**HEADS UP, ADVENTURERS!** The Mountain has two fall programs that should be of interest to you. All equipment is provided.

# Facilities Update

SITE WORK. The summer rains slowed site work down for several weeks, but the weather has been more cooperative lately, and work has been proceeding. For now, one layer of asphalt will be put down for new parts of the driveway, and current asphalt that is remaining will be left as is. Existing asphalt will also be removed in several places, per City permitting requirements. A final layer of asphalt will be put down over all paved areas once the building is completed.

TREE CONSULTATION. Several weeks ago, a large tree fell from an undisturbed area - a tree that appeared healthy but actually had a partially decayed root ball. Such a fall can occur when a vulnerable tree is more exposed to the elements than it was formerly. After this fall, Mad Dog arranged for Gibbes Tree Service to do a consultation with us on protective measures we might take with our trees during construction, in addition to the current fencing and trunk protection. Members of the CIC and Buildings and Grounds Committee met with Gibbes and subsequently made a recommendation to have them do some preventative work for us, provided funds can be found to do so. A key point made by Gibbes was that

tree health and tree decay are not related; a tree can appear healthy but actually be decaying. They pointed out that most of our trees are decay-prone species, but we are fortunate to have trees of all ages on our property, so there are always new ones coming along as others mature and die.

**BEHIND THE SCENES. Our** construction manager and architect have been working hard behind the scenes ironing out final details for the new building. By the time you read this, the footings and foundation will be poured or be very close to being poured. Representatives from the CIC met with the architect to decide on interior and exterior colors. (Materials and brands being used had been decided upon earlier as construction drawings were being developed.) In choosing colors for the inside, we aimed for consistency throughout the building for ease of repairing and repainting, neutral and light colors for the most part, and flooring that would not show dirt or scuff marks easily. For outside colors, we sought to compliment but not match the current buildings, since we can no longer get exactly the same concrete block.

SANCTUARY IMPROVEMENTS. The CIC had planned to re-carpet the sanctuary first, then order new chairs, so they would not have to be moved for the re-carpeting. However, we have decided not to re-carpet until Phase One is complete, and there is no longer the possibility of tracking in dirt and mud. Meanwhile, a number of our current sanctuary chairs have broken recently, so we have gone ahead and ordered the new chairs decided upon with congregational input (Church Chair Industries' Elite model with a gray frame and guartz fabric). We have ordered 180 chairs, one quarter of them with arms. When the sanctuary is expanded in a later phase, we will order 70 more chairs for a total of 250. The chairs will be delivered by semitruck sometime in September. To keep shipping costs down, the truck is unloaded where it is parked, and the customer moves the chairs inside. Watch email and Sunday announcements for requests for help once we get the arrival date!

# Green Corner



<u>Wanted:</u> fresh (environmentally sustainable) fish!

Environmental Defense, the environmental organization formerly known as the Environmental Defense Fund, has developed a web-based tool called the "Seafood Selector." The website provides information that can help you choose fish that are not harvested or farmed in environmentally damaging ways. It also includes recipes!

The top 10 best fish include the following: anchovies; caviar from farmed sturgeon and paddlefish; channel catfish; Pacific geoduck clams; Dungeness and stone crabs; crawfish; Alaskan halibut, hoki (new Zealand cod); Spanish and Atlantic mackerel; Mahi Mahi; Mediterranean, New Zealand green, and farmed blue

mussels; Pacific, edible (European), and farmed eastern oysters [bay

and farmed eastern oysters [bay oysters harvested by tonging, as in Apalachicola Bay, also are OK]; wild (not farmed) Alaskan salmon; sardines; trap-caught spot and Northern shrimp and northern shrimp from Newfoundland; farmed and wild striped bass; and blue, Mozambique, and Nile tilapia (all farm-raised).

The 10 worst include the following: wild, imported caviar; Atlantic cod; grouper; Atlantic halibut; monkfish and goosefish; orange roughy; rockfish (Pacific red snapper); farmed and wild Atlantic salmon and farmed Pacific salmon; Atlantic calico scallops; shark; farmed and most wild shrimp and prawns; skate; snapper; swordfish; toothfish (Chilean sea bass); and bluefin tuna. 
