- 1) Will the minister come back after sabbatical?
- 2) How will we pay for the sabbatical?
- 3) Who will do the minister's work during the sabbatical months?

Thanking The Active

The latest of our members to enlist onto the Board is your friend and longterm "activist" (in a UU sense) Rod Oldenburg. Rod enthusiastically agreed to serve out the remainder of the V.P. for Worship term, and he was just as enthusiastically and unanimously approved by the Board. To say we are thrilled to have him with us would be an understatement.

The leaders constituting your Executive Board are invariably the first persons members go to when something is needed. This is proper and logical, for those individuals especially have risen to the call to serve. They have pledged two years (or more) to serving you by serving the greater congregation. They each assist numerous committees, set My questions are the same, except change the first one to: Will they take me back after sabbatical?!

- When UUCT and I put a sabbatical into our covenant and working agreement, we agreed that I won't go looking for another position and you won't go looking for another minister to fill this position, for at least a year after the sabbatical ends. I hope that this sabbatical will make it possible for us to keep working together in creative and satisfying ways, so I'm going to take a seminar on New Visions for the Long Pastorate.
- Six years ago, we didn't allocate sabbatical funds, set aside each year, to cover fees for visiting Sunday service presenters or for the seminars I'll attend. However, I think those expenses are covered. The church budget you approved for this fiscal year added

money for Sunday services, and I got a grant for \$500 from the Unitarian Universalist Association's Department of Ministry and Professional Leadership.

3) When I'm on sabbatical, our shared ministry will be yours! The Program Committee (Sunday Service planning) and the Caring Ministries Committee will have more to do during my sabbatical. And when I get back, our shared ministry may change. However, the concept will continue to inspire and challenge us—each of us has a call to serve others, grow in spirit and commitment, and apply ourselves for the greater good.

Sometimes I feel so blessed to serve as your settled minister I could burst from the joy.

church policy at Board meetings, serve on duty at five or six Sunday services per year, and provide constant ad hoc guidance, assistance and leadership to the congregation year-round.

Interestingly, our UUA chalice was designed by a non-member who envied our spirit of service. An Austrian artist who caricatured Hitler, Hans Deutsch, fled to Portugal in 1940 where he met the Reverend Charles Joy who, from Lisbon, oversaw a secret network of couriers and agents for the Unitarian Service committee. (The service committee was founded to assist Eastern Europeans, Unitarians as well as Jews, who needed to escape.) Deutsch was soon working for him, designed the chalice for a symbol of the organization, and wrote to Charles Joy:

"There is something that urges me to tell you ...how much I admire your utter self-denial and your readiness to serve. I am not what you may actually call a believer. But if your kind of life is the profession of your faith - as it is, I feel sure - then religion, ceasing to be magic and superstition, becomes confession to practical philosophy and what is more, to active, really useful social work. And this religion...is one to which even a 'godless' fellow like myself can say wholeheartedly, Yes!" (http://members.aol.com/UUBlooming/ sermons/s20030112.html.)

I hope the Board members (and all "activists") know how grateful we are to them for serving. I believe that the best way to express it is - as Rod is doing - simply to follow their example.

Background: A powerful new initiative is currently under negotiation called the Free Trade Area of the Americas. or FTAA. Equally powerful is a growing voice in opposition to the FTAA, an initiative that would effectively expand the NAFTA, which has proven to be an economic and environmental disaster. In 2003, the UUA adopted an Economic Globalization Statement of Conscience, which calls upon UU members to "bring our Unitarian Universalist principles to our understanding of economic globalization and to help mitigate its adverse effects". November 19-22, trade ministers from around the Americas will meet in Miami for talks on the Free Trade Area of the Americas.

About Workshop: Starhawk will lead participants to actively explore in-depth principles and techniques of nonviolent direct action. Participants will also be given the opportunity to brainstorm political innovation. It is hoped that several participants will continue on to Miami to demonstrate with Starhawk against this movement of global injustice.

About Starhawk: Starhawk is a committed global justice activist and organizer, a veteran of progressive movements, and a highly influential voice in the revival of earth-based spirituality and Goddess religion. In addition to being published by Beacon Press, she is frequently asked to speak to UU congregations and has been a keynote speaker in the past at the UUA General Assembly.

Green Corner

Have We Lost Connection with the Land? Is this Important?

We urban/suburban dwellers have lost our connection with the land. Sue Cerulean, a Heart of the Earth (HOTE) board member, told a September UUCT Forum that their group is trying to do something about that. One method is to celebrate the earth with outdoor events quarterly, like the one some UUs participated in on the equinox where Ed Oaksford led a group to explore Bald Point State Park. Another way is to become "native to the place" by learning more about our bioregion. Susan is editing an anthology, Between Two Rivers, featuring prominent local authors, that will be published next year. A third way HOTE developed is to fight global warming by taking a pledge to reduce carbon emissions. See

We UU's have taken some similar measures to reconnect with the land. Some picked blueberries in the summer. Others helped just before Labor Day with the grape harvest and winemaking for Cynthia Connelly at Ladybird Organics Farm. And some participated in the Coastal Cleanup with Big Bend Sierra and Apalachee Canoe and Kayak by removing a total of 724 pounds of trash from the Aucilla River and Sink Trail ... and there was much work done and is more left to do on the UU gardening landscape. Doing good, being outdoors and connecting with the land—what a combination!

A UU and her husband (Carolyn and Ed Lichfield) living in a Transylvanian village are much more connected to the land, its bounty and the community. Here is an excerpt from a recent email. "Even though Ed's not here [visiting our daughter in Iowa], I'm staying very busy giving private English lessons and planning tours for

next summer. My garden is almost 'put UUCT passed a Resolution that to bed' for the winter. For all of my neighbors, even though we suffered from drought, it was a good summer especially for tomatoes and most other vegetables and fruit. The wheat wasn't very plentiful and corn not quite as good as it usually is. All the remaining fruit is being stored to make palinka [plum brandy], and the grapes have been pressed for wine. I secretly keep one neighbor lady's wine in my basement so her husband doesn't drink too much! Neighbors bring us baskets of fruit and nuts, strings of onions, bags of eggs, wagonloads of manure. And we give free rides into the city when we're going. Yes, we do fit into the daily life of our village. It's early morning here in our little valley, quite misty and mysterious."

Our Great Expectations Workshop

Here are a few highlights from our Great Expectations Workshop in early September with FL District consultant Connie Goodbread. Fifty-seven people attended the workshop - representing a variety of ages, lengths of time at UUCT, and involvement in church committees and activities.

In one exercise, Connie had us split into small groups and share answers:

How did I find this congregation?

What was I seeking?

How was I welcomed?

When did I feel I belonged?

When was I aware that I had made a commitment?

How did I learn about the congregation as a system? (How decisions are made, how committees work, etc.)

The answers to these questions were all thoughtful and informative. Connie suggested that we all might want to think about and share our answers with others at UUCT, as a way of getting to know each other better. Your Membership Committee would be interested in hearing any insightful answers you have with regard to the "journey to membership".

Connie reviewed the stages in this journey, giving specific examples:

<u>Testing the waters</u> - Newcomers are looking for a variety of things: messages they can agree with, an accepting faith and community, to be welcomed in, a church without dogma, social action - deeds matching the message, and perhaps friends who are already here and religious education for themselves or their children.

<u>Making connections</u> - When newcomers don't continue, it's usually because they haven't made connections. This is the stage to introduce them to others with common interests, invite them to the New UU sessions, personally invite them to dinners and social events, and ask for their help with small, one-time tasks, where they will get to know others.

<u>Making the commitment</u> - This is the stage where newcomers attend the New UU sessions and are introduced

to our culture of generosity (generous in spirit, in acceptance of others, and in our gifts of self and money). When they are ready, newcomers become a member or supporting friend. In doing so, they make a financial commitment to the congregation (the gift of money). They also think about the talents and interests they have and which ones to commit to using here at UUCT over the next year (gift of self).

Deepening the commitment - This is a stage Connie felt UUCT needed to strengthen, because it is very important to really go deeper in our faith. It is where all of us build our spiritual lives through increasing our knowledge and nurturing our wisdom. We all need to keep alive our sense of exploration and excitement and also remain open to further knowledge and insights. Adult Enrichment is a key ingredient at this stage.

The Membership Committee would like to stress that helping newcomers move through these stages is the work of the entire congregation, not just the committee. We need everyone's help!

Is it My Imagination or What? I know that we UUs stream in and out of UUCT all year long, and that there are always many things going on at church, no matter what time of year but!... it just seems to me that come Autumn harvest time, when the holiday season is about upon us, UUCT quickens its pace and "comes alive" big-time, with hustle and bustle wonderful to behold! Is it not our "homecoming" season? Wildflowers dance in the wind, the woods turn brown and yellow, the air cools, pumpkins spring up orange everywhere, fields glow with white cotton-- and we are at home in our church again!
