### Minister's Message: In the Interim

One of the ideas that I try to stress to congregations is that we are all spiritual people. By this, I mean we each have our individual spirits to nurture and to grow. We can talk about the meaning of life and what it means just to be human, and such conversations can be fun, as well as enlightening. They may even be entertaining.

In such discussions and, during my time here, you may hear me use what one might call "traditional" church language. Well, yes, I do and make no apology for it. I can do this because the words have new meaning for me and also because I am far enough away from my former faith that the old language is no longer threatening to me. So just bear with me, and let it be an opportunity for us to grow together.

In the recent ministers' retreat that I attended, much was said about spirituality and personal growth. Involvement was another word that sometimes resonated. Many of the old words were thrown around, and it was wonderful because we did not have to ask, "What does that mean to you?" We simply either understood or accepted that we could each give our own meaning to a particular word . . . just as long as we also understood the significance for the speaker of the words.

All of this brings me to the point to say that for all of us, there is a power greater than ourselves. I cannot necessarily define it, nor can I give it a name, but for me, part of life is a given. Much of life is "nature" working within us. I have never figured it all out, and that is part of the reason that I am a Unitarian Universalist. Here I can believe, reason and think, and my answer(s) does not have to be definitive.

One of the ministers at our meeting is a long time UU and well-known within our association. I first heard him speak almost 20 years ago in a district meeting in Oklahoma City. He is the Rev. Clarke Wells. In his newest publication he leads off with these words:

Life is too wonderful to treat like a toy, a stage prop.

The world must be known to the edge of God.

To be human we must risk again and again, in spite of the great cost, the mind and heart of human love.

So, as we travel on these spiritual journeys, separately and together, may we be guided by love and by compassion. May we strive not to be harsh but abundant in generosity.

As we discuss seeking the meaning of life, let me remind you of the words of Joseph Campbell who wrote this:

People say that what we're seeking is a meaning for life.

I don't think that's what we're really seeking.

I think that what we're seeking is an experience of being alive,

... so that we actually feel the rapture of being alive.

So May It Be.

### President's Message

Does it matter whether we have a Unitarian Universalist minister at the head of our Tallahassee church? If that person is someone with honesty and integrity and can inspire us, will the religious affiliation matter? A good person is a good person is a good person. We covenant to be tolerant and accept other religious paths as each of us finds our way through life. The congregational vote in October was resoundingly for a UU minister in whatever capacity we chose to call the person. Did it really matter?

Yes, for many reasons. We are all encouraged in our journeys to value the "worth and dignity" of every human being. Everyone is a teacher if we listen and are willing to learn. But all lessons are not equally valuable, nor do all people have an equal amount of wisdom to share. Good people do differ on philosophy, morals and behavior. Sometimes the lesson must be distilled from what the person says.

If we are truly trying a new path by following the UU principles, a person who is ambivalent about these principles or who openly follows another path is probably not the most useful counsel on how to live the principles. And if that minister is one who wholly embraces the UU philosophy yet remains within another discipline or uncommitted to Unitarian Universalism, the nagging question of hypocrisy would inevitably pop up. That minister would most likely be bombarded by UUs asking why and how, diluting the message altogether.

I don't argue that such a person could not be a good human being. We have been graced with many speakers from many traditions who led us in very thoughtful services. There is always much to learn. But leading a church is more than just one or two good sermons. The minister must represent us in the community, counsel individuals in their struggles, attend ministerial gatherings and General

Assembly, appear in other pulpits, speak for the UUCT, advise us on religious education, and know our history and traditions in order to do that.

Asking someone outside our tradition to do this for us is like asking for someone with a split personality. Many of us have come to this church because we could no longer believe the words we were saying in our former one. We couldn't live with the hypocrisy of not being totally within a religious group yet worshipping every Sunday with them. Would we ask a non-UU minister to do what we would not? Of course there are exceptional individuals, and perhaps none of this would happen with a non-UU minister. The UUA, our national association, supports us in many ways. The struggle would always be there for a non-UU minister to successfully use the UUA support and to relay that to the congregation. When we come to a UU church. I think we expect there will be a UU minister to guide us in our new journey. I think most of us from other traditions came wanting to know what UUs were all about and whether it was a place we could feel at home. If the minister did not feel enough at home in the faith to join its ranks, could we have confidence making what is for many a very difficult step?

We, as individuals, are urged to keep open minds and draw from all traditions. So we look to all religions to inspire and instruct us. I think we also look for that openness in the minister who leads us. While we honor Earthcentered, Deist, Jewish, Christian, Humanist and Atheist paths, we choose not to pick just one of these to represent Unitarian Universalism. Let our vote indicate that we choose to stay within the one group we know can remain open to all paths. It is not the easiest nor the most consistent group, but its rewards are enormous.

### Congregational Update

#### Ministerial Search Processes By Christine Boczarska

Following the decisions made at the 10/16/05 congregational meeting, the executive board has begun the discussions on an interim minister search committee, which the board appoints, and the settled minister search committee (SMSC), to which the congregation will elect four members. The board made the three board appointments to the SMSC at our 10/30/05 meeting: Bruce Brandt. Bob Deyle (representing the Committee on Ministry) and Mimi Jones. Bruce and Mimi have both served on SMSCs in previous congregations. The settled minister is to be called to serve beginning in fall 2007.

The board has agreed, with the recommendation of Rev. Bill Murchison, to seek the assistance of a UUA ministerial search representative to help us follow a process that will work best for our church. There will be more information for the congregation on this once we actually meet with the representative. In the meantime, we have endorsed the proposal from the Committee on Ministry to have the SMSC lead the congregational conversations we need to have this year. The three board appointees will move ahead with getting the conversations started, as we are already well into this program year. The board plans monthly reports to the congregation on the progress of both search committees, its consultations with the UUA ministerial search representative, and the congregational conversations.

#### Congregational Conversations

By Settled Minister Search Committee (as of 10/30/05)

Much progress has been made in unifying our congregation, but we have far to go: who are we, what do we want, where do we want to be in five years or ten years? We begin to answer these questions by coming together and assessing our strengths and weaknesses. This will lead to decisions about what kind of minister we need and want. While fall 2007 seems a long way off, we have much to do. The board appointees to the SMSC would like to hold informal meetings with members of the congregation to begin the dialogue as soon as possible. Meetings will have to be organized so that everyone who wishes to participate has an opportunity to do so. Please respond with your ideas, assistance and, certainly, your participation.

We have a critical time ahead. Let's not forget to enjoy it as we work together on the future of our special UUCT! And we look forward to the four congregationally-elected members of the committee joining us, as soon as the UUA consultation, a nomination process and a congregational meeting can take place.

#### CROP Walk: Sun. 11/6

The Tallahassee CROP Walk is coming! Crop Walks are ecumenical, interfaith, community events to raise money and awareness for hunger relief locally and globally.

In the spirit of community, and to spice things up, a friendly competition is brewing amongst several groups at UUCT. Groups, such as the choir, the Board, the Freethinkers, our youth, and their parents (as a separate group), are competing to see who can raise the most money, bring the most canned goods, and have the most walkers. (We'll add cans + dollars + walkers to get the grand total.) You can sign your group up or contribute to another group financially, in canned goods or as a walker.

The details: Sunday, November 6 at Tom Brown Park at 1:15 PM. (Registration begins at 12:15 PM, so we'll caravan over after the church service.) Walk distances are 1.5 and 3 miles.

The money raised: 25% stays in Tallahassee, equally divided among ECHO (Emergency Help and Caring Organization), The Shelter meals, and Catholic Charities. Canned food items are also collected for local efforts. 75% of the money raised assists the Church World Service, sponsor of the CROP Walk, or can be pledged to another approved religious relief agency, such as the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee, to assist in hunger relief, long-term development, and social justice worldwide.

The winners of our competition get: first in line, after our visitors, at the second Sunday potluck on November 13! But the real winners will be the recipients of your generosity. And of course, everyone's a winner with the good feeling you get by participating.

# Planned Giving: Changes in Tax Law

Have you had a situation in the past where in one year you've had deductions on your federal income tax exceeding the IRS rule allowing you to only deduct 50 percent of your income? Maybe this situation was caused by setting up an annuity, charitable remainder trust or another charitable deductions vehicle.

The tax-relief package Congress passed this year to aid victims of Hurricane Katrina now allows donors who make cash gifts to almost any charity by the end of this year to deduct an amount equal to virtually 100 percent of their adjusted gross incomes, double the normal limit. And you may be able to take deductions this year for gifts made in past years.

This might be the time to set up an annuity with UUCT as the ultimate beneficiary. Annuities are an estate planning tool allowing you to "have your cake and eat it too." If you own some stock, for instance, that doesn't produce much income but if sold would

lead to a large capital gains tax, one of the programs managed by the UUA for UUCT might work for you.

A meeting of the congregation was held 10/16/05. Christine Boczarska, president of the Executive Board, called the meeting to order at 12:10 PM. A total of 67 voting members were present for the meeting. As the first order of business, the minutes of the 5/22/05 Annual Congregational Meeting were approved, unanimously. Motion #1 – Become lay-led. Motion failed. (Approved – 4, Opposed – 54, Abstained – 3)

Motion # 2 – Consider non-UU candidates for any interim minister searches. (See below motion #3.)

Motion # 3 – Consider non-UU candidates for any settled minister searches.

\* A motion was made by a congregation member to delete motions # 2 and # 3 from the agenda.

Motion passed. (Approved -57, Opposed -7, Abstained -3)

Motion # 4a – Conduct concurrent searches for Fall 2006 settled or  $2^{nd}$ year interim minister. Motion failed. (Approved – 17, Opposed – 46, Abstained – 3)

Motion # 4b – Conduct immediate search for Fall 2006 settled minister. Motion failed. (Approved -23, Opposed -36, Abstained -3)

Motion # 5 – Conduct search for Fall 2007 settled minister; make no further decisions on interim ministry until early 2006. Motion failed. (Approved – 8, Opposed – 38, Abstained – 2)

Motion # 6 – Conduct search for  $2^{nd}$ year interim followed by search for Fall 2007 settled minister. Search for interim may include asking Rev. Murchison to serve a 2nd year. Motion passed. (Approved – 46, Opposed – 8, Abstained – 3)

The following motions were not called to question due to approval of Motion #6, which covered different actions than the ones proposed in these motions:

Motion #7 – Conduct search for Fall 2007 settled minister; have no minister for 2006-07.

Motion #8 – Establish concurrent ministerial search committee for Fall 2006 interim or settled minister.

Motion # 10 – Establish search committee for Fall 2007 settled minister, as set forth in our bylaws. Motion passed. (Approved – 50, Opposed – 0, Abstained – 1)
