Minister's Message: In the Interim

One of the most important aspects of our church life is the Sunday morning service when we gather as a congregation for *worship*. And yes, I do enjoy and use the word *worship*.

Let me explain why I do and why I feel it to be important. For me worship is participating in acts of worth. It is in choosing worth-fulness. In a sense it is what we do at important times in our lives.

When we give of ourselves, dedicate the minutes and hours of our lives, give of the labor of our bodies and minds, we are indicating our values and what is important to each of us.

When we come together, for example, singing together, it is a worth-ful act. Even if you are like me and cannot sing, it does not matter. The act becomes worth-ful. When we gather for our Sunday morning services, it is worship. We are taking care of our values, our purposes, and what we can give to the church community. The event is worthful and pertinent to our congregation.

Another thing that I think about worship is that it reminds us of the spiritual dimension to life. We come together in order to deepen and celebrate a special awareness and share a commitment with our community. Here we find a circle of friends.

To rephrase another expression, we do not have to think alike to worship together. We can walk together as we affirm our identity through song, affirmation, meditation and sermon. As we engage in each of these parts of the service, our worship can be enlightening and transforming. It is the joining together and giving worth to what we do.

Worship can also be an act of trust with those of a similar but yet different theological perspective.

And worship is ritual. Ritual is an important aspect of our lives, and our services give us ritual that can enrich our spirituality, deepen us and help us to find beauty in the circle of friends.

Worship for me is a valuable experience and certainly one of the important aspects of my spiritual life; it enriches me. I do hope that you will frequently join me in our Sunday morning services of worship.

August 2005 Board Actions

At their August 28, 2005 meeting, the Executive Board took the following actions:

Approved the Treasurer's Report for July 2005 and the Final Treasurer's Report for FY 2004 - 2005.

Approved the minutes of the July 31, 2005 meeting.

Approved a motion to pay from the Reserve Fund the \$3711.50 deficit in the minister's package, which includes the \$452.50 reimbursement to Reverend McKenzie for computer expenses.

Approved the following changes to the UUCT Policies and Procedures Manual:

• Deleted the Shared Ministry Committee as a responsibility of the VPs for Worship, Church Community, Social Justice, and Management, leaving it as the responsibility of the Past-President.


- Added a provision that the Secretary can delegate responsibility for the development and maintenance of the Manual of Policies and Procedures to another person.
- Revised the policy dealing with counting of the Sunday collection, stating that after being counted, the cash and checks shall be delivered to the Collecting Treasurer for deposit and other appropriate action.
- Added two new policies relating to committees one specifying that only the Board is authorized to establish committees in addition to those named

in the bylaws and another indicating that only those persons who have been members for a year or more can chair a committee.

Three proposed policies were referred for further study to the appropriate committees to determine if a policy is needed, and if so, what the proposed policy should be:

- Policy clarifying who has final responsibility for the hiring and firing of non-ministerial staff.
- Policy relating to the development and maintenance of the church's website.
- Policy requiring advance notice for committee meetings.

This Year in Youth RE

The Youth RE program has begun an exciting new year with new teachers, new students, and new curricula! We're so grateful for all the participation we receive from our members and friends...it certainly makes a difference. This year, our children will focus on personal growth, diversity and tolerance, and conflict management. Here's what each class will be focusing on.

Explorers (Ages 3, 4, and 5): The preschoolers will work on *Just Because I Am, a* curriculum that focuses on love, acceptance, and self respect through stories, games, and crafts. In addition, a representative from the Tallahassee Garden Club will present a preschool ecology program, called *Eco-tots*, one Sunday a month.

Artists and Bridgers (Elementary Grades): The first half of the year will focus on *I'm Like You, You're Like Me,* a curriculum about discovery, acceptance, and affirmation. This is diversity on their level: hair that's straight or curly, families with many people or few, bodies that are big or small—each one unique but just right for that person. The children will discover that even though people are different, they can enjoy being together and learning about each other. Important topics like talking, listening, feelings, and cooperation will be explored in basic terms, so children can grasp them.

The second half of the year, the children will work with *We Can Get Along,* which teaches essential conflict resolution and peacemaking skills think before you speak or act, treat others the way you want to be treated—in a way that children can understand. They will learn that they have the power to make good choices.
