The inherent worth and dignity of every person. Margaret Fuller (1810–1850) had more influence on American thought than did any woman before her time. Author, educator, and teacher, Fuller contributed to the American Renaissance in literature and to midnineteenth-century reform movements as a brilliant and highly educated member of the transcendentalist group. Her major work, Women in the Nineteenth Century (1845), profoundly affected the women's rights movement, which formally began at Seneca Falls, New York, three years later. Women attending her "conversations" and many prominent men found Fuller's influence life changing. She remains an inspiration to those seeking authenticity in living. Minister's Message

It is a pleasure to write my first newsletter article for *The Meridian*. My journey to Tallahassee is one that I look forward to, and I am honored that you have selected me as your interim minister. This is not my first experience in this role. As some of you already know, I have been with nine previous congregations during their interim period.

It is my choice to do interim work, and yet I often think that it is not that I have chosen interim ministry, but that it has chosen me. This aspect of ministry is a tremendously rewarding experience. It is my calling, and I view it as a special and unique aspect of this profession.

A dictionary definition of "calling" it that it is a strong urge to follow a particular

profession or vocation. I agree with the definition. Yet, when I say that I am called, it also means that I have a particular responsibility in this chosen work. I understand that I am accountable to try and give my most effective ministry (i. e. to minister) to the congregation that I have chosen to serve. This is an important ethical duty as well as a superb challenge.

I have had the pleasure of meaningful involvement with congregations in Texas, Florida, Nevada, Louisiana, Missouri, Kentucky, and Oklahoma. Now it is my privilege to be back on the East Coast and to serve this congregation. We should have an interesting and enjoyable year.

Briefly, what I will try to accomplish is be involved with leadership and your commitment to new leadership, to work toward assisting the congregation in coming to terms with its history, as well as new directions for the congregation as a whole. In addition, I will attempt to work with you on your connection to the Florida District and the UUA since both are important to the life and work of this church. Then there is this important idea for all of us to share, your commitment to the future.

It will be a full year, and yet it should also be an enjoyable year. I am excited about meeting with you, sharing with you and being with you during this transitional year. Yes, we may hit a speed bump or two along the way, but it is nothing that we can't handle. So saddle up; let's ride, not into the sunset but into a fulfilling future.

The Curtain Falls

Six months ago, though I put on a brave front, I harbored secret doubts. In the wake of Rev. Amy's departure, would we (the Program Committee, aided by members of the congregation and guest speakers) be able to pull it off-to conceptualize, develop, and present twenty-six consecutive Sunday services? In June I half-jokingly remarked that, by September, Program Committee members might be seen heading for the hills! But as tempting as that fantasy was at times, we hung in there. Truly "it takes a village" to create even a few quality worship services. Special kudos to our music director Helen Falb and the OK Chorale for many outstanding performances. You're amazingly talented and imaginative. I know we challenged you at times with unusual music scenarios, and you always seemed to know what to do. Thanks for graciously entering into the spirit of each service, no matter how unconventional!

Trudy Deyle and Kathie Mackie, you have our heartfelt thanks! Bless you for your good ideas; your patience; your willingness to handle unending requests, questions, and changes; and your sense of humor! To Ellen Dempsey, who chased me down with lots of checks for guest speakers, and to those who provided home hospitality, many thanks. We appreciate our Sunday set-up volunteers and sound system team for helping with unusual arrangements. And again, thanks to all who suggested guest speakers and service topics.

The Curtain Rises

September signals fall and, for UUCT, a new season of Sunday services. We welcome Rev. Bill Murchison to our congregation and anticipate his fresh perspectives on worship services. Rev. Murchison has expressed a desire to participate in Program Committee meetings and to assist with future layled services—and I've promised we'll promptly put him to work! (Roll up your sleeves, Rev. Bill!) We look forward to our collaboration.

Lay-led services are planned through November. Two services postponed after Hurricane Dennis will show up soon: Al Starr's service on Margaret Fuller (September 18) and the first in a series on personal creeds by Anne Rudloe (October 16). Our world religions series continues on October 30 with a service on Hinduism by Rev. John Young of the UU Church of Jacksonville. Look for a return visit by Panama City UU minister Rev. Nels Oas on November 27. We'll determine the date and content of December's lay-led service following discussions with Rev. Murchison about his Sunday service plans.

Many of you have helped with the Program Committee's most visible work. But we do more! This year we've also drafted guidelines for speakers and Program Committee liaisons; discussed Sunday service content issues with the Youth RE Committee; identified some dates for future intergenerational services: offered the executive board our plan for screening potential guest speakers; and responded to speaker requests from UU churches in Pensacola and Valdosta. In the months ahead, working with our new interim minister, we'll continue to address these and other matters large and small.

Harmony Camp 2005

Thanks to all the volunteers, paid staff, children, and parents who together made Harmony Camp 2005 a wonderful week. Our second annual diversity camp had 45 campers, 4 "precampers" (children of staff), 6 paid staff, and an amazing 34 volunteers, from both UUCT and the larger community. The campers ranged in age from first graders to seventh graders; they included children who were Unitarian Universalist, Muslim, Jewish, and Christian. Campers were diverse in race, too. The same diversity in religion and race was true for our staff.

Lorraine Warren, our camp leader, created a warm and welcoming environment. Our teachers, both paid and volunteer, offered 51 workshops, as well as whole-group sessions in everything from puppets to beading to pet therapy to butterfly gardens to yoga to drumming to singing. Children built bird houses out of gourds and out of wood. They consorted with reptiles and amphibians and made pine cone bird feeders. They made worm bins and grew vegetables. They cooked and made pressed flower cards. Children took oral histories from Harbor Chase residents. Reporters and photographers prepared our first camp newspaper, the Harmony Herald.

Civil Rights Tour

Meadville Lombard Theological School is offering an eight-day bus tour of southern civil rights sites March 18 - 26, 2006. What Does It Take?

Youth Group

As always, the program will be youthled and youth-oriented, with some gentle guidance and adult supervision from your advisors. Youth can expect the group to be a place to hang out and be themselves with other UUs. Parents can expect a safe, UU-based place for their youth to have fun, explore themselves and their faith, have fun, develop a community with other UU youth, have fun, and probably learn more than they expected (and in unexpected ways). This summer, the classes focused on teaching children to appreciate and care for the environment, in accordance with our seventh principle. They were very well-attended. Classes were designed for elementary and middle school children, used hands-on and experiential learning, and benefited from the talents of many wonderful and generous UUCT members. The children learned about: the plants, landscape, and other natural elements of the UUCT property (including

UUA Trustee Tidbits

We often hear about the Unitarian Universalist Veatch Program at Shelter Rock. It has been said the ongoing generosity of this program saved the UUA as an organization, revitalized the association's witness, strengthened ministerial training, and funded much to grow and extend Unitarian Universalism.

In 1941, long before the UUA existed, Caroline Veatch became the widow of a man who was a major stockholder in the North European Oil Corporation. While Mr. Veatch was still living, this corporation was forced to sell its holdings to other oil companies, thus leaving him in possession of promising royalty rights and stock. After Mr. Veatch died, Ms. Veatch became a friend of the North Shore Unitarian Society (now named the UU Congregation at Shelter Rock), because of her interest in the society's

work insuring children have the benefit of a liberal religious education and also through the efforts of N.S.U.S. minister Gerald Weary.

Ms. Veatch and her sister made cash gifts for the original meeting house and, as the society grew, continued contributing ever increasing financial gifts. Eventually, Ms. Veatch joined the society and re-wrote her will to assure that Unitarianism would have a "splendid" future. She promised if she was able to secure the oil royalties accumulating in Germany, she would give half to N.S.U.S. Ms. Veatch died in 1953, leaving all the royalty rights to the society.

The N.S.U.S. continued showing Ms. Veatch's and their generosity and vision by funding new churches and needed supplies for others. The history of the Veatch Program's financial support goes on with the sound

thinking and dedication of many visionary UUs. Today the Veatch Program at Shelter Rock income for the UUA is approximately \$20 million per year, and a portion of this money is in the form of grants by the UUA made available to UU congregations.

For a detailed, interesting history of this example of progressive philanthropy and the current ways the UUA uses the Veatch program money, I encourage you to read We Started With Children by Robert Sunley and/or Funding Justice by Warren Ross, the latter currently available from the UUA bookstore. Again, I thank you for reading my column and solicit your suggestions and concerns regarding my work as your trustee. You can contact me at <u>ilund@uua.org</u>.
