



It begins with a very positive outlook as we then determine what our vision should be, what mission we may all wish to contemplate. It begins with focusing on what we as a congregation already do well. And, I, as your new interim minister, already

can speak long, earnestly and appreciatively about the many things you do right, the many things that you do very well. This process allows you to acknowledge – and celebrate – those accomplishments. And then we go on from this basic understanding.

So, I urge you to save the date on your calendars. The more of us that attend, the more representative of the whole congregation, the more it is a true reflection of what all of the congregation envisions. Childcare and a continental breakfast will be provided.

There is no reason we should be this way, except that we desire it to be so. No God commands us as UUs to love each other; there is no Hell for us if we choose to be selfish instead of sharing our gifts. We choose love simply because that is what we choose to do.

In short, we create the church that we want to be, and the church we create is bigger than any of us. The church we construct and share among

ourselves is greater and more powerful than any single person. Members and even ministers may come and go. What remains is the common creation that we carve out of our shared realities – our church. The center of our shared power together. Our UUCT; our community of faith.

Faith in what? For me, faith in each other. Faith that our church will be there for us. Faith that if you don't understand what I mean, you will ask me about it. Message from the Director of Religious Education

The Youth Religious Education program has a long-standing commitment to provide quality religious education for the children of UUCT. Each year, we explore one or more of five major topics, drawn from the Seven Principles and Six Sources of Unitarian Universalism. Those topics include UU Identity; Jewish and Christian Heritage; Peace, Social Justice, and the Interdependent Web; World Religions; and Personal Spiritual Growth and Development. Each year, the Youth RE Committee reviews past offerings to determine the appropriate topic for each age group.

Curricula are most often drawn from UUA-published offerings, and on occasion, outside sources are used if it is determined by the DRE and the Youth RE Committee that the sources fit well within a UU framework and fulfill one of the five topic areas. Outside sources include curricula developed by Unitarian Universalists, but not UUApublished, and materials available from like-minded publishing houses, such as Free Spirit Publishing. (Some of the materials from other publishers are available through the UUA Bookstore.) Much thought goes into selecting curricula that is age-appropriate, interesting, and teacher-friendly.

This year, the **Explorers (ages 3 to 5)** will be using *We Are Many, We Are One,* a UUA-published yearlong preschool curriculum that offers children

the grounding of a religious community and tradition, along with the freedom to discover and express their uniqueness. The underlying theme throughout is anti-bias and multicultural education, which celebrates diversity and interdependency.

The Artists (grades K, 1, and 2) will be using Special Times, a UUApublished curriculum that acquaints children with the Jewish and Christian heritages and engages them in celebrating Jewish and Christian holidays and other "special times" such as the Shabbat/Sabbath, Thanksgiving, and everybody's birthday. Children learn to appreciate our Jewish and Christian heritages, to understand and appreciate the special qualities of worship and celebration, to honor diversity and universality in religious traditions, and to grow in Unitarian Universalist community and religious meaning-making.

The **Bridgers** (grades 3, 4, and 5) will be using *Timeless Themes*, a UUA-published curriculum that introduces children to religious literature that is central to North American culture and to Unitarian Universalist heritage. Children become familiar with their cultural heritage and the human issues that inspired these scriptures--the timeless themes of transcendent power, human responsibility, love of freedom, speaking out against injustice, respect for the beliefs of others, love of one's neighbor, and forgiveness. The Bible

stories are taught from a UU value structure. God is referred to as "God," not "he." The stories, drawn from the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible, are gender-inclusive. Violence is not avoided, but recognized and used to guide participants toward an understanding of non-violent ways to resolve conflicts.

Our Middle and High School youth will be participating in Sunday morning Youth Group, based on the Young Religious Unitarian Universalists' concept of "Six Components of a Balanced Youth Program" as developed by the UUA. These components include worship, youth-adult relations, community building, social action, learning, and leadership. At the beginning of each school year, the Youth, with guidance from the Advisors, develop a program that includes the six components in a manner that is youth-friendly and encourages consensus and friendship. The Youth plan social activities, service projects, and attend CONs (youth conferences held within the district) throughout the year.

We are gearing up for an exciting year! RE Classes will begin on September 17. If you would like to participate in the Youth RE Program or if you have any questions about our offerings, please contact DRE Maggie Geraci, Youth RE Committee Chair Eliza Coyne, or VP for RE Kelley Turnage.

Congregational Vote on Proposed Bylaws Revisions, Etc. September 10

As has been previously reported through various means, the Executive Board is calling a congregational voting meeting on Sunday, September 10, to vote on three proposals that have been reviewed and approved by the Board:

- a proposed compensation package for the settled minister, developed by the Settled Minister Negotiating Team,
- proposed amendments to the church Bylaws developed by the Committee on the Ministry, and
- a proposed revision to the FY 2006-2007 Operating Budget to allocate \$7,240 in additional pledges received after the adoption of the budget in May.

A copy of the compensation package proposal approved by the Board was mailed to each UUCT member in late August, along with details on the proposed budget revision. Copies of the Bylaws indicating the proposed revisions are available on the back counter in the sanctuary along with a guide that explains the reasons for the proposed changes. Electronic versions of the Bylaws revisions and the guide (in pdf format) are available on the church's website (www.nettally.com\uuct).

The primary Bylaws revisions include the following. For details, please see the guide entitled "Rationale for Proposed Revisions to the UUCT Bylaws."

 Provisions for the annual formulation of church leadership goals by the Executive Board, the minister, and the Committee on the Ministry (COTM) and for an annual performance review of the Board, the COTM, and the minister by the congregation facilitated by the COTM.

The COTM believes that doing so

will establish an explicit, nonthreatening, and collaborative process for an annual performance review of the minister in a broader context that addresses the performance of the entire church leadership rather than solely the minister. Such a process can facilitate a clear understanding between the Board, the minister, and the COTM of mutual expectations and a context within which to seek collaborative solutions to concerns or problems that may arise concerning the church's ministry.

 Formal assignment of responsibility to the COTM for resolving conflicts that affect the ministerial-congregation relationship.

These revisions are intended to provide a single, explicit process for raising and addressing concerns and conflicts concerning one or more members of the congregation and the minister.

- Revisions of other COTM
 responsibilities intended to better
 define the role of the COTM in
 concert with contemporary UUA
 concepts and to differentiate the
 COTM from the old model of a
 ministerial relations committee.
- 4) Revision of the procedures for calling a settled minister to (a) remedy conflicts between the current Bylaws and UUA search policies, (b) articulate the confidentiality requirements of a settled minister search conducted pursuant to those policies, and (c) amend the majority and quorum requirements for a call consistent with recommendations of UUA advisors consulted by the COTM, including former Florida District Executive, the Rev. Mary Higgins, and our District Ministerial

Settlement Representative, the Rev. Katy Korb.

The proposed increase in the quorum required for calling a settled minister from 40% to 60% was recommended by Rev. Korb and endorsed by Rev. Higgins and Rev. Bill Murchison. The required four-fifths majority for such a vote is left unchanged despite the fact that UUA guidelines suggest at least a 90% majority and many candidates require 95%. Leaving the Bylaws threshold lower allows flexibility while still allowing the Search Committee and the candidate to request/require a higher majority.

- Specification of a higher threshold for calling a special meeting of the congregation for the purpose of voting on proposed dismissal of the minister.
 - The proposed changes require the initiative of a larger number of individuals to commence the procedure for voting to dismiss the minister (20% of the Qualified Members) and a quorum of the same size (60%) as that required for voting to call a minister. This reduces the likelihood that a small number of disgruntled members can precipitate a crisis.
- 6) Clarification of policies governing compensation of the minister in the event of resignation or dismissal and conferring flexibility on the Board, subject to affirmation by the congregation, if necessary to accommodate specific circumstances.
- Clarification of policies governing the minimum notice of resignation or retirement by the minister and providing flexibility to the Board to accommodate specific circumstances.

Members of the SMSC have been available at the picnic table outside the sanctuary after the service and will be available again Sept. 3. An adult forum was held August 27. The purpose of all this activity is to be sure the

congregation, which as been met with, interviewed and surveyed, agrees that we "got it right" or will suggest to us how to get it right. An after-service meeting is also planned for **Sept. 3 at 12:15 PM in Room L.** Grab your coffee and join us!

Once a prospective minister indicates an interest in UUCT and we an interest in him or her, we go about exchanging what's called an Information Packet. The IP is our "sales tool," our way of presenting a complete picture of what UUCT is all about. We are issuing a call for a settled minister, and we want to present ourselves in the best possible light. It will include letters from our congregational and denominational leaders, results of our congregational survey, the draft ministerial agreement including the compensation package, pictures of our facility, congregational history, financial information, bylaws,

and information about Tallahassee and the Big Bend region. We are working to make this an attractive document and will be looking for congregational input in the weeks to come. This is a total committee effort that is being coordinated by Sara Reece and Chris Ellrich.

The SMSC continues on track, keeping to its timetable. The Board approved the Fair Compensation Package for the prospective minister presented by the Negotiation Team in August. The congregation will vote on it **Sept. 10.**

On or about **Sept. 18**, our Congregational Record will be "unveiled" at the UUA website (http://www.uua.org/programs/ministry/settlement/). Our total Information Packet will be ready by **Oct. 15**. Yes, your SMSC has been busy, but we're managing to enjoy ourselves, too!

Our Whole Lives is a progressive approach to sexuality education that deals with the totality of human sexuality in an age-appropriate manner. It helps participants make informed and responsible decisions about their sexual health and behavior. It equips participants with accurate, age-appropriate information in six subject areas: human development, relationships, personal skills, sexual behavior, sexual health, and society and culture. Grounded in a holistic view of sexuality, Our Whole Lives provides not only facts about anatomy and human development, but helps participants to clarify their values, build interpersonal skills, and understand the spiritual, emotional, and social aspects of sexuality.

Parent Orientations will provide parents with an overview of the program, its underlying values and ways that parents can support their children's participation, as well as provide support for parents in their role as sexuality educators of their children. The text taken as a whole is a meditation on prejudice and justice and the effect that one has on the other.

Trustee Tidbits: Youth Ministry Survey

In June, the Task Force on Ministry to and with Youth published their summary report on the Youth Ministry Survey conducted last year. 1,399 surveys were analyzed, with the average age of respondents being 15.2 years old. The results of the survey are important for our association as we make certain that the spiritual development needs of our youth are being met.

The vast majority of the youth felt welcomed and respected on all levels of youth ministry (local, district, regional, and continental). Most also said that youth ministry programs provide them with opportunities to learn new things, get involved in their communities, and develop leadership. However, only about half of the respondents said that adults in their congregation or their congregation's board members (other than advisors, RE directors, ministers and RE teachers) support youth ministry.

Also, on all levels of youth ministry and across all ages and identities, the youth felt that their spiritual needs were not being met. Only 53% of respondents considered their congregation their spiritual home, and similarly, only 53% said their youth

groups met their spiritual needs. The question is how can our ministry with youth help them to determine their spiritual needs, articulate their faith, and feel spiritually fulfilled? Other survey findings suggest that youth group or religious education did not meet the needs or engage the interest of a number of the youth, and so they did not make it a priority in their lives.

Green Corner

The Green Sanctuary potluck/kickoff meeting was held at UUCT, Saturday, August 19. Attending were: Dick Leinberry, Sara Reece, Elspeth Stowell, Norene Chase, Rev. Lyn Plumb, Joanne Taylor, Rosa Morgan, Steve Urse, Linda Logan, and Michele Hope. The group talked about the many activities Green Sanctuary has worked on during the past year, including activities we will continue to support. We are now a Green Sanctuary congregation. What do we want to happen next?

The issue on our minds is still global warming/climate change. As a group, we support personal, congregational and community change to reduce C02 emissions. Using the UUA's recently adopted Statement of Conscience on the Threat of Global Warming/Climate Change as a guide, we looked at personal practices and congregational actions which might move us toward positive behavioral changes and support the SOC in tangible ways.

1. The Solar Power Fund to place solar panel(s) on the roof of our new RE building: Money and pledges are pouring in. We will continue supporting this effort in an information blitz within coming weeks. Elinor Elfner, Ed Oaksford, and Steve Urse, working with the Big Bend Climate Action Team and the Finance and Building and Grounds committees, will look closely at the possibilities for our realizing this project very soon. Linda Logan will investigate grant opportunities.

- 2. **Promoting carpooling** to and from UUCT: Joanne Taylor and Peggy Lentz will organize this effort, not only for the purpose of members saving fuel and freeing up parking spaces in our parking lot, but also for creating care circles for UUCT members who live near one another.
- 3. Dick Leinberry agreed to transport the recycled batteries we are collecting at rapid speed to the hazardous waste drop-off site, as needed. He will enlist support from UUCT youth in helping families increase recycling efforts. We will continue collecting used printer cartridges and used fluorescent light bulbs at the Green Sanctuary table.
- 4. After the tasty potluck luncheon, the group became enthusiastic about helping our congregation learn about and move toward consuming more energy-efficient foods, locally produced and low on the food chain. Sara Reece, Rosa Morgan, and Ed Oaksford will work together and have some bold ideas, not only for our congregation, but in outreach to others in our community. Stay tuned!
- 5. Sara Reece, Ed Oaksford, and Steve Urse will consider ways to inform and support members and the congregation in **reducing our carbon footprints**. (Let's examine those monthly utility bills!)
- 6. Michele Hope will assume responsibility for coordinating ideas

- and people for the **Green Sanctuary table** on Sundays. This venue will continue promoting fluorescent light bulbs and the 1-2-3 Global Warming Pledge, and inform members concerning lifestyle changes designed to reduce the threat of global warming/climate change. Michele will also lead seasonal Sunday afternoon adventures in the woods.
- 7. The group shared with Norene Chase new ideas for environmental **Adult Forums** in coming weeks and months on subjects listed above.
- 8. Intergenerational services and activities in support of the 7th Principle were encouraged by our new interim minister, Rev. Lyn Plumb. She's on a fast learning curve regarding UUCT's shared ministry for Earth. We welcomed her experience, input and participation.
- 9. Advocacy goals such as supporting BBCAT's Energy Plan for Tallahassee are on our minds. We will immediately promote a letter-writing campaign to influence the city commission in choosing energy efficiencies and new technology for Tallahassee's energy needs.
- 10. There will undoubtedly be new opportunities for personal practices, congregational actions and advocacy goals for our Green Sanctuary congregation to address in coming months. Stay tuned!

Board Actions: July 30, 2006

Approved a request by the Buildings and Grounds Committee to contract with Gibbs Tree Service to remove four distressed and dying trees from UUCT grounds using an estimated \$4,800 from the Reserve Fund.

Approved the issuing of Home Depot and Lowes credit cards per VP for Management recommendations.

Accepted VP reports as presented.

Scheduled a congregational discussion meeting 8/27/06 and a voting meeting 9/10/06 regarding By-laws revisions proposed by the Committee on the Ministry (COTM) and approved the proposed revisions being sent to the congregation.

Approved the request by the Negotiation Team to place approving the compensation package to be offered to a settled minister on the agendas for the 8/27/06 congregational discussion meeting and the 9/10/06 voting meeting, and approved proposing the following to the congregation, as recommended by the Negotiation Team: a salary and housing compensation of \$57,628.57, with the understanding that pursuant to the UUA's fair compensation guidelines, the total cost to UUCT will be \$80,000 for the church year 2007-2008. Approved making copies of the proposal available to the congregation in advance of the meetings.

Approved requesting that the Nominating Committee provide a candidate or candidates for the vacant position of Vice President for Social Justice in time for the next congregational meeting.

Approved the following regarding the Policies and Procedures Manual:

- COTM-proposed modifications,*
- Changes numbered 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9.*

- Updating the list of committee and task oversight responsibilities of the VP for Worship to: Program Comm., Music Comm., UU Buddhist Fellowship, sanctuary and sound system set up, Freethinkers Forum. - Updating the list of committee and task oversight responsibilities of the VP for Social Justice to: Social Justice Committee, Racial and Cultural Diversity Committee (RCDC - currently inactive), Partnership Church, The Shelter meal coordination, Lesbian-Gay-Bisexual-Transgender (LGBT) Welcoming Congregation Committee (currently inactive), Green Sanctuary Committee, Adult Forum, Multicultural Families Support Group (currently inactive), Tallahassee Equality Action Ministry (TEAM) coordination, Muslim Student Group liaison.
- Updating the list of committee and task oversight responsibilities of the VP for Management: removed Kitchen Improvement Committee; changed Aesthetics Committee to Aesthetics, Archives and Library coordination; added Memorial Garden oversight.
- Designated Spiral Scouts program under Youth RE Committee.
- Left Board Secretary responsible for the Manual of Policy and Procedures and removed it as a responsibility of the Past President.
- Omitted proposed attendance requirements for all Board members.

Accepted the preliminary Treasurer's report for FY 2005-2006 and the Endowment Summary as of 6/30/2006.

Approved increasing the FY 2006-2007 operating budget using additional pledge money totaling \$7,240 to:

- Increase the hourly wage rate of the Director for Religious Education to \$13.76, per UUA recommendations for the position, and increase the hours for the position from 16.5 to 17.5 per week (\$1,262.73 total increase),

- Increase the budget for the Program Committee to the FY 2005-2006 level of \$1500 (\$1400 increase),
- Increase the budget for both the UUA and FL District fair shares with remaining additional pledges (73% allotted to the UUA and 27% for the district).

Requested a proposal from the Membership Committee outlining specific requirements for membership.

Changes numbered 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9

- #3 Revises policy on Minister's Discretionary Fund to bring it into compliance with IRS regulations.
- #4 Revises policy on supervision of staff, designating the minister as chief of staff and responsible for daily supervision of staff, in consultation with the Board and Personnel Committee as needed and with the support of supervisory support teams for each staff person as needed.
- #5 New policy regarding The Meridian, authorizing periodic publication and right of Meridian Editor to establish guidelines.
- #6 Revises policy on childcare, designating the DRE responsible for obtaining childcare when needed for congregational meetings and other events, using the Nursery Worker for such childcare when possible and within budget. Also provides that

overtime pay for childcare, when needed for special events, shall be paid by the committee or program sponsoring the event.

#7 – New policy stating that all scheduling of events on the church calendar shall be made through the Office Administrator. Also, new policy on room usage, designating Office Administrator responsible for assigning and changing rooms for events.

#8 – New policy regarding set-up of chairs in the sanctuary in preparation for Sunday services, with general description of duties of coordinator, including the establishment of guidelines.

#9 – New policy establishing a Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA) Plan for part-time staff working 16 hours or more per week, providing for reimbursement of certain medical expenses upon submission of receipts and within annual budgeted amount.
