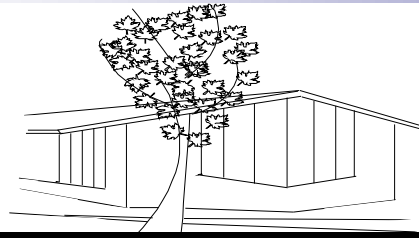

Minister's Message

With my life so rich already, I didn't expect to be grateful for Major League Baseball. However, it was almost like the hand of Providence was "relief" pitching to a hurricane-traumatized and election-weary people.

The only sport I watch regularly is basketball, and then only the WNBA games (women's pro. basketball). But one of the members of the Committee on Ministry alerted me to the fact that the Boston Red Sox and New York Yankees were seriously tempting fate. Maybe the Red Sox would win, go on to win the World Series, and overcome the alleged "curse" of many decades.

A few days before game 6 of the American League championship, a colleague in UU ministry sent an email of a soliloquy from "Take Me Out," the play by Richard Greenberg. The quote describes baseball as "a perfect metaphor for hope in a Democratic society." We could all use some hope, and I took it as a further sign to watch.

I was rewarded with an upswell of hope for the future of our country when the Red Sox won in game 7. Down by 3 games, they took the championship!

Even long curses can be overcome,

with hard work and faith. So I trust that unjust governmental policies will be overturned. Imagine an end to: policies that harm people who don't have enough money; aggressive military actions; distortions of the truth; and disdain for the separation of church and state.

Justice will prevail. Maybe not this time, but in time. Love will grow. Maybe not this time, but in time. Change will come. In time and all the time!

At Thanksgiving, Unitarian Universalists wend our way through the question of who we are thanking for this great life. During baseball games, I notice that some home-run hitters point their index finger in the sky, I assume in a gesture of thanks to God. But a home run is a human event according to "Take Me Out":

...Another thing I like is the home-run trot. Not the mad dash around the bases...I'm talking about that graceful little canter when the ball has been crushed, and it's missing, and the outcome's not in doubt. What I like about it is it's so unnecessary. [...T]he sensible things would be to say, yes,

that's gone, add a point to the score, and send the next batter to the plate. But that's not what happens. Instead, play is suspended for a celebration. A man rounds four bases and, if he's with the home team, the crowd has a catharsis. And from the way he runs, you learn something about the man. And from the way they cheer, you learn something about the crowd. And I like this because I don't believe in God. Or--well---don't know about God. Or about any of that . . . metaphysical murk. Yet, I like to believe that something about being human is . . . good. And I think what's best about us is manifested in our desire to show respect for one another. For what we can be. And that's what we do in our ceremonies, isn't it? Honor ourselves as we pass through Time?

Let's do that when we settle down to the Thanksgiving meal. Celebrate and show respect. Honor humanity. Honor the people who have gathered with you. Honor yourself. What more can Life ask than to be appreciated and applied, in greater-expanding circles and for larger percentages of people?

Just returned from a visit to Rome and came away much impressed by the Vatican and the city's archeological ruins. The Colosseum is colossal! The Sistine Chapel and St. Peter's Basilica are breathtaking. The Chapel ceiling and walls bear Michelangelo's paintings, as you probably know, and they depict the story of mankind from the creation of Adam to the Day of Judgment. A Christian can get the whole founding "myth" of his (and our) culture in a single visit, although it may take a few hours to scan every painting in detail, standing elbow-to-elbow with tourists from all faiths (including UUs).

It occurred to me as I craned my neck to view the ceiling that Unitarian Universalists don't have that kind of story to tell, or to fall back upon in rough times. This can be a disadvantage in talking faith with our Christian friends. The ready answers are not there at the fingertips. We have no "sacred texts." The UU faith is that answers can be found, that hope is realistic, that the sun will rise tomorrow. But, we kind of have to work at it, n'est ce pas? Nothing is given. No guarantees. We dig for it with pick and shovel.

Not an easy faith to have, especially in these times. Lots of uncertainty. Difficult issues. It gets a bit tiring, now and then, slogging through bog after bog. We'd like a break, truth be told, but the stream of life never pauses. It's sink or swim. And so we dog-paddle, try a backstroke, nothing fancy, mostly moving ahead. And the answers we seek—ah! The answers! Always partial. Never final. Usually something left unsaid. This is what it's like not to be a god. And that's our story.

Join us to look at our church's heritage and present challenges. What was happening in Tallahassee and beyond when UUCT was founded and how did that affect the kind of church we were? How about in the "good old days?" How about now? Come give input!

Beforehand, **during social hour on Sunday, November 7**, we'd like you to mark your house on a large pin map of Tallahassee. Those who live outside the map boundaries will mark along the edge of the map. Different colors of pins will designate different lengths of time at UUCT, and eventually every member/supporting friend household will be marked. This should be a fun and informative exercise! Later, look for the chart displaying UUCT total Sunday attendance for the past 30 years – adults, children and youth.

Where did we get the idea to explore UUCT's religious journey? Last winter, the Florida, Mid-South and Thomas Jefferson Districts of the Unitarian Universalist Association sponsored an Alban Institute workshop on issues faced by mid-sized churches. The institute is a non-profit organization that studies and works with more liberal congregations, such as Reformed Jewish, Episcopal and Unitarian Universalist ones. The workshop was during Rev. Amy's winter sabbatical, so she was not able to attend. However, three UUCT members did attend – Jennifer Carver, Trudy Deyle and Annette Pearce.

The workshop's purpose was to learn a process for addressing the host of reasons why churches of our size often encounter a glass ceiling on attendance. Just addressing one or two of these reasons rarely lifts the ceiling. The process learned involves a comprehensive look at a congregation and all the issues that may be affecting participation of all ages – children, youth and adults, and current members, as well as newcomers.

The three of us who attended the workshop were convinced that this process would be very worthwhile to undertake at UUCT. We made a presentation to the Board and recommended that the congregation spend the current year going through the process. The Board endorsed doing so, and a learning team to guide the congregation was formed: the three who attended the workshop, Rev. Amy, and three additional members with varying lengths of time at UUCT – Walter Hoskins, Bob Kenon, and Molly Schmid.

How will we do the exploring? The eight-month process will consist of several cycles of information gathering from the congregation and other sources, summarizing this information, distributing it to the congregation, and gathering and incorporating your feedback. It will complement the Religious Education covenanting and Committee on Ministry congregational assessment processes. The Journey process is a comprehensive one, involving every area of the church.

Led by the learning team, UUCT will:

- examine our congregation in relation to our community context – both historically and at present,
- explore the current character of that context,

- discover our congregation's unique role within the community and articulate a vision based on it,
- assess how far along we are in reaching our vision, and
- determine and prioritize what else needs to be done, including whether we are ready and willing to do what is necessary.

What will be the result? The end product, based on congregational consensus, will be a comprehensive road map for the future for navigating the issues faced by a UU church of our size – outlining the most urgent next steps to be taken, our readiness and willingness to take them, and issues requiring more study and reflection.

What's different about this planning process? The Journey process was developed by an organization with many years of experience working with congregations. It also starts with the overall vision of what we want to be in our community and then addresses the specifics of how to become that. Planning processes we have followed in the past have largely been made up as we proceeded and usually went from the specific to the general, brainstorming everything we'd like to do and then crafting a vision from those specifics. We're convinced that the Journey process is different and that the final product resulting from it will be a useful guide for our future! Note: We also have copies of an Alban Institute video on attendance glass ceilings and the possible reasons behind them. To borrow a copy, contact Trudy Deyle (gdeyle@juno.com, 422-1057).

Social Justice

Eyes Wide Open Exhibit

This exhibition of the Iraq War will be on **Monday, November 1**, from dawn to dusk in Lewis Park, Park Ave. and Calhoun St. Over 1,000 pairs of empty combat boots -- tagged with the names of U.S. soldiers who died in the Iraq war -- will be displayed, together with a 24-foot "wall" of names and incidents identifying Iraqi civilian deaths. "An exhibit that speaks directly to our hearts and reminds us of the human cost of war." The exhibit is sponsored by Tallahassee Friends Meeting, who need to raise \$2,000 in order to cover American Friends Service Committee and local expenses such as advertising. The Meeting needs and welcomes tax deductible donations earmarked for this project. TEAM (Tallahassee Equality Action Ministry)

Our interfaith social justice Action Assembly was a success!

UUCTers were 7 of the 325 or so people from a dozen Christian, Jewish, and UU congregations in Leon County who met with our elected officials for the cause of justice on October 26.

We added our hands and voices (clapping was encouraged!) to the Action, which was hosted by Innovation Baptist Church.

ISSUES:

*Voluntary Universal Pre-K (UPK)

Representatives Curtis Richardson and Lorrane Ausley, and candidate David Coley, each agreed to support a Voluntary UPK program with at least 4 hours instructional time per day, researched curriculum, teacher training, and assessment to evaluate program effectiveness. (The

Federation of DART Organizations, Florida, a coalition of 10 organizations, including TEAM, support this issue.)

*Transportation

City Commissioner Allan Katz committed to work to maintain the current level of service and funding for Dial-A-Ride through 2006. He also agreed to work to expand bus service north on Thomasville Rd. as well as to the Southwood/Capital Circle Office Complex, in order to increase access to jobs. (Both Mayor John Marks and Commissioner Andrew Gillum indicated their willingness to work with us, very cooperatively, and expressed regret over not being at the meeting.)

*Healthcare

County Commissioner Ed DePuy and a representative for Commissioner Cliff Thael agreed to commit to improve health care services and decrease non-emergency use of local emergency rooms. The official language was: "Allocate an appropriate portion of the MSTU tax money for primary healthcare, apart from the women's clinic, when formally advised by the primary healthcare advisory board." (The County Commission was meeting at the same time as the TEAM Action, which affected attendance!)

The issues were chosen by the member congregations of TEAM last May, researched over the summer, and presented to the appropriate elected officials before the Action. Look for the next Issues Assembly around May 2005.

Building and Grounds Thanks

Many thanks are owed to those who completed these tasks on our church in the wildwood during the month of October (through Oct. 20). Although the October 9 workday accomplished a great deal, there still remained unfinished tasks. We are appreciative the TAPP Campaign presented an education program, Landscape BMP's for Water-Friendly Yards. UUCT has adopted those practices. Education materials are available if interested.

Warranty follow-up from the phase one capital improvement project continues. Trudy Deyle and the Building and Grounds (B&G) Committee continue to work with Mad Dog Construction and the subcontractors. The largest issue is the drainage problem with storm water runoff. A plan is being developed to improve the drainage in front of the sanctuary, in the new building courtyard near the old classrooms, and along the N/S driveway. More gravel will also be added in parking places that need it.

For the building, the sanctuary walkway steps were painted yellow for safety reasons. The sitting wall along that walkway was mortared. All rain gutters and the sanctuary roof were blown clean. The overhead signs for Amy's office and directions to the pods were washed. The cleaning of the sanctuary windows was begun but not completed.

For the grounds, stepping stones were placed along the path to the playground. The driveways and walkways were blown free of debris.

Under landscape tasks, all the grass was mowed including the meadow and the area north of the old classrooms. This mowing mulched the leaves and cut grass as well as making the lawn more attractive. Some landscape plants, mums and monkey grass, were moved from the courtyard garden to the magnolia tree turnaround. The turnaround was weeded in preparation for the planting. The lorepetalum now masks an AC unit.
