This house has been many things over the years. Its current sign reads: Pine Park Community Center but its first ID was the Ward-White Memorial Universalist Church.

Daniel Patterson Ward was a widower who was first married in the Baptist church and then the Methodist church. He lived from 1869–1938 and was a charter member of the now dissolved

Facilities Update

We're off and building! The foundation blocks have been laid, and the building area within has been filled with a mixture of sand and the extra soil resulting from excavating the new driveway down to its proper level. From now on, work should progress non-stop until our move-in date of March 3, 2003. Timber retaining walls will be built where needed along the driveway, and soon we'll see the walls of the new building rising above its foundation. Now that work will proceed non-stop, Mad Dog has a supervisor on-site all the time: William Yastcemski, known to everyone as "Shemp".

exterior color scheme chosen will outline the building in darker trim, similar to our current buildings, where there are dark horizontal and vertical lines around the many windows and doors. The dark verticals, especially, help our building relate to our wooded site with its many dark verticals. The new building will, therefore, relate to both the site and the current buildings. Look for the foam board display on Sundays with drawings showing the exterior colors.

OTHER DECISIONS. The CIC and Buildings and Ground Committee have also been addressing the removal of a few hazardous, dead or decayed trees and placement of a few additional 100-watt street lights. These will be added along the driveway to the new building

and in the new gravel parking lot in our southeast corner.

CONSERVATION EASEMENTS. As a requirement for permitting, we are placing 8,400 square feet along Meridian Rd. in a canopy road protection zone conservation easement and .77 acre along our south border and part of our west border in a steep grade conservation easement. We will not build or conduct any other disruptive activities in those areas -- now or in the future. We may, however, remove noxious and invasive vegetation. The Board has approved the easement agreements, and they will be signed with the City soon.

LESSONS LEARNED. The CIC has learned some good lessons for Phase Two. First, only start work and site disruption once we are really ready to move forward with no delays. The CIC was so anxious to stick with our timetable and begin Phase One that we started site-work while there were still details to be worked out in terms of construction design, methods, and materials. Also, our site is very challenging due to the degree of constant slope. While summer was a good time to start site-work in terms of lower parking demand on Sundays, it was not a good time in terms of heavy rain on our disrupted and sloping site.

Secondly, for Phase Two, we will make sure there is adequate time to have subcontractor input as key building

systems are being designed by architectural consultants (structural, electrical, plumbing, etc. systems). We have lost some time in redesign of parts of systems, once subcontractors were chosen and reviewed the plans. They had some suggestions for changes to save money or to improve design, based on their hands-on knowledge.

Provided we are happy with their work, we will most likely continue with the same subcontractors for Phase Two, so they will be on board from the beginning as construction drawings are being developed. We will also, hopefully, not have the time pressure we had for Phase One of needing to get construction plans submitted before a new building code becomes effective, with all the implementation questions and time delays associated with it.

LOOK ON SUNDAYS. Be sure to take a minute to look at progress each Sunday. You should see evidence of it each week from now on! Mad Dog Design and Construction and Welch and Ward Architects continue to be wonderful partners in this enterprise of "growing" our physical space so that we have the facilities for the programs and activities we envision. We couldn't do it without them.

Green Corner

One of the 17 initiatives a church must take to attain "Green Sanctuary" status is to "pass an all-church resolution committing to an all-church environmental project for a year." The UUCT Green Sanctuary Committee plans to recommend to our Church Board that our congregation be asked to vote on such a resolution to initiate two household pledge programs modeled after initiatives taken by the First Unitarian Church of Portland, Oregon: (1) a 1-2-3 Response to Global Warming pledge and (2) a Food for Thought (And Action!) pledge.

The focus of the 1-2-3 household pledge is on taking local action to help reduce global warming, widely acknowledged to be the most critical environmental threat of our generation. Any steps we take to reduce energy use (unless you get your energy from solar sources) will help reduce carbon dioxide emissions and their impacts on global warming.

Some of you may remember a song from the 1960's, "One, two, three, it's so ele-men-tary." This is a simple concept that requires no committee meetings, little time, and can save you money! Each member household of the congregation would be invited to sign a 1-2-3 Pledge in which they commit to take as many as possible of the following actions to reduce global warming:

- Reduce the thermostat setting at home during the heating season by 1 degree (Fahrenheit) or more and increase the thermostat setting during the air conditioning season by one degree or more.
- Reduce driving speed by 2 mph or more when traveling in excess of 60 mph.
- Replace three or more regular light bulbs with compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulbs in intensively used home lighting fixtures.

What will these 1-2-3 steps accomplish? According to a brochure

prepared by the 7th Principle Committee of the First Unitarian Church, for every one degree Fahrenheit reduction of the thermostat during the heating season there is about a 3% reduction in energy consumption. For every one degree increase of the thermostat during the air conditioning season, there is about a 5% savings. This can translate into an annual reduction of 330 lbs of carbon dioxide and annual savings of about \$33.

Every one mph reduction in driving speed at highway speeds translates into a 1.5 to 2% reduction in fuel consumption. This step can save 390 lbs of carbon dioxide per year and about \$28. For the 267 mile trip to Disney World from Tallahassee that translates into an additional 6 minutes if one were to reduce average speed from 75 mph to 73 mph.

CFL bulbs use only 25% as much energy as regular incandescent bulbs. They cost about \$10 a piece, but they last 10 times as long. Three CFLs can result in 600 lbs less carbon dioxide per year and about \$28 in net savings.

The Food for Thought (and Action!) household pledge concerns the choices we make about the food we eat, a topic we've covered on two previous occasions in this column. The pledge addresses three actions: (1) eat less meat (beef, pork, lamb, poultry, and fish), (2) eat local produce, and (3) eat organic foods. According to a brochure published by the 7th Principle Committee of the First Unitarian Church, these actions can not only save energy and thereby reduce global warming, they also can help to reduce air, water, and soil pollution, reduce water shortages, reduce world hunger, promote good health, and support local farmers.

Eating less meat saves water:
According to the First Unitarian Church brochure, production of one pound of beef takes an average of 2500 gallons versus 815 gallons for one pound of

chicken, 33 gallons for a pound of carrots, and 25 gallons for a pound of wheat.

Eating local produce saves energy:
The average mouthful of food in the
US travels 1300 miles from farm to
plate. [By the way, Kathie Mackie
reports that local produce also can be
obtained from a farmer's market that
operates at the Tallahassee Flea
Market on Capital Circle Southeast.]

Eating organic produce reduces pesticide and hormone use: 67% of fruits and vegetables contain at least one pesticide; about 25% of the milk produced in the US is from cows injected with Bovine Growth Hormone which may be linked to prostate and breast cancer according to the First Unitarian Church brochure.

So please consider supporting a congregational vote to initiate similar pledge programs for our church. "One, two, three, it's so elementary Power of the Plate!"
