both able and willing to increase our pledges over last year's amounts.

Last month I was able to report that we had raised \$169,600 in pledges for FY 2006-07, amounting to 76% of the Asking Budget goal of \$223,254. By the April 9 Board meeting, we had

made little progress in obtaining pledges for the remaining 24%. Further, fully ten percent of the membership had failed to submit pledges in spite of follow up actions by the Canvass team.

As a result, the Board called a special congregational meeting on Sunday, April 30 to conduct a supplemental canvass in an attempt to reach the canvass goal and address current congregational priorities. As of May 1, the status of the canvass is:

 Initial pledges received from 116 pledging units totaling \$185,000

- Supplemental pledges received from 18 units totaling \$6,000
- Total pledges received: \$191,000
- Shortfall in terms of goal: \$32,000

During the week of May 1, all UUCT members and supporting friends will receive a mailing or e-mailing about the supplemental canvass. The Board will announce the results at a second congregational meeting on Sunday, May 7, and at that time propose revised congregational priorities for next year based on the total amount that has been pledged by May 6.

Our main goal is to reduce the workload on the kontrollers and other kitchen volunteers. If the experiment is successful, we will continue it for the rest of the year. If you volunteered to bring in food on your gift of self, we will ask you to help with the after-coffee clean-up instead.

Individuals and groups who want to celebrate an event by sharing food with the congregation are still welcome to do so. Please let the kontroller coordinator (Nancy Harvey) or the kitchen kontroller for the month involved know about your plans, so that we do not have more than one group bringing food the same Sunday. The person or group bringing the food is responsible for the food set up and the kitchen cleanup that day. The kitchen kontrollers will continue to prepare the coffee, train clean-up crews on the dishwasher, and oversee use of the kitchen.

Our new dishwasher, while greatly reducing the time spent washing dishes, requires at least one clean-up volunteer who is strong enough to lift trays full of dishes/glasses into and out of the dishwasher. 
We will be suspending Monday meetings for the summer, resuming

UUA Mid-Size Congregations Conference - March 2006

Isabel attended the UUA Mid-Size Congregations Conference in Arizona in March 2006. Her report on the conference follows.

What I noticed:

- 1. The importance of training for a congregation. Most of the 400 -500 participants were there with 3 or 4 other members and staff from their congregations; most groups included the minister and either the RE director or the Music director. And it was clear they had been to other trainings at both the national and district level. I recommend the UU University training by Peter Steinke before GA.
- 2. The importance of understanding transitions in our individual lives and in our

- congregation. This was the theme 5. The importance of using UUA of the keynote address. I plan to offer an adult RE course on personal transitions in the fall. I brought back books on individual and congregational transitions.
- The inclusion of many traditions in worship (true in each service). The use of the new hymnal and the inclusion of non-European instruments, along with a strand of inclusion in every sermon, combined thought with feeling, knowledge with mystery. It met my personal needs in worship.
- The importance of choosing an explicit governance model and an explicit staffing model as appropriate for your size congregation.

- professional trainers to help manage transitions in a congregation. I have a brochure on training options offered by presenters at the conference.
- I have notes on all the workshops I attended, which I would be glad to share with committees and individuals as requested.
- I appreciate the Board and Rev. Murchison's sending me to this conference; it helped me in my personal transitions and gave me many ideas for how the congregation might manage its transitions now and in the future.
