Our culture provides no safe models for living. You're on your own.

can be found, but we must actively search. And nothing is permanent. The world changes, and we change with it. Answers from last week have to be adjusted. Our faith is like a leap into space on untried wings. It's flap or fall.

So get busy. Take a class, or teach a class. Have expertise? Unique insight? Share it. Found answers that work? Tell us. Don't know where to start? Jump off the limb.

Choices for Sustainable Living. The class will hold an organizational meeting and order workbooks on Sat. October 2 at 10:30 AM in Rm C. The

course is a nine-session course exploring the meaning of sustainable living and the ties between lifestyle choices and their impact on the earth, with participants taking turns facilitating sessions. Harmony Camp News

The week of August 2–6 was very exciting, with forty-eight Harmony Camp participants at UUCT from 9 A.M. to 4 P.M. every day. Our campers were Caucasian, Chinese, African American, Egyptian, Pakistani, Unitarian Universalist, Jewish, biracial, Quaker, Christian, and Moslem. Someone commented on the first day that we looked like a little United Nations.

Central to the camp philosophy was the opportunity for every child to choose the four classes in which he or she would participate for one hour each day. Another key theme common to all sessions and classes was their relationship to diversity and peacemaking. In our view that was an important accomplishment.

All campers participated in a community time during the first and last hour of camp each day. Kate Taluga, our camp director, led these sessions. They included making choices for the four classes to be attended each day, playing cooperative games, hearing stories pertinent to the camp theme, processing the day's activities, and having snacks prepared by the cooking classes.

Two special programs were presented during community time. Kaki Pope, an audiologist, explained hearing loss, remediation of hearing deficits, and communication issues of the hearing impaired. Campers also heard a presentation about the Underground Railroad by Geraldine Johnson-Johnson of the Riley House Museum. The information presented by these volunteers was excellent and resulted in many interesting questions and comments from the children.

Among the numerous courses and classes offered were yoga, meditation, haiku writing, journaling, "In Our World" (a class on diversity), peer mediation/peacemaking, nature walks and conservation study, oral history study (recording from elders at nearby Harbor Chase), interviews with members of UUCT, snack preparation, Spanish and sign language, drumming, singalongs with a guitar player and songwriter, singing songs from the time of the Underground Railroad, weaving, making drinking gourds, making paper guilts using patterns from the Underground Railroad, puppet making, selection and practice of puppet shows to be presented on Friday, and outside play. As you can see, a great variety of sessions was offered affording something appealing to everyone. The quality and quantity of experiences for every child was remarkable.

We were fortunate to have thirty-one gifted volunteers, who graciously gave of their time and talents to make our camp a success. We also had a great staff of nine: a camp director; instructors in drumming, singalong practice, and yoga; child care providers who worked before and after camp hours; and cleaning services personnel. When staff members providing child care didn't have children to supervise during regular camp hours, they helped wherever they were needed. For example, Maggie assisted in playground supervision, and Alana helped with puppet show practice.

On Friday morning during community time, Katya Taylor taught dances of universal peace. We had abbreviated class sessions and then assembled in the auditorium for five delightful puppet shows from various cultures, all teaching something about harmony. The audience of students, parents, and staff thoroughly enjoyed the puppet shows, student displays of handmade crafts, peer mediators' receipt of peacemaker buttons, and dances of universal peace.

On Friday afternoon we had regular sessions, ending with an opportunity for every child to create a diagram. The diagram showed the people the child knew when he or she arrived at camp on Monday and the new ones the child knew by Friday. Children also wrote comments about how they felt on the first and last days. Many said they were nervous the first day but had many more friends and felt completely comfortable by the last day.

Evaluations of the camp were completed by parents and their children. The comments were very complimentary, with many stating their intentions to attend again next year if the camp is continued. This is our intent. On Monday evening after the camp ended, we had a debriefing at the home of Tom and Katya Taylor. Tom facilitated a focus group, and we created a framework for next year's planning process. We look forward to having the incredibly strong support of our congregation again next year.
