MINISTER'S MESSAGE

By Rev. Amy McKenzie

From you I receive, to you I give, together we share, and from this we live. These simple words from our hymnal describe what goes into the kind of complex human relationships we cherish. "Thanks for sharing!" I tell my niece. Today it's a teddy bear cookie or raisin. Tomorrow it may be sweat equity, time, or money, special training, or cans of food from her cupboard—all freely offered and put in the service of aid and justice. In the New UU meetings here at church, we talk with people interested in learning more about us and discuss a concept that enriches the life of this congregation: Shared Ministry.

Shared ministry is an invitation for everyone to serve (the root of the word "ministry"). Perhaps the most obvious arena for shared ministry is in the Sanctuary on Sunday mornings. One weekend a month I'm blessed with a Sunday out of the pulpit. On those days, and during Sunday collaborations with UUCT members, our pulpit is a visible symbol of shared ministry. The Program Committee and I meet monthly to plan services—both the ones I lead and the ones that are called "lay led" Sundays. Do you have an idea for a service topic? Share it with the Program Committee, and you may end up speaking from the pulpit. Lay leaders are also needed, for which you don't need to have a homily, sermon or talk prepared, but you will keep the service moving, and help define the theme of the day in Unitarian Universalist terms.

Shared ministry is also in effect as we care for one another in times of illness, transition, and need. The Caring Ministries Committee coordinates our response, but loving kindness neither starts nor ends there. So many people help in so many

ways, and you keep most of these actions quiet.

I want to thank the Board yet again for the fine staff I'm privileged to work with. And I want to thank all of you for your unpaid "ministries." The Board and the committee chairs are volunteers. Those who host the coffee and conversation hour on Sundays, do the potluck dishes, cut the lawn, or blow leaves off the sidewalks are also volunteers. Youth Religious Education teachers volunteer their time, gifts, and energy. So does the choir. Some of us get paid money to exercise our gifts of ministry, most do not. However, I think we all gain rewards—in this lifetime!—from serving others and from living out our religious ideals.

Shared ministry is a journey of relationship and learning. That goes for me as well as for you. In fact, at our denominational headquarters (the Unitarian Universalist Association buildings in Boston, MA), one of the questions asked of professional ministers is: Describe a mistake you have made in the past, and how you have addressed it. Gosh, I wouldn't know which of my many mistakes would be the most entertaining or informative! But I do know what the answer ought to boil down to: I address mistakes as they come up. To err is human. To admit it is hard. To do so strengthens relationship.

And now for the *errata* part of this message. When I mix up the order of service on Sundays, I'm glad for the gentle corrections you provide—no ear-splitting shouts of horror from the back of the sanctuary. Once I gave penance chocolate to our music director when I skipped over the Prelude. So you may all deserve a cake, but perhaps an apology is enough.

Here's another mistake: a too-broad remark in last month's *Meridian* where I wrote that European Americans were committing acts of violence against Arab Americans. Though that accurately reflected reports I had heard, I agree with Neil Mooney that I should have condemned prejudicial violence by <u>all people</u>—not just one group. The human potential for evil and good is present in every group and sub-group, and all are capable of exercising both kindness and cruelty. I'm sorry I neglected the big picture.

Shared ministry gets me back on track and reminds me to adjust my perspective—to keep in focus both the congregation as a whole and individuals.

A macro-/micro- vision would also come in handy for our country right now. In all areas of life, let's not get swept up in the frenzy and let's not get stuck in the mire. Steady On.

GREEN CORNER

More on energy saving appliances: Here are a few tips on refrigerators, which can be responsible for about 12% of home energy use. Information sources include the www.energyhawk.com website (Energy Hawk), the 2001 annual listing of energy-efficient appliances from the American Council for an Energy Efficient Economy (ACEEE), and the Earth Communications Office (ECO) website.

If you're in the market, look for an Energy Star® label to identify the more energy-efficient models. Federal efficiency standards first took effect in 1993. Stricter standards went into effect July 1, 2001 (ACEEE).

Models where the refrigerator and the freezer are side-by-side use more energy than the ones with the freezer on top. For example, side-by-side refrigerator-freezers in the 19.5 to 22.4 cubic foot (cu ft) size range use 606-608 kilowatt-hours of electricity per year (kWh/yr) compared to 440-485 kWh/yr for-top freezer models in the 18.5 to 20.4 cu ft range and 463-515 kWh/yr for top-freezer models in the 20.5 to 22.4 cu ft range. Designer built-in fridges can use more energy too.

A good rule of thumb is the larger the model, the more energy it uses. The most efficient models tend to be in the 16-20 cubic feet range.

Automatic icemakers and water/ice dispensers on the outside of the door consume more energy. Automatic defrosters use more electricity than manual ones, but only if you defrost the manual ones regularly (whenever there is ¼ inch of ice or frost). Otherwise you're using more energy once the coils ice up. Plus, it is getting pretty hard to find manual defrosters now anyhow.

SOCIAL JUSTICE UUCT MAKES DONATIONS TO ECHO'S NEW APARTMENTS

A few days before the yard sale, word was received from Rev. Amy and the Social Concerns Committee that ECHO Outreach Ministries was in need of items for their new apartments for no-longer-homeless families located at Magnolia and South Monroe. Since so many nice things had been donated for the yard

sale, Joan Patterson and Tom Chase selected some things that were on ECHO's wish list, prior to the sale -- things like lamps, bed linen, towels, dishes, glasses and small household appliances. Special thanks to Tom for loading these goodies into his trusty VW van and delivering them to ECHO. We trusted that this would be okay with our donors.

Incidentally, ECHO is still in need of furniture, such as twin or bunk beds, bed linens, chests, night stands, toiletries, paper goods, dishes, kitchen utensils and small kitchen appliances. Small things may be placed in the ECHO box, which is in the hall near the church kitchen, under the mailboxes. Tom and Norene Chase, with Annette Pearce as back up, deliver these things to ECHO on a periodic basis. If you have larger items to donate, please call ECHO at 224-3246.

UUCT DEATH PENALTY RESOLUTION

In January, UUCT members will consider a resolution on a "Moratorium on the Death Penalty". The draft resolution, as developed by a committee consisting of Sandy Smith, Steve Urse, and Norene Chase, follows. The draft will be reviewed by the Racial and Cultural Diversity Committee at their November 13 meeting. (All interested members of the congregation are welcome.) Agreedupon changes will be made in the resolution, with the final draft considered by the congregation at a January discussion meeting. Resolution on a Moratorium of the Death Penalty

WHEREAS, capital punishment violates our principle of the inherent worth and dignity of every person by failing to acknowledge that at the core of every living person lies a human soul worthy of respect and dignity, no matter what she or he may have done; and

WHEREAS, capital punishment violates our principle of justice, equity and compassion in human relations, by discriminating against the minorities and the poor; and

WHEREAS, it has not been proved that fear of capital punishment is a deterrent to crime; and

WHEREAS, modern justice should concern itself with rehabilitation, not retribution; and

WHEREAS, human judgments are not infallible, and no penalty should be used which cannot be revoked in case of error; and

WHEREAS, the act of execution of the death penalty by government sets an example of violence; and

WHEREAS, the American Bar Association has concluded that administration of the death penalty is "a haphazard maze of unfair practices with no internal consistency" and has called for a moratorium on executions.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Unitarian-Universalist Church of Tallahassee, Florida calls on the Governor and our state representatives, and President Bush and our representatives in Congress, to enact and adopt legislation imposing a moratorium on executions at least until this state and nation implement policies and procedures which:

*Ensure that death penalty cases are administered fairly and impartially in accordance with basic due process. *Eliminate the risk that innocent persons may be executed by mandating that the state provide DNA testing and other newly developed scientific methods of examining case evidence for an unlimited time period for all defendants including those who have pled guilty or no contest.

*Prevent the execution of mentally disabled persons and persons who were under the age of 18 at the time of their offenses including those defendants who are currently on death row or sentenced to death in the future.

Be it further resolved that copies of this resolution shall be forwarded to the Governor, our state representatives, President Bush and our representatives in Congress.

FACILITIES UPDATE

PERMITTING. We are going through two permitting-related processes simultaneously. The first is a zoning change from Residential Preservation to PUD (Planned Unit Development), as required now for community services, including churches. This process has three decision levels: staff, Planning Commission and City Commission. We passed the first level in early October, with the contingency that the minimum acreage requirement for PUDs would need to be lowered before the zoning change could take effect. And indeed in late October. the acreage requirement was lowered by the City Commission from five to three acres.

The other two levels of decisionmaking have been advertised publicly and also to neighbors within a 525' notification boundary surrounding our property. The Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on November 5 and then make a recommendation to the City Commission. The City Commission will hold a public hearing on November 28, with a final decision on the zoning change made then or postponed to a definite other date.

At the same time, we are going through a permitting process for our master site plan, as updated by the civil engineer to meet permitting requirements. Only one decision-making level is required for the site plan. Our civil engineer is currently working to resolve several concerns raised by City staff; we expect to resolve these concerns and receive a final decision on the site plan in late November. As soon as the zoning change and site plan are approved, we will proceed with applying for an environmental permit.

SITE WORK BIDS & PHASE

ONE PLANS. Once the environmental permit is received in early January, site work can begin on construction of the water retention area, drainage improvements, the driveway and parking reconfiguration, and the building pad for the Phase One building. Our Construction Manager is currently soliciting site work bids from sub-contractors, and the CIC will be reviewing these soon. Our architect is beginning work on the detailed plans for the Phase One building, starting with "value engineering" conferences with mechanical/electrical and structural consultants, our Construction Manager and possible subcontractors. (Actual sub-contractors will be picked through a bidding process.) The purpose of value engineering is to develop the best alternatives to meet the client's needs, within the budget available.

INTERIM SANCTUARY
IMPROVEMENTS. Meanwhile,
the CIC is continuing to work on
researching possibilities for interim
sanctuary improvements: new carpet

for aesthetics and sound absorption, new chairs for increased comfort and to replace broken ones, and possible window treatments for sound absorption and energy efficiency (with use of these to be optional for each, individual sanctuary use).
