MINISTER'S MESSAGE By Rev. Amy McKenzie

On September 11, 2001 our peace was disrupted, our faith shaken, and our breath and words got caught in the shallows of our throats. Some have admitted sadness and numbness. We are beginning to find our voices, and the heart to go on: upholding our trust in conversation and idea-sharing, as well as committing to recover our joy, heal our hearts and establish peace in our world.

For a Unitarian Universalist response to the tragedy of September 11 and its aftermath we may refer to the cover of our Sunday order of service. "Freedom, Reason and Tolerance" are printed there. So is "Search."

We each have our own way of defending those values, and not all will agree on the best course of action, but from since before I came to serve as your minister, this congregation has put those words right out front—they are among the first words visitors and guests read.

My own hope is that **Freedom** will be religious as well as political, for others as well as ourselves, include thinking before acting, and taking responsibility for whatever we do. I want **Reason** to be informed by justice, curiosity and the will to understand. I long for **Tolerance** that blooms into love and respect. Our **Search** is for answers and the right questions, for truth but also for a religious response that acknowledges free choice at the same time as it celebrates the Web of Life that connects us all.

During this crisis we are witnesses to humanity in our glory and disgrace—

Disgrace like: violence (from the outside enemy against America, but also by Americans against other Americans, as Arab American citizens have been targets of European Americans)—and blame

and hatred (most notable by the terrorists who attacked, but also from the Revs. Falwell and Robertson who blamed the feminists, ACLU, prochoice advocates, pagans, People for the American Way, and gays and lesbians [by the way, I've seen reports that among the dead are three gay men: one of the pilots of American Airlines Flight 77 which struck the Pentagon: a passenger who called his mother on a cellular phone from the United Airlines flight that crashed in Pennsylvania; and the New York Fire Department's Catholic chaplain— *Amy*]); Falwell and Robertson didn't include themselves on the hate list, but the Taliban rejects Christianity, even though most Christians are loving, open and kind). Disgrace, yes, but there has also been

Glory like: heroism, compassion, generosity, and the welcome but surprising return to love, faith and hope that some have woken up to suddenly and mysteriously, as sadness and numbness melted away—the return of joy, peace and determination.

Through the emotional storm since the day of terror, I've worked to uphold four UU values: freedom, reason, tolerance and search(ing). I wrote to President Bush and my Senators to urge that reason and understanding prevail as much as prayers and anger. I wrote to local Mosques and Islamic Student Groups that our beliefs should not separate our common quest for meaning, right action, peace, justice, and hope. I'll continue to speak out against rash revenge, and hate crimes. I'll look for the most genuine response this UU and minister can muster.

For those who did not know about **the Wednesday, 9/12 Vigil** at church, I'm sorry we didn't get word out better. We needed to gather in our religious community, to reflect, light candles and share with one another, sing, and write our thoughts and feelings on paper. The vigil words are on our website and I know we'll come together again, as religious liberals, US citizens, and caring friends. (If more contacts via the Phone Tree would be okay with you, encourage the Board to expand the definition to include additional events besides official meetings and fund raisers, and possibly more than once a month. I thought it best we not overwhelm the Tree or the system with two calls at once.)

The call already out was for **the vote on Sunday, 9/16 on Phase One** of the physical plant expansion and its financing, the results of which I commend you for. I'm nervous, too, but I think the vote to build three multipurpose rooms, the nursery, restrooms, and stubbed-out kitchen was a great but realistic act of faith in this congregation, yourselves, and the future.

In the days, weeks and months to **come.** like you. I'll continue to mourn the loss of thousands of individuals who died in a fiery explosion, or by the crush of buildings, or from being outside the reach of rescue. I'll continue to carry a great sadness for those whose beloved died. I'll work to keep peace and love, curiosity and hope in my heart, even though President Bush seemed more like Sherriff Bush then Sherlock (Holmes) Bush at first. I'll also continue to push for answers about our "enemy"—what can we learn about them and us?

I'll keep asking to be included in local interfaith dialogues, as I did for the one on Thursday, September 20, at First Presbyterian Church. East Hill Baptist Church is making cassette copies of the panel and dialogue. **The Muslims of Tallahassee request** that the rest of us not avert our eyes when we glance their way and that we correct anyone who suggests that Islam supports terrorism, hatred, or intolerance. We should seek to understand, not to place blame. And calm down, slow down, get to know each other. Learn what the Five Pillars of Islam are and clear up your misconceptions by talking with Muslims about their beliefs and their values.

Islam is not the enemy, and our congregation will learn more about this major world religion, and local faith tradition, during Sunday services (of special note: **the October 14 service**) and through Adult Enrichment movie and discussion nights.

Our religion provides values and principles that will help us wend our way through this crisis. Our affirmation of life will keep us going, even though we realize all we can count on is this very second. That has always been so, but now more than ever, we are aware: life, freedom and individuals are precious. The temptation to hate, seek revenge, condemn to eternal punishment, or just plain give up on goodness is very strong. Life and Love are stronger. I think that as a congregation and as individuals our response ought to affirm: justice not vengeance, growth not stagnation, peace not war, building up not tearing down.

* The founding fathers of the United States had a vision of a diverse people living together in freedom and in peace. They gave us the structure to do this. It is up to us to fulfill the vision.

* We can start by building community right here in Tallahassee, and it can spread. We must not sink back into complacency.

* We need a paradigm shift in how we think about and treat one another, based on seeing each other as individual human beings, not as members of a certain group of people. Profiling must stop. We must recognize the divinity within each of us.

* We must each come out of our protective shell and be open about our deepest held beliefs. We must "walk the talk".

* Are we willing to do all of this? Can we afford not to?

GREEN CORNER By Ed Oaksford

Status of progress on Green Sanctuary action items:

1. Environmental audit every five years using the GS manual as a reference and notifying appropriate committees of recommendations. Every ten years conduct a professional energy audit. Action Item half done. Professional energy audit complete; internal environmental audit still needed. Rod Oldenburg has agreed to give the church an environmental review and make specific Green Sanctuary recommendations to the appropriate church committees of any necessary improvements that should be considered by the congregation.

2. Each year challenge congregation to achieve a target percentage in improved efficiency in energy use. Include efficiency of transportation alternatives. *Action item initiated*. Energy records being compiled for the church to communicate use and set target

reductions.

3. Weigh trash during representative periods and set targets for waste reduction where appropriate. Action item initiated. Trash weighed week of July 31 to Aug 7 and reported to congregation.

4. Purchase recycled products for office use where costs are not prohibitive. Isabel Sheridan and Kathie Mackie have agreed to oversee green purchasing for the church, and Jennifer Carver has provided the church with a Green Purchasing Guide. Action item is being addressed as required.

5. Adopt a policy of using washable tableware for church

functions. *Action item accomplished.* Achieved by taking a congregational vote.

6. Set up environmental information center in the church

providing practical information on energy and environmental practices for church and home. *Action item initiated*. Green Sanctuary information and other environmental material has been placed at the rear of the church. The information has been organized and presented in a 3ring notebook. Kathie Mackie has agreed to oversee, replenish and maintain that congregational resource. We also have a Green Sanctuary presence on our UUCT Web Page, and Keith Henry is leading that charge.

7. Include Green Corner in the church newsletter with environmental updates and tips.

Action item completed. Bob Deyle has taken on the responsibility of producing the *Green Corner* column for *The Meridian* with Cheryl Ward offering backup when needed.

8. Identify, learn and sing earthbased hymns and songs; perform environmental skits; and engage in other creative ways to keep environmental issues before the congregation each month of the year. Action item initiated. Reverend Amy and Helen Falb have assumed oversight of this action item and will discuss this requirement with the Program Committee.

9. Hold at least one ceremony each year honoring those who have participated in Green Sanctuary work. *Action Item needs to be planned, organized and carried out.*

10. Teach one children's environmental curriculum per

year. Action item acknowledged and several classes are being taught for RE with the participation of Green Sanctuary Committee members. Clarification of curriculum extent is being sought from the Seventh Principle Project for guidance to see if additional work is required.

11. Conduct a Voluntary Simplicity or Responsible Consumption Study Circle in the context of environmental concerns. Action item initiated. We viewed the Affluenza video on Santamber 20. An eight space

September 20. An eight-session voluntary simplicity circle will be initiated. Cheryl Ward has agreed to lead one of these 8-12 member study circles, with Kathie Mackie assisting.

12. Lead an environmental field trip to a power plant, recycling facility, landfill, sewage treatment plant, water supply plant or organic farm. Action item not scheduled yet. Need individual to organize and implement one or more of these trips for the congregation. This should be easy and enjoyable.

13. Dedicate at least one Sunday of worship per year (hopefully more) to the environment. Action item will easily be met with our normal program scheduling.

14. Request that the minister and/ or worship committee incorporate environmental prayers, meditations, or readings in **regular worship.** Action item easily met with current programming. Reverend Amy is aware of this action item and efforts are being made to document qualifying readings and prayers.

15. Commit to a yearlong partnership with a local environmental justice organization working on a specific issue. Action item in conceptual development. Proposal to work with Damayan, a local organization helping to install community vegetable gardens in disadvantaged neighborhoods. Speaker from Damayan visited the church on September 23, to discuss interactions with our congregation.

16. Commit to an all-church environmental project for one year passed by a resolution by the congregation. Action item in conceptual development.
Possibilities include year round responsibility for a section of a local lake cleanup, conducting energy efficiency seminars with/for the City Utilities Department, etc. Need individual(s) to initiate, organize, and implement such a project.

17. Offer at least one environmental justice speaker, workshop, or program each year. *Action item completed on Sunday, August 12, 2001.*

Later this year, UUCT members will consider a resolution on a "Moratorium on the Death Penalty". A tape of the UUCT August 12th discussion with Nancy Daniels, Public Defender, and Willie Meggs, State Attorney, can be borrowed from Sandy Smith (297-0012). A committee consisting of Sandy, Steve Urse, and Norene Chase will be considering any changes in the draft resolution. Copies of the draft are available from the committee. CONGREGATIONAL ACTIONS 9/16/01

Approved our Master Site Plan incorporating changes necessary to preserve two patriarch trees and other changes required by permitting.

Approved constructing Option C (All 'Cept the Clearstory Fellowship Hall) using Endowment funds not to exceed \$150,000 and funds from a mortgage not to exceed \$100,000, with the possibility of reducing the amount needed from a mortgage through additional Capital Campaign pledges.

Approved the Capital Improvement Committee directing our architect to do construction drawings and our construction manager to solicit bids for Option C.

Approved the Board contracting for the site work outlined in our Master Site Plan and required by permitting, as soon as the necessary permitting is completed and bids have been reviewed by our construction manager and the CIC. (Note: Permitting is in process.)

Approved using the amount of Sally Bellamy's bequest currently in the Building Fund (\$14,250) for interim sanctuary improvements to increase capacity, energy efficiency and sound absorption.

BOARD ACTIONS JULY 1 - AUGUST 31 By Allen Turnage, Board Secretary

New Initiatives:

The board approved the following statement promoting integration of initiatives proposed by congregation members into the Strategic Plan: "When an initiative requiring volunteer time or expenditure of money is suggested by a member of the congregation and comes to the attention of any individual board member, that board member should act to refer the initiative to the board member with responsibility for an area of the Strategic Plan where that idea could be most effectively integrated."

Two Services Study:

The Board suggested formation of a task force to study conducting two services on Sunday in order to temporarily alleviate the space problem.

Public Access Cable Channel:

The Board authorized a letter "from the undersigned members and friends of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Tallahassee" to be addressed to Comcast Cable of Tallahassee, asking Comcast to develop and open up the dedicated public access cable channel, which is currently inactive.

City Commission Letter:

The Board authorized the President to sign a letter from the Board on behalf of the Church, asking the City Commission to amend the Planned Unit Development requirements to either allow for a Planned Unit Development on less than five acres or exempt the church from PUD requirements.

Fund Raising Policy:

The board denied a fund raising request from a congregational group, primarily because the fund raising policy adopted by the Board states that any fund raiser requiring volunteer time or collection of monies must be approved at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Computer Purchase:

The Finance Committee has drawn up specifications and requirements for the purchase of a new computer, and the Board authorized expenditure of up to \$1,600 for the purchase of a new computer using those specifications.

REORGANIZED BOARD

Last spring, the Church Council of committee chairpersons recommended to the Board that it reorganize its oversight responsibilities for church committees according to the program areas in the Strategic Plan. Our Bylaws allow flexibility in the assignment of most of these responsibilities. The Board took time to review and discuss the recommendation, and at its August 25 retreat, settled on the following reorganization. The list gives the Board member responsible and the assigned committees by Strategic Plan program area. Other major board member responsibilities are listed at the end.
